A Bulgar Repulse. It appears from this correspondent's story that the Bulgarians had a bad quarter of an hour's battle after captuing the town of Lule Burgas. They advanced from the railway station a distance of four miles, and during this time passed through a depression between the hills. Here the Bulgars were tremendously mauled by Turkish shrapnel from the heights above, and when the confusion among them was at the worst Turkish cavalry dashing from concealment and shouting "Allah, Allah," swept like a tornado on the remnant of the Bulgars, who fled with the cavalry pursuing and riding them down. But the Turkish cavalry rode too far, and came within

The medicine closet should be in he wall and so high that children's nands cannot reach it. It is wise to have double doors to it. each with separate and secure lock, catching bar at the middle. All the inside hould be cut up into pigeon holes. On one side keep the poisons and on the other the ready aids in case f small needs.

The ready-aids vary, according to the ideas of housewife. But the following are suggested as a type of what will probably be needed-borax, rhubarb, icorice powder, quinine, castor-oil, Rochelle and Carlsbad salts: alcohol. herbs and barks, lint, bandages, finger stalls, adhesive plaster, burn salves, healing salves, dry mustard and healing lotions. Keep everything in wide-mouthed

bottles with either screwtops or ground glass stoppers. Wrap the medicine bottles in blue paper to exclude light, and label hem outside, in addition to labeling the bottles.

#### Freshening Ribbons

Ribbons which are not reall. diety but just crumpled or out of condition. may be freshened by being rubbed on both sides with a soft muslin, to free them from dust, then pressed with a hot iron under a piece of fine wet muslin. If dirty they may be steeped first for a few minutes in cold salted water (to set the colors), then put into warm soapy water, moved about in it, and drawn through the hand, without crumpling, until quite clean, then rinsed in nearly cold water.

Gum arabic solution may be put into the last rinsing water to give back to the ribbon its former slight stiffness. Squeezing is not allowable, so a towel must be used, the ribbon being spread out smoothly and rolled up in

For silks of delicate coloring the old-fashioned method of washing in potato water is recommended, two or three large potatoes being grated into a pint of tepid water, left to steep awhile, and the water strained or poured off clear. This may be used either for wash-

ing or sponging, the ribbon in the latter case being laid out on a table, sponged well on both sides, dipped in clear water, and, if of one color, hung up to drip and dry. Soapy water may be used in the same way, or for ribbons which are not really dirty sponging with gum arabic solution will be a good means

In any case the after process of ironing should be done over a covering of fine muslin or tissue paper, the anyone who chances to be going into bare iron being used for finishing off when the ribbon is quite dry. If not required for use at once, it should be rolled around a canister or cardboard cylinder, or anything which will pre-

#### CARBOLIC SOAP.

Shave and melt a bar of mottled Castile soap. The melting is best done in a water bath, so there will be no scorching. Beat into the melted soap, a little at a time, half a pint of carbolic acid solution of fifty per cent. strength. Keep on beating, with the soap still in the water bath, for at least a quarter of an hour. Mold into small cakes or balls and let stand a month in a dry place. Suds made from this soap, or scrubbing with the soap itself, will disinfect glass, pottery and metal. With wooden vessels burning is the thing. Carbolic soap suds, however, will destroy germs in woodwork if they are applied to it boiling hot.





Professor Patterson's Sermon in PROFESSOR HILL the First Methodist Church.

Prof. W. J. Patterson, of the Western University, occupied the pulpit of the First Methodist Church on Sunday evening in the interests of the layman's missionary movement

Prof. Patterson commenced his remarks with the verse, "This day is the Scripture fulfilled in your ears." From that day forward, the speaker stated, there had been a constant struggle to extend the gospel. One-third only of the 1,500,000,000 people in the world today had been reached, and were nominally Christians. The other two-thirds were yet in darkness and were awaiting the arrival of the gospel.

"In all great movements," said the speaker, "there are two forces which wield considerable influence, and they are environment and destiny. Environment is that which influences man, and destiny is that force with which the person is able to influence others." He traced the growth of the Anglo-Saxon race, which had come from small beginnings, and in some instances the nation had failed because they were unwilling to observe righteousness. The Greek and Roman races had fallen and most important and threatening cause decayed from this same fact. The Anglo-Saxon races were liable to the same fate unless the spirit of righteousness was cultivated. The downfall of the empires of ancient Europe





was strictly in their interests that diarrhoea, sore throat, stomach-ache; their policyholders should live, hence it was their duty to take up the prob-lem of public health. The healthy bodily condition of the people benefitted them materially in their business. There were three ways in which the life insurance men could greatly help in the public health problem. First, by supporting the medical inspection of school children and starting the practice of inspection amongst their policyholders. The second way was to lend their influence in the reduction of infant morality, and thirdly, by helping to fight infectious dis-The medical profession could not undertake to wipe out the latter case by themselves as never half of the infectious case are reported. To carry out this work properly, Dr. Hill advocated the appointment of committee whose sole duty would be to investigate cases of infectious dis-eases, and have the patients isolated. He prophesied that this method would mean a great lowering in the general death rate, and considerable improvement in the public health.
