London, Dec. 27 .- In a statement on the central powers' peace terms, made at the Teuton-Russo peace conference on Wednesday, Count Czernin, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, declared that one of the conditions that Germany would insist upon was the return of her colonies that had fallen into Entente hands.

Regarding the compensation for maintenance of prisoners of war, the Russian chairman said it might be construed as an indemnity. He insisted that an international fund be used to pay damages against private persons. He had no objection to Germany's request that her colonies be evacuated by the Entente

A TEN DAYS' RECESS. Russia's delegation, he stated in conclusion, notwithstanding differences of opinion, thought that the German declaration that Germany has no aggressive plans offered the possibility of immediate beginning of negotiations for a general peace among all belligerents. He proposed a ten days' recess until January 4 "so that the peoples whose governments have not yet joined in the negotiations for a general peace may have an opportunity to acquaint themselves with the principles of such a peace as now is being estab-

"At the expiration of the indicated time," he declared, "the negotiations must be resumed, disregarding whether or not other belligerents have joined in the

Austrian Foreign Minister Informs Brest Conference That Teutons Are Opposed To Forcible Annexations or Indemnities, and Are Not In War For Conquest-Declares All Lost Lands Must Be Returned To Germany and Suggests International Fund To Pay For War Destruction.

Virtual acceptance of the peace terms offered by Russia was made by the Central Powers in a statement issued to the peace conference Tuesday by Count Czernin, the Austro-Hungarlan foreign minister. The Teutonic allies, however, cannot bind themselves to the Russian terms unless Russia's allies also recognize them and carry them out honestly towards the Central Powers.

Petrograd, Dec. 26 .- The central powers, Count Czernin, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, told the peace conference at Brest-Litovsk yesterday, solemnly declare their resolve to immediately sign terms which will terminate the war on conditions equally just to all belligevents. The central powers also favor a general peace without forcible annexations and indemnities, but they could not bind themselves to have such terms without guarantees that Russia's allies would recognize them and carry them out honestly toward the central powers.
