THE MEGANTIC SAILS FOR HALIFAX WITH KINMEL CAMP

TERMS OF GERMAN-POLISH ARMISTICE ARE BROKEN

Council of Four Has Virtually Decided On This Course -French and Belgian Troops Will Be Assigned To Hold This Territory-Great Britain Has Not Sufficient Effective Troops To Maintain Garrisons.

Paris, April 3.-The council of four has virtually decided, according to information from French sources, that the left bank of the Rhine will be neutralized until Germany has paid the indemnities fixed by the peace conference. It is understood that French and Belgian troops will hold this territory, the United States claiming it to be impossible to leave American troops in Europe after the signature of the peace treaty, and Great Britain, having insufficient effective troops to maintain garrisons along the Rhine.

It is surmised that the visit of King Albert of Belgium to Paris was not unconnected with the share that Belgian troops will be asked to undertake in this territory.

Ottawa, April 3.—The Parliamentary Liberal party held another caucus today, and gave further consideration to matters connected with the holding of the national convention on August 5, 6 and 7 next. Decisions arrived at were as follows: Purpose of Convention: The purpose of the convention will be, first, to draft, discuss and adopt the platform of the Liberal party of Canada; secondly, to deal with the question of party organization; thirdly, to select a leader in succession to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Representation at Convention: Following as closely as possible the plan adopted for the National Liberal convention of 1893. Women will be eligible for election as delegates in all constituencies. In addition to the foregoing, invitations will be extended to the Canadlan Council of Agriculture, the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, the G. W. V. 14,416 PERSONS ARE BROUGHT ACROSS OCEAN IN LEVIATHAN

New York, April 3.—The largest number of persons ever carried across the Atlantic on a single ship arrived here from overseas yesterday aboard the steamship Leviathan, formerly the German liner Vaterland.

One of ten troopships, due yesterday, with more than 26,000 returning American soldiers, the Leviathan had a total of 14,416 souls aboard when she made her pier at Hoboken. Of these 12,274 were troops. The rest were officers and members of the crew.

In order to accommodate this unprecedented number of passengers, the troops aboard received only two meals a day, but there were no complaints.



TRADES COUNCIL TO SUPPORT DEMAND FOR MORE NEW SCHOOLS

Members of Board of Education Present Their Case.

ATTACKS ON COUNCIL

Some of Laborites Later Regretted Passing Resolution to Support.

By an overwhelming majority, the Trades and Labor Council last night decided to back up the recommendations of the board of education, which members of the latter body declare are members of the latter body declare are being blocked by certain city councillors, to build a few four-room schools to relieve the congested conditions in the various institutions of the city.

John S. Barnard declared that last year the situation was acute, but this year it was worse. The principal section of the city where the congestion occurred was between the business sction and the south branch of the Thames, and east as far as Ealing. When a class consisted of more than forty children it was beyond the efficient control of one teacher. The play-grounds at Simcoe street were not adequate. At Aberdeen school the classes were large. Chesley and Ealing were

that is, north of Oxford street, and from Adelaide to Quebec street, there from Adelaide to Quebec street, there was no school accommodation. A site for a school in that section of the city should be purchased before the price of property increased.

Schools Are Required.
