

The Chicago Record-Herald deperibes Canada's immigration policy as "ideal, thrifty and businesslike." Canada, our contemporary says, knows exactly what she wants, and she goes about getting it without much ado or red-tape. The Dominion needs farmers and agricultural laborers, and the coming of such is encouraged in every way. Commissions are paid for the right stuff, and the Government maintains employment bureaus, advertises, and has no prejudice against contract labor. "But," the Chicago paper adds. "Canada does not want new recruits for the slums of the congested urban districts, and does not hesitate to exclude or deport those who appear undesirable or incapable."

It is to this wise immigration policy that is largely due the rapid settlement of the Canadian West and the corresponding growth of wealth and production. During the period 1897 to 1907 the volume of immigration reached 1 .-366,000. It is officially estimated that figures up to the present would prove the influx to have reached 1,500,000, representing a national asset of \$1,-200,000,000.
