## DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY IS 42 HOUSE OF REPRESENTA

Republican Rout in the Elections in the United States Yesterday Proved Most Complete.

## REPUBLICAN SENATE MAJORITY IS AT THE VANISHING POINT

New York and Ohio Delivered Body Blows to the G. O. P. and Roosevelt-Today's Latest Figures.

THE SITUATION.

The Democrats when the newly-elected members take their seats in March next will control the House of Representatives by a majority of over 40. The present Republican majority is 43. Thus the Democrats will be able to block any legislation initiated by the Republican President, W. H. Taft, who has still two years of his term to fill. The Republicans appear tolerably assured of a majority in the Senate, although the returns which are coming in may wipe this out also.

In the United States a president is elected every four years, and members of the House of Representatives every two years. Onethird of the Senate is elected every two years by state legislatures. The Republicans will control both branches of Congress until March, when the new House of Representatives meets.

Washington, Nov. 9 .- The sweep of the political tidal wave, which rolled over the United States yesterday, is further emphasized by additional returns and revised figures at hand today.

The Democratic majority in the House of Representatives will be at least 42, and possibly more, as compared with the present Republican majority of 43.

Added to the reversal in the lower branch of Congress, the morning returns showed the Republican majority of 26 in the United States Senate rapidly ap-



VICTORY OF DEMOCRATS

Great Rejoicing Amongst American Visitors Over Dix's Win in New York.

There was a marked local interest taken in yesterday's American elec-tions, especially as to New York

The influence of Roosevelt in the campaign was followed closely, as the voting was considered a test of his strength as a presidential possi-

bility in 1912. Naturally the American guests at the hotels were particularly interested in the results. Democratic sup-porters appeared to be in a majority, and when news of Dix's victory was received there was great rejoicing.
"The Republicans broke faith with the people on the tariff," said one visitor. "This told against them heavily, and it undoubtedly elected the Demo-

"In New York State, the old guard of the Republican party was intensely bitter towards Roosevelt, and voted the Democratic ticket in large numbers. They did not relish the beating he gave them at the convention, and rather than see him win, they bolted the ticket. The race-track men and Wall street interests were against Stimson, and both are powerful factors. The vote shows that in the Governor districts, where Hughes received the bulk of his support against the race-tracks, the polling was strongly Democratic."

The re-election of Governor Harmon, the Democrat, made him the most-talked-of candidate for the presidency on the Democratic side, and several of the travellers declared that Ohio would add another son to the list of presidents.

One of the most interested men in the campaign in this city was Mr. Charles W. McGuire. His brother-inlaw, Mr. Samuel R. Sells, was a candidate for Congress for the first elec-toral district of Tennessee. Word came quite early in the evening that he had been elected by a handsome majority. Mr. Sells was formerly a member of the State Legislature.

Setbacks to "T. R."

The defeat of Stimson in New York,

Senator Beveridge in Indiana, and the election of Speaker Joe Cannon are considered the most vital setbacks to Roosevelt as in all these three states he worked hard.

"Roosevelt has received a setback," said one admirer. "They have not got rid of him, however, and he will coninue to be a force in American poli-

Londoners generally appeared pleased at the defeat of the Republicans. One of the most interested was Mr. Christopher Fitzgerald, the well-known horseman, who is at present a resident in this city. Months ago he predicted a Democratic landslide, returning to New York Monday in or-der to help defeat Stimson.

## IDOC COOK'S TALE

Danish Explorer Sends Eskimos RUDDETS Story of Physician's Journey.

## NATIVES DISPLEASED

Say Cook Promised Them Big Reward, But Never Paid Them.

Chicago, Nov. 8.-Dr. Frederick A. Cook was further discredited in a special cable dispatch to the Chicago Daily News today from its correspondent in Copenhagen, Denmark. The story was the first publication of the report of Knud Rasmussen, the Danish explorer, as sent by him to his wife in Copenhagen, and now given

out by her. Contained in the story is what purports to be the statements of Cook's two Eskimo companions in the polar quest, Itukusuk and Apilak, in which they confirm Commander Peary's A. charge that Cook travelled in a circle and never even approached the pole. Rasmussen is quoted as saying he himself did not interview the men, but that their statements were taken by Rev. Gustave Olsen and Echman Rosebach, missionaries in Greenland, and at the time of securing the statements working in the country where Cook claimed to have started for the pole.

Rasmussen's Story. The dispatch says: "Already in 1909, when I was on an expedition to Greenland," writes Rasmussen, "there existed grave doubts as to whether Dr. Cook really had reached the pole, so I determined to find out from his Eskimo companions. procured their statements through

the missionaries." This is the story of the Eskimos, as given in the dispatch: "We travelled from Annatook with eight sleds in company with Dr. Cook at the first sunshine (February); from there to Ellesmere we slept only once on the way. It took four days to cross Ellesmere land. Eighteen days out one of our companions left us. We then had gone only about 12 English miles from land. The ice was fine and there was no reason to stop for anyone who wanted to go on could do On the nineteenth day, Dr. Cook

took observations with an instrument he had in his hand, and we changed our course westward. "We left here a lot of food for men and ogs, and one of us (Itukusuk) went ahead to examine the ice. reported in good shape, but Dr. Cook

said it was bad. The Journey.

"On the way we stopped at open water near the land. We stopped one day, and went over to Ringnas Island before the snow had melted (April). We had not the least fog on the at this time, the sun was just below the horizon at night. It was the month when it does not get dark (March). Later when near Axelheibergland we passed two days in a fog. "One day Apilak came on Dr. Cook sitting down and drawing a map. I

drew a map a long way out at sea where we never had been. 'We continued to shoot bear on the ice till we had enough food for the the dogs. We do not know how many nights we slept on this part of the journey. The small rivers had only begun to break when we reached

"Here, as Dr. Cook directed us, we eft our dogs behind us, although they were fat from the meat of the bears We crossed the great sound and had to push our boats along the ice.
