The nearest approach to a compromise was the offer of Lord Halifax and Canon Gore to accept the first Prayer Book of Edward VI. as an alternative in the communion service, and to dissolve the English Church Union, a High Church body which has excited the hostility of Low Churchmen. The impression is strengthened that the only effective peace conference will be an enlarged convocation, with ancient rights fully restored.

London, Nov. 29.—A despatch from Edenburgh, Orange River Colony, dated Nov. 24, says:—The Boers are most active between the railroad and Basutoland, south of Ladybrand, Thabanchu and Bloemfontein. Gen. De Wet and former President Steyn are near Dewestdorp. It is believed they are preparing for a descent on Cape Colony for recruits and supplies. As a counter move two battalions of the Guards. Grenadiers and First Coldstreams, hold all the fords of the Orange R ver from Ailwal North to the Orange River station. But small parties of mounted Boers are able to cross the river almost anywhere. The British have great need of more mounted troops, the ospture of De Wet being hopeless without them.



Bills Have Been Recovered.

Toronto, Nov. 29. - The Dominion Toronto, Nov. 29. — The Dominion Bank bills found in possession of the prisoners at Detroit, and which have been identified as part of the \$10,000 Dominion \$10 notes stolen at the time of the Napanee bank robbery, are not the lonly notes recovered since the robbery, as seems to be believed at Windsor, where Simpson and Matheis are held for examination. (I. G. Brough, general manager of the Dominion Bank, said this afternoon that of the unsigned notes \$7,000 worth of the unsigned notes \$7,000 worth have been recovered at various times nave been recovered at various times, and that only \$3,000 worth are unaccounted for, including thirty bills found at Detroit. The bank pays 20 per cent. of the face value of these bills, when recovered, as a reward, so that the Detroit officers who made the arrest instead of gatting \$2,000 which that the Detroit officers who made the arrest, instead of getting \$2,000, which was the full reward for the recovery of the \$10,000 of unsigned bills taken, will get \$60. An officer from the Dominion Bank will attend the proceedings at Windsor, on Tuesday next and identify the bills.

MORE MONEY FOUND. Windsor, Nov. 29. — The people who have been defrauded by Simpson and Matheis passing forged \$10 Dominion Bank buls on them, will get their money back. Magistrate Bartlet holds that this is one of the cases provided for by statuta whereby the money found on a prisoner may be used to make good his frauds. If the \$425 found on them by the Detroit police were not enough, there is still left \$210 found on Simpson by Jailer Sparks when the prisoners were handed over to his care to await their preliminary examination before Mag-istrate Bartlet on December 4.

Appeal on Behalf of Hon Mr. Carrow

Who has so Long Been Without a Seat in the House.

Toronto, Nov. 29 .- The West Huron

Provincial election appeal, which has been before the court since May last, will be heard by the Court of Appeal on Friday. The argument may be concluded on Saturday. The court will then, or later, say whether the judgment unsenting Hon. J. T. Garrow is "contrary to law and the evidence," as the minister without portfolio-and also without a seat-contends. There are but two quescontends. There are but two ques-tions in the case. Was Walter Vanstone Mr .Garrow's agent † Does the "saving clause" apply † That clause gives the court power to retain a member in his seat where the corgives the court power to retain a member in his seat where the corrupt acts proven are not, in the court's opinion, sufficient to affect the result of the election. Mr. Garrow says it was so in this case, and as to Vanstone, declares he was not his agent, and that the court erred in holding that he was. He further says, in his "reasons of appeal," that the evidence does not establish such agency, and none of the other persons found guilty of corrupt practices were his agents. The trial judges erred in holding that Alex. Smith, the Liberal organizer, and Hugh Guthrie committed an illegal act. That act was the payment to Hugh Guthrie, now M. P. for South Wellington, of \$15, Mr. Guthrie's travelling expenses while "stumping" in the constituency.

The Conservatives, in their reasons against the appeal, rely on the decisions of the Court of Appeal in the East Elgin and North Waterloo cases, that the corrupt acts proven were sufficient in their "nature and extent" to affect the result of the election, Mr. Garrow having had only 45 majority. There were, they say, 13 corrupt practices and one illegal act proven, and agency proven in five. They set out in two typewritten pages "facts" of Vanstone's agency. He was a delegate to Mr. Garrow's nominating convention, and an active worker.

The judges at the trial — Justice Osler and Justice Rose — in giving judgment, said that no corrupt practices had been committed "with the knowledge or consent" of the candidates, and there was no reason to believe that corrupt practices extensive. lieve that corrupt practices extensive

ly prevailed.

The decision appealed against was given eleven months after the be-ginning of the trial at Goderich, in June, 1899. The trial was concluded June, 1899. The trial was concluded here after unsuccessful efforts to locate John T. Linkluter, one of the ten reported for bribery. The others were:—"Cap." Sullivan, Walter Vanstone, John McLeod, John Rogers, Alfred Marriott, Geo. Whyte, Alex. McGregor, Leander Morton and T. Finnen.
