RUSSIA'S STRIKE FEVER.

Bloodshed and Disorder at Odessa Official List of Killed at Lodz 164 -Other Estimate 500.

St. Petersburg, June 28.—The wave of disorder reiling over Russia has appeared at Odessa, where a general strike, accompanied by bloodshed and disorders, has broken out.

A telegram to the official agency gives the number of killed and those who died at their wounds at Lodz on Friday at 164. It adds that others were killed on Saturday and Sunday and

Fired into Secialists.

Warsaw, June 28.—A secret meeting of 200 Socialists in the ferest of Zalerz, near Lodz, was surprised by Cossacks at noon yesterday. Eighteen of the Socialists were wounded and 150 arrested.

Warsaw Prisons Full.

Warsaw June 28.—All the prisons are full to overflewing, no less than 572 persons, mostly Jews, having been arrested during the past 24 hours. It is expected that a state of siege will be proclaimed as great riots are anticipated during the mobilization. The laborers on thirty-two beet root plantations in the Government of Podolia have struck, and it is feared that lives will be lost. The peasants in the Government of Kovno are forcibly occupying pasture and other lands of the proprietors of estates.



The majority of children are ambitious in this respect, and just as soon as they feel the muscles and bones strong enough to bear their weight they will surely make the effort. If urged while the bones are soft, bow legs are the re-sult.

Children who are slow to walk are generally late in teething too. Ordinarily the healthy breast fed infant will commence to cut his teeth at six months and in some cases a trifle earlier. Children brought up on patent foods are often as late as the twelfth or fourteenth month. The reason for this difference is that some of these foods do not nourish the bone matter, or, in other words, do not contain the bone making elements to such a degree as the mother's milk.—Marianna Wheeler in Harper's Bazar.

WASHING MADE EASY.

One Way to Get, Your Clothes Clean Without Rubbing Them,

It is possible, it is claimed, to wash clothes, and to wash them well at that, without rubbing, no matter how solled the garments may be. This is the method as described by one who has

Take half a bottle of household ammonia and put to it an equal part of spirits of turpentine. To a medium sized boiler of clothes you would want

sized boller of clothes you would want two or three cook spoons of this. My method of washing, with scarce-ly any labor, is as follows: Put the clothes to soak overnight or not, just as you wish. I do not. On the wash-ing morning take the clothes just as they are if you have not soaked them previously and lay them in your boiler. Cover with cold water and add half a bar of soap shaved fine, three cook spoons of the ammonia and turpentine spoons of the ammonia and turpentine preparation, according to the size of the boiler. Let them come to a boil and boil for ten or possibly fifteen minutes, then take up and rinse thoroughly and blue as usual. You will find that no rubbing is necessary. Even a very dirty binding will need scarcely a gab, I never use a washboard now. A few rubs between the handa will settle any extra soiled spots. The terrors of wash day will have departed. The clothes will wash themselves while you are at breakfast. themselves while you are at breakfast.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

The white deposit in the tops of fruit jars can be removed by boiling the tops in strong sods water.

White spots may be removed from varnished furniture by the use of a polish consisting of equal parts of alcohol, olive oil and cider vinegar.

Warm plates and dishes by pouring boiling water over them. There is not the chance of their cracking and becoming brown as when they are put in the oven.

Alcohol sometimes causes bluish stains to appear on the lamp of a chafing dish or teakettle. Simply rubbing with a cloth moistened with ammonia is said to remove the discolorations. When your tablecloths are worn out

beyond mending, cut square pieces from the best parts of them and hem neatly. They will make nice napkins for the children's school lunches or for the little ones to use at the table.

The tenor of the speeches in both houses leaves the impression that the majority of the speakers were of the opinion that a peaceful solution of the difficulty was extremely improbable.

Baron Kennedy, speaking in the Senate, said: "If the King's message expresses his opinion, he has lost two crowns instead of one."

Berlin, June 28.—Official despatches received yesterday from German Southwest Africa report heavy fighting resulting on June 17 in the defeat of the insurgent chief, Moranga.

The Germans took the native position after 14 hours' fighting, losing fifteen mcn. killed, twenty-five wounded and three missing. Major Von Rampiz was among the wounded. Capt' Setebert assumed command of the German forces and pursued Moranga to his stronghold at Narus, on the Karib River, which the Germans captured on June 19. The Hottentots fied southward.

An official denial is now published of the reports from Cape Town of the capture of Warmbad, German South-west Africa, by Hottentots.

The constant flow has resulted in the formation of a lake of oil. The oil field is located on land belonging to the Province of Quebec.

cretary of the Philadelphia section of the National Council of Jewish Women and one of the charter members of the organization, is an energetic wo man whose name stands as a synonym for the advancement of Jewish women not only in Philadelphia, but throughout America. With Mrs. S. B. Fleisher Miss Berg

brought the Jewish women, who are essentially home loving and not club loving women, into the council, which aims to promote religious, philanthrople and educational interests. To her influence more than to any other is due the fact that the council has become united with the Pennsylvania State Federation of Women's Clubs.

Yet it is not upon the council alone that Miss Berg's time, energy and money have been expended. When the moved to Philadelphia, twelve



years ago, from Savannah, Ga., she at once entered into the personal service work conducted by Rev. Dr. Joseph Krauskopf in the foreign quarters of the city and in this way learned for herself the needs of the city. Then she became interested in building up the Young Women's union, whose headquarters are at 428 Bainbridge street. As president of this union Miss Berg at present is more closely associated with its work than of any other organlzation. Ail classes of the people of the slums, from the worst boys brought before the juvenile court to the deli-cate girls whose lives are spent in cigar factories, receive her personal attention and have learned to love her. In the winter she is a frequent visitor at the Kindergarten and Day Nursery

In the summer much of her time is spent at La Grange, the beautiful va-cation home for Jewish working girls maintained by the Young Women's union at Sixty-first street and Kingsessing avenue during July and August Here working girls, without regard to sect, may spend their two weeks' va-cation and receive all the benefits of farm life. One may find Miss Berg at this home at almost any time when it is open entering heartily into the plans

for the entertainment of the girls.

Miss Berg is also second vice president of the Home of Delight and secretary of the Ladies of the United Hebrew Charities -- Philadelphia Ledger.



An attractive and serviceable settle, one that will be useful either in the house, on the lawn or on a deep porch, can be made from a discarded wooden bedstead, as shown in the illustration. On the plazza it is especially effective as a fine old fashioned settle. To construct one is easy, and any old bedstead will do—the older the better.

The headboard and posts make the back to the settle. The foot posts,



minus the board, complete the four legs. These are joined by cleats on which rests the seat. The width of the seat is made to fancy, twelve to sixteen inches. The sides of the bed-stead are fitted for the arms to the setthe, although it is not necessary to have them. The settles made from grand-mother's bed will not need staining or painting. Those of later date need a dressing to be attractive.

Odesea, June 28.—The red flag of revelution is holsted on the maisthead of the Knias Potemkine, Russia's most of the Knias Potemkine, Russia's most sowerful battleship in the Black Sea, which new lies in the hands of mutineers. The captain and most of the officers were murdered and threws everboard in the open sea and the ship is completely in the possession of the crew and a few officers who have thrown in their lot with the mutineers. The sums of the Knias Potemkine command the city and in the streets masses of striking workmen who Tuesday fied before the velleys of the troops are now inflamed by the speciacies of open reveit on board an imperial warship and are making a beld front against the military. All day long firing has been heard in many quarters of the city. A number of barricades have been erected and tumult and diserder reign.

The main squadron of the Black Sea fleet, consisting of the battleships George Pobledonosetz. Trisvistitella, Réstislav and Eksterins II., with two cruisers were expected to arrive here last night and a naval battle is in presupport.

Sailor Was Shet.

The mutiny arose from the sheeting of a sailor who was presenting, on behalf of the crew, a complaint against bad food. According to one version, this sailor objected to the quality of the soup, and was immediately shot by a mess officer. The crew then researed and selzed the ship and the officers, eight of whem were spared en condition that they would join the mutineers. The ethers were killed and their bedies thrown overboard.

The Kniaz Potemkine arrived here Tuesday night, accompanied by two torpeds boats. Early the body of the sailor was brought ashore and landed on the new mole, where it has been expected in semi-state all day. It was visited by thousands of persons, many of whom placed coins in a casket at the head of the body towards a fund to defray the cost of the funeral, which the sailors prepose to hold teday, and which the stikers will make the eccasion of a great demonstration.



St. Petersburg, June 28.—The mebblization in St. Petersburg and Moscow began at midnight yesserday. Many of the reserve men who did not respond were seized during the night at their homes. All day long men have been marched to barracks under escort. The mobilization, includes Tsarkee-Selo, Peterchof and other towns in St. Petersburg Province. The werkmen are grumbling and trouble is expected, but nothing thus far has occurred. Striy thousand men have been called to the colors.

The proposed mobilization in Russian Poland will be confined to certain country districts of the Southern Provinces of Poland, exempting Warsaw and Lods, where orders have been given to take in from the reserves the sufficient number of men to make up the regular compliment of regiments which have been reduced in strength by sending men to the Far East, thus keeping up the full strength of the regiments in Russian Poland.

The efforts of the Socialists since Priday to bring about a general strike here have falled completely. The strike however, among the coal workers in Southern Poland near the German and Austrian frontiers has again broken out and it is reported here to be serious.
