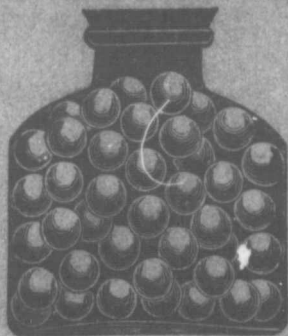

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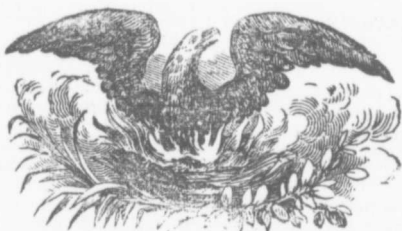

Half an ounce of powdered alum will purify twelve gallons of water.

TO IMPROVE STARCH.—To each bowl of starch add one teaspoonful of epsom salts, and dissolve in the usual way by boiling; the fabric thus starched will be considerably stiffer, besides being rendered to a certain degree fireproof.

GLAZED WHITEWASH.—Take two gallons of water, one pound and a half of rice, and one pound of moist sugar. Let the mixture boil until the rice is quite dissolved, and then thicken it to the consistence of whitewash with finely powdered lime. This whitewash has a pretty satiny look, and does nicely for the insides of bird cages, as well as for commoner purposes.

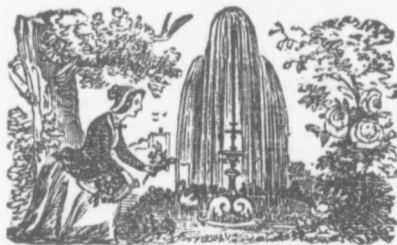

MOLASSES FRUIT CAKE.—One cup butter, two of sugar, one of molasses, one of boiling cider, or sour milk, one pint flour, one pint raisins, one grated nutmeg, half teaspoonful each of cloves and cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of soda; beat them into the molasses, and put them in, the last thing.

CHEAP FRUIT CAKE.—One cupful of sugar, one cupful of butter, half a cupful of buttermilk, three eggs, one cupful of raisins, one cupful currants, and a little soda; flour enough to make a proper thickness. Chop the raisins and currants very fine.

CHARLOTTE RUSSE.—Boil together a half a pint of milk and a quarter of a pound of sugar; then beat up the yolks of four eggs, add them to the milk, and let it come to a boil, and then take it off the fire. Have dissolved in half a pint of warm water, about a quarter of the quantity of gelatine contained in a box, and put this into the milk after it is removed from the fire; flavor it, and stir into it one and a half pints of cream which has been beaten to a froth. Set the preparation away—stirring it occasionally—and let it remain until it congeals sufficiently to bear the impression of a spoon. The previous day to making this custard, bake a sponge cake, and when ready to use it, cut off the top, carefully, and hollow out the body of the cake, and then, when the custard is sufficiently stiff, (as stated above,) put it into the cake, and place the portion which was cut off over it, as a cover. If you wish to serve it very nicely, ice it.

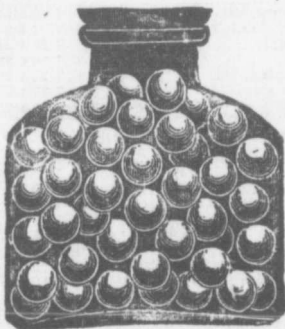
