A Great Find.

ONE OF THE GREATEST RARETIES UNEARTHED IN MONTREAL.

A remarkable find was made in Montreal on December 19th, 1898. A British Guiana 2c stamp, of the first issue, one of the rarest stamps, was purchased by a Montreal dealer.

THE STORY OF THE FIND.

Monday afternoon, December 19th, a man walked into the office of Mr. R. C. Bach and said: "Do you buy old stamps?" On being told "Yes," he produced a few old letters, saying that he had some more at home. Mr. Bach asked him how much he would take for the lot. The man said that he did not know anything about stamps, but thought that a stamp so old ought to be worth something. Anyway, would Mr. Bach

give — for them? Mr. Bach said he would, and purchased the stamps. The man left his address and promised to call with the rest. And so one of the rarest stamps in existence is now the property of Rudolph C. Bach, of Montreal.

On Wednesday, December 21st, the man called again. He had with him three letters bearing 4 stamps in all, I pair and 2 singles. Mr. Bach also purchased these. They were the 8c green British Guiana, catalogued at \$150 each. And that is the story of a great find. A photographic reproduction of the 2c stamp will be found in this number. We intended to give full particulars, but cannot do so at present, as negotiations are now in progress for the purchase of another lot of old stamps from the same party. We will, however, do so in our next number, and will also give another illustration.

THE MODEL STAMP COLLECTOR

BY RAYMOND S. BAKER.

In the world of philately there are so many different classes and divisions that it is a difficult matter to select a model that shall be suitable and applicable to all. The advanced collector, the specialist, the general and the occasional collector, each have their standard of excellence, their acme of perfection. He therefore, who would create a type meeting with universal satisfaction must needs attempt the impossible.

It may not, however, be a hopeless task to enumerate some of the leading qualities and attributes found in the model stamp collector, and even to make an analysis of the constitutent elements of the ideal. While it is true that the great majority of philatelists are anything but models, and that a continual exhorta tion and improvement is not only tire" some, but comparatively worthless, yet there is a certain amount of interest in finding out from a fellow collector his conceptions of the highest and the best even if they differ materially from our own. With this short introduction, let the model collector step forth and demonstrate his claim to this lofty title and also, with some latitude, point out the way by which others can attain to the ideal state.

He is general collector. But a large division of the body philatelic need not be offended, for the model stamp collector has a specialty, although he is not a specialist. There have been many battles fought on the question of generalism versus specialism with more glory and ultimate superiority to the latter. It is not the intention of the writer to inauguerate another contest as every species of collecting has a right to exist. We have reached an age of philatelic toleration, in which everyone collects just

what he pleases. Who then shall dare to assume the province of commending this branch of collecting and condemning that which happens to be dissimilar? But when it is necessary to choose a specimen which shall stand for the whole class, to form a model representative of the great philatelic division, to set forth a fitting example for the inspection of the entire world, then it is imperative that distinctions be made, and consequently the general collector is emphatically the result of our choice. The simple fact that he is international in his aims and collecting instincts, and is not monopolized by any single feature of the pursuit, is perhaps the strongest argument in his favour. To successfully represent a many sided hobby he is necessarily a collector of wide interests and all embracing sympathy. He admires alike the stamps of Canada and China, Japan or Borneo.

But the model stamp collector while essentially devoted to general collecting and making it his primary object, has nevertheless a specialty, and thus increases the security of his position as a satisfactory model. Specialism has secured such an extensive hold on stamp collecting that its claims cannot be overlooked, and he who would pose as a model among philatelists must devote no small amount of his time and attention to some particular phase of the pursuit.

Postage stamps only, will be found in the album of the model collector. He has nothing whatever to do with revenues and while not hostily disposed towards them, considers that they are irrevelent and beneath the dignity of postal commissions. It may be argued that the general tendencies of the model stamp collector should lead him to admit fiscals

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to his patronage, but in reply to this it can be stated that limitation must some, where he drawn, and consequently he is distinctly a *fostage* stamp collector and nothing more. Revenue stamps are all very well in their place, and their collectibility is not to be doubted. The present craze for them however, to the exclusion of good postage, is not to be commended as it lowers the standard of philately.

The model stamp collector aims at completion, although he does not strive after it to the detriment of his general collection. His stamps are especially strong in those countries which have comparatively few varities, and which are obtainable at an average cost. He keeps up with the new issues in good fashion, choosing those he deems valuable and authentic.

Above all things the perfect stamp collector is not a speculator. It is entirely contrary to his nature to assume such a character. While he finds a certain amount of pleasure in the financial side of the hobby, yet all ideas of gain and profit are wholly foreign to him. He buys stamps in the regular way, but has a tendency to see specimens before purchasing. He is not a "condition crank," but the contents of his album show areful selection. While unused specimens predominate to a certain degree, yet the cancellation and the postmark are fully in evidence. As regards neatness and attention to details, he is all that can be desired. If asked regarding his real object in collecting, the model philatelist will tell you that it is pleasure and amusement, and out of this there grows a desire to know more about his stamps and almost unconsciously he makes an exhaustive study of his specimens, and for this his fellow collectors dub him a scientist. His is a labour of love, and he confines his researches, not to any particular country, but to his whole collection.

It is in the local, state and national societies that the ideal stamp collector

is found in his glory. Not only are his dues paid regularly, but he takes an active, lively interest in everything that is going on. If new members are to be secured, if an especially laborious piece of work is to be performed, or if the welfare of the society may be served in any way, the model stamp collector is immediately to the front offering to do his utmost-and he does it. In political campaigns his voice is not heard, except in exposing some flagrant abuse; but if the obligations of office are heavy and not to be envied he does not hesitate to assume the burden. He patronizes every department of the organization and induces others to do likewise. As an investigator of fraud he is persistent and strives to become by every means a "terror to evil doers." He is the real backbone of the philatelic association and stands true to it in times of dullness and adversity.

The model stamp collector is a missionary worker. To an earnest conception of the future of philately, he adds a generous and unselfish disposition. He hides not his light under a bushel, but seeks to extend the domain of stamp collecting by acquaniting others with a fascinating and instructive recreation. It is ever a pleasure to him to show and explain his collection and any interest displayed on the part of the listener is always followed up by a direct canvas, in which the claims of stamp collecting are intelligently advocated. He has a goodly supply of duplicates and is free in their dispersion among non collecting friends. To the small boy and beginner the model Stamp collector is indeed a friend. Now matter is too trivial, no trouble too great for his consideration. Such difficulties as watermarks, shades, and surcharges are willing explained, and his guiding hand helps the tyro to surmount other stumbling blocks. The ideal collector sees the wisdom of increasing the number of philatelists and governs his actions accordingly.

All the leading periodicals devoted to the pursuit will be found on the study table of our model. They are carefully read and are nicely bound volume for volume. While possessing an extensive philatelic library he is not a literature collector in the ordinary sense of the term. He subscribes to the current magazines and buys old journals and books pertaining to the hobby, not for the mere desire to possess them, but for the laudable purpose of instruction and self-improvement. His great knowledge of stamps obtained by ceaseless study and research, and his determination to propagate a scientific philately, lead him to make valuable contributions to the literature of the day. In the philatelic press his voice is heard on the leading questions of the time. He does not pose as a regular writer, and for this reason perhaps his productions are always well written and of high

literary merit. Seclusion is not one of the characteristics of the model stamp collector but rather union and the being in touch with his fellows. Thus he is not entirely dominated by any one territorial division of philately, but is fully awake to the existence of the pursuit as a whole. He is as conversant with affairs in England and Germany as in America.

To fully describe the model stamp-collector, as he is, would require a long and elaborate work. In these pages an attempt has been made to point out a few qualifications which are deemed necessary. Much has been left unsaid, but the reader can supply requsite details from his own conception of the ideal. The present standard is not too high for emulation, however, and it is a matter of satisfaction that collectors do exist whofulfil the required conditions.

them up as monuments of bad taste -sofar as the motto is concerned.

The spring of 1898 saw a general depression in the stamp trade. Stamps

went about as low as possible. Good stamps went abegging at ridiculous prices. When, however, the Omaha's and the new war revenues were issued, interest in stamps was grearly revived, Many people bought these stamps simply as souvenirs, and then became interested in collecting. The new year opens with a bright prospect for the future of our science, and we trust it will be realized.

Of all the stamp jobbing Governments, Canada takes the cake. The 2c Imperial stamp was placed on sale in London, England, almost as early as in Canada. This has resulted in considerable loss to Canadian dealers, as it was but natural to expect that they would have received the English orders. But when every dealer can buy them in London at 2c each, nobody would bother to order from Canada.

The readers of the Montreal Philatelist can always count on the latest and best Canadian news. We have a special correspondent in Ottawa, and are often informed of new issues, etc., as soon as the daily press. Take for instance, the change of color in the new envelope. We had bought 50 at the Post Office in the morning (Jan. 13th,) and at 5 p.m, we received a telegram to the effect that they were recalled. The same news appeared in the press of January 14. These envelopes will probably be very rare, how much so, cannot be said now, as it remains to be seen whether the P.O. officials and clerks in Ottawa secured quantities in the same was as they did of the 1/2c Jubilees.

It has been announced that the money order charges between the United States and Canada have been reduced to the domestic rate. Formerly the minimum charge on a money order from the U.S. payable in Canada was Ioc., now it is only 2c. We, therefore, make a request. In sending subscriptions, please send it by money order, and deduct the cost from your remittance. In other words, send a post office money order for 23c. Canadian subscribers please remit by postal note, if possible.

REVIEW.

Lewis Robie's "Stamp Hunting" has at last put in an appearance here, and is having quite a sale in Montreal. We are afraid it would jar Bro. Robie's nerves, however, if he heard what some of those who read it say, which is, putting it mildly, "a good fish story." However, the book is quite interesting, but instead of naming the last chapter "The greatest find of all," Robie should have put it "The greatest 'sell' of all.

The Philatelic Journal of Great Britain contains the prospectus of the International Philatelic Exhibition, to be held in Manchester next July, and amongst several interesting articles, is one describing the stamp collection in the Postal Museum, at Berlin.

The Virginia Philatelist for December, presents the features of Dr. Mark W. Peyser, of the V.P.A. Mr. Patterson furnishes some pithy Canadian notes. A very descriptive article on the postage stamps of Japan, is now running in the V.P.

The Philatelic Bulletin would do good to get some other Canadian correspondents. Most of the Canadian notes in the December No. are copied from the M.P., and the writers are not gentlemanly enough to state where they get their information.

The Postal Card Reporter, published by Mr. A. Lohmeyer, 922 Gilmor st, Baltimore, is a very interesting paper for card collectors. A very good article on the "Congo Free State" is reprinted by us in this No. Card collectors can secure a copy of the P.C.R. free by addressing Mr. Lohmeyer.

"Stamp Talks" Xmas number appears neat and prompt. A full history of St. Louis stamps and several other articles, make up a good number.

Messrs. Williams & Co.'s price list has been sent us by J. F. Dodge, and is well worth reading. We would like to hear, however, from any publisher who has been paid for his ads. by Williams & Co. The Michigan Philatelic Weekly is the latest. It is very poorly printed, and as it does not even give the publisher's name or address, intending subscribers would be at a loss to whom to remit. A very curious fact is, that the review, said to be conducted by Mr. H. I. Watts, is exactly the same, word for word, as that in the "Stamp Tribune" which is conducted by Mr. Verbeck.

The Herald Exchange for January has a good article on Tasmania, by Amy L. Swift. On their editorial page, the management says they shall start a Protective Bureau, describing swindlers and their methods, etc. In the same number they run the ad of the Bohn Stamp Co., of very questionable reputation.

The Toronto Canadian Philatelic Weekly h iving died, the Berlin original and only one presents us with a so called "Midwinter Special" of 8 pages and cover of which 5 are advertisements, one devoted to themselves, one gives a review of the press of '98, while the remaining, one is the only one having a semblance of Philatelic reading matser. Why not give us some good reading instead of a picturelof Berlin's duck-pond, or reservoir, (we cant quite make out which it is) on the cover.

The Philatelic Advocate issues a fine January Number of 60 pages. G. W. Starnaman continues his interesting Pithy Philatelic Points Raymond S Baker contributes a good article on early stamp papers. Under U.S. Jottings, which by the way, are mostly a rerash of notes copied from other papers, are some senseless remarks about the M. P. which could well be applied to the party that wrote them.

A DECIDED NUISANCE.

A nuisance which is daily increasing, is the tampering with rare stamps on the covers by some Post Office officials. Only recently the writer received 2 packages from Newfoundland which had thus been tampered with. Some person had attempted to tear off the stamps and failing to do so, had spoiled them by tearing them in a dozen places. Another Montreal collector received a letter from St. Helena, but the stamps were spoilt in the same manner.

Owing to a combination of circumstances we were unable to get out a December number. Subscribers lose nothing thereby, as we enter all subscriptions for 12 numbers from date of receipt.

Some Stampagraphs

BY A. LLOYD-IONES.

Everyone is expecting something fine in the two cent commemorative stamp of Canada, and judging from descriptions they are not likely to be disappointed. Four expert engravers were brought from New York city to design the stamp, and the result if that the Postmaster-General of Canada is accused of violating the alien labour law.

As has been prophesied the U.S. revenues will appear perforated, instead of rouletted. At this writing both the two cent documentary and two cent proprietary have been reported as seen in a perforated condition.

The stamp collectors are again doomed to be disappointed in the thought Central American uniting, so there would be a less number of stamps issued by those prolific stamp issuing countries, as after a few weeks trial, they disbanded. This collapse of the "United States of Central America" after a few weeks existence, was not a surprise to those who are acquainted with the conditions in that section. While a union of them would be desirable for many reasons, it is almost impossible to accomplish because of local jealousies and conflicting ambitions. There have been seven attempts to form a union since the dissolution of the "United Provinces of Central America," in eighteen hundred and forty-eight.

Recently a letter was received from a New York clothing firm, that was franked with a two cent claret U.S., issue of Wonder where the firm came across them?

The annual report of the fourth assistant Postmaster-General of the

United States, contains some interesting statistics and reading. It gives the amount spent per capita by the people of the different states. Massachusetts leadswith \$2.30 per capita, New York is a close second with \$2.27 per capita. The lowest in the list is South Carolina, with. 25 cents per capita. Mississippi is next to the bottom with 34 cents. Among the recommendations is one that a special strong stamped ten cent envelope of superior material, be adopted in lieu of the present system of registered letters. As many losses in the mails occur on account of the poor quality of envelopes. used, an envelope of this kind will likely be issued. It also gave the size, quality and color of paper, color of stamp, and appearence of the envelope. Around the edge of the envelope was to be a red stripe. Nothing was ever seen in any stamp paper about this envelope though.

We see by a newspaper that barrels of wine, anchors, scythes, in fact all kinds: of merchandise, are conveyed by the-Swiss post office department, We would like to know if merchandise of this kind bears stamps.

A good illustration of the benefits of new issues is apparent in Canada. Since Canada bekan to issue so many stamps, the number of stamp collectors has increased rapidly, and there are now three or four new philatelic socities, and several new stamp papers, including two weeklies. The number of dealers hasalso increased. Of course the croakers. against new issues will say all this cannot be attributed to new issues, but it seems very much as if they have been extremely instrumental in helping.

NARROW ESCAPE

The Montreal Philatelist had a close call on the night of December 20th, 1808. Adjoining the printing establishment of L. E. & A. F. Waters, where the M. P. is printed, are the immense warehouses of S. Greenshields & Sons, D. McIntyre, and Jas. Leggatt. At 10 minutes to 12 o'clock passers by noticed fire in the basement of the Greenshields building. Although but a minute or so elapsed from the ringing of the alarm till the first. engine arrived, the building was blazing from top to bottom. At one time it looked as if the entire block would be burned out, but the firemen worked hard, and by 4 o'clock the fire could be said to be under c ing buildin which was walk with watertower fire brigad shell, and buildings,

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buildings o elapsed till the first as blazing te time it would be rked hard, be said to be under control. The wall of the burning building fell outward into Craig street, which was filled from sidewalk to sidewalk with debris. The "Champion" watertower, the pride of the Montreal fire brigade, was crushed like an egg shell, and hurled against the opposite buildings, a mass of twisted iron. The

firemen on the watertower had a miraculous escape from death. The big extension ladder which stood beside the watertower with 4 men on it, was twisted round and remained standing just long enough to enable the men to slide down, before it fell with a crash. The total loss was \$1,200,000.

A Loss of Revenue.

The postal officials are in trouble. The new Mulock stamps very closely resemble some of the United States issue. A short time ago a large patent medicine concern at Buffalo, N.Y., sent into Canada a number of circulars with stamped reply envelopes enclosed Through an inadvertence. United States 2 cent instead of Canadian 3-cent stamp were used. The cost of the stamps was not all lost, however. A great many of the envelopes bearing the United States stamps came back, the Canadian postal officials in their hurry not noting the slight difference in design in the stamps-the color being the same-and the United States postal revenue has been enriched by some hundreds of dollars, for which the Canadian postal service rendered value. A circular has, it is understood, been issued warning Canadian postal clerks to be careful in their scrutiny of the stamps on letters addressed to big advertising firms across the border .- " Montreal Gazette.

Private Postal Cards.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 8.—Post-master-General Smith has issued an order admitting private mailing cards authorized by the act of May 19, 1898, into the foreign mails at one cent postage each for Canada and Mexico, and two cents for all other postal union countries. This permits the sending of any kind of card, in lieu of requiring the usual postal card, provided the size is the same as the official cards.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

THE INSURANCE STAMPS OF MAURITIUS.

BY RUDOLPH C. BACH.

The Mauritius Revenues form a very pretty set, but the prettiest of all are the Insurance stamps. They are very interesting, and are, with a few exceptions, inexpensive. I will now endeavour to describe these interesting stamps, and I have added their present market value, as given to me by a correspondent in Mauritius.

The first issue of insurance stamps appeared in March 1869. It consisted of the letters INCE surcharged in black on the postage stamps. Perforated 14, and w'mk'd crown and C.C. In April, 1869, one month later, this issue was withdrawn, and in its place appeared the "Internal Revenues," surcharged INCE.

In February 1878, when the coinage was changed to cents, the Internal Revenues were surcharged INCE and the new value in cents. There are two varities of surcharge, one 9 mms high, the other 6 mms high. In June 1870, the present issue appeared. The Internal Revenues were surcharged INSURANCE, in black. These stamps are very pretty and form an attractive set.

Speaking of postal notes, they are printed on paper specially made for each value. The paper is watermarked as follows: the amount in large letters across the top, then "Canada Postal Note" in a half circle, in the centre a maple leaf, with the value in figures in the lower corners.

The new 2c Penny Postage stamp is the first tri-colored stamp Canada has issued.

Twenty and fifty cent Jubilee's are still on sale at the Montreal P.O.

The latest boom, the stamps of Great Britain.

Advice to "minor varieties" collectors. Get two or three hundred of the 2c "Imperial Penny Post" stamps. That will be enough to last you a year.

Special Delivery

Toronto, December 30, (Special)-Postmaster Patterson said to-day that the special delivery inaugurated last spring had been a success. "It is growing gradually in favor," said Mr. Patterson "and will continue to grow as its advantages become more widely known In the summer we used bicycles, and during the winter we have made use of the street cars. Both means of delivery are excellent and I have no fault to find with the trolley service. When a letter is posted in the special delivery aperture, it sets off a bell which immediately draws every clerk's attention to that spot. Consequently there can be no delay in the letter leaving the office. I think that the special delivery system is being used more in Toronto than anywhere else in Canada."

Reciprecity in Postal Cards.

Washington, D. C., December 29.— The Postmaster-General to-day signed an order accepting as private mailing cards both the Canadian mailing cards, bearing United States stamps and mailed on this side of the line, and the United States cards mailed in Canada with Canadian postage. This is a result of a reciprocal arrangement between this and the Canadian Governments, looking to avoid considerable annoyance in refusing postal transmission where travellers both ways write home on cards of their own country.

2c Lstter Rate.

A 2c letter rate has at last been adopted in Canada, It went into effect Jan'y 1st, 1899.

The P. O. officials say that there is a marked increase in first class mail matter since the adoption of the new rate.

The Post Office Department had only on hand about one month's supply of three cent stamps, and when these are exhausted, no more will be issued. It is not unlikely that four-cent stamps may be issued to meet the demand for a double rate over the ordinary domestic or Imperial rate.

New 2c Envelopes.

The Department to-day issued a new two-cent envelope. The die was procured from the famous London house of De-La-Rue & Co., the making and printing of the envelopes being executed at the Government Printing Bureau. The contract between the English company and that done by the imported contract engravers from New York is markedly in favor of the Old Country product. This despatch is probably responsible for the rumor that an entire set of stamps of the regular De-La-Rue type will be issued soon. There is hardly any chance of this being true, as the Canadian Government has a contract with the American Bank Note Co.

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A RARE ERROR.

New 2c. Envelopes were Printed in wrong Color.

Special despatch to the Montreal Philatelist.

Ottawa, January 13-The new envelope with the 2c, embossed stamp upon it has been withdrawn. The Printing Bureau has printed the stamp in purple, and as the Berne postal regulations require a domestic stamp should be red, the embossed stamp must conform to this color.

The number of these envelopes issued is very small. It is said that only Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa and Kingston had · them on sale. The supplies on the way to the other post offices were stopped, and returned. Only 247 were sold in Montreal. They were on sale two days

A STAMP DEALER'S REMINISCENCES.

WRITTEN FROM ACTUAL EXPERIENCE OR RELIABLE INFORMATION,

BY RUDOLPH C. BACH.

II .- How to gain Recruits to the Ranks of Philately.

Before commencing my story, I will say that the names given are fictitious, for the reason that the parties referred to are still collectors, residing in Montreal. The events described took place in 1890.

Three boys were seated in the study of of the eldest, Walter Tomkins, in college, Montreal. They had been engaged in a very serious discussion, and had just reached an agreement. were ardent stamp collectors, and they had decided to form a company, the object of which was "to deal in stamps for the purpose of increasing their own collections, to interest others in philately, and to aid those beginning in every way. They named it the Belmont Stamp Co. Walter Tomkins was president and manager; John Verner attended to the buying of stamps, etc., and Dick Brown had charge of the stock, and the placing of the advertisements of the company. They had bought up a large lot of stamps, and were already doing a large mail trade. The day our story opens, Walter Tomkins had called a meeting, and when the other two arrived, he addressed them as follows:

"As you know, one of the objects of our company is to promote an interest in philately, and to get as many recruits to our hobby as we can. Now, so far, we have done very little in this line, and I think that it is about time that we did something. An idea has occurred to me to-day, which I will explain to you presently. In the first place, Dick must

make up 100 packets of 50 varieties each. of common stamps. I have ordered 50 cheap albums from the News Co. at 12c. each. Now Dick and John must pretend to have an argument about some stamp. Have your argument when there is a good chance of all the fellows seeing or hearing you. Dick must shout that he knows more about stamps than you ever forgot, or something to that effect. John will answer to the contrary. Then you will make a bet that each of you can get more fellows interested in collecting than the other. Then Dick will offer a packet of stamps free. John will counter, and offer a packet and an album thrown in. Both of you must, in the meantime explain all you can about the benefits of collecting stamps, to those who accept the packets or albums. I am sure that we can interest a good many this way. What do you think?"

John and Dick both thought the plan excellent, but had some amendments to make. John said that at least 100 approval sheets of 1, 2 and 3 cent stamps should be made up first, while Dick said it would be a good plan to have a couple hundred of 5 and 10c. packets. After some discussion, this was agreed to. The three were to start at once getting the sheets and packets made up, and it was decided that the supposed argument between John and Dick should take place the following week.

CONGO FREE STATE.

This independent and neutral State which has, during the past twelve years, augmented our collections by eighteen more or less artistic Cards, is as yet in its intancy. Situated in Central Africa, it embraces most of the basin of the Congo River from which it derives its name. It was constituted and defined under this name in 1885 by the International Congo Conference at Berlin, and was placed under the Sovereignty of the King of the Belgians as an individual, who bequeahed his rights to Belgium, and she has reserved the right of annexing the State after 1900. The area is estimated at 900,000 sq. miles, making it nearly one-twelfth of all Africa.

The chief purpose of the original formation of the State was the suppression of the slave trade, and this has been fairly accomplished. As an independent sovereignty, recognized by the powers, the Congo Free State dates from 1884. Its origin is to be found in the companies formed for trade and exploration in that region. The first of these was the African International Association, founded, in 1877. The plan of this company was to send several exploring parties into the interior from the east cost, and to erect a line of stations along their routes. In 1878, after Stanley's return to Europe, another society was formed to study the country, its native tribes, its possibilities of travel and transportation, and its commercial resources. This was called the Comite d'Etudes du Haut Congo. (Committee for the Study of the Upper Congo.) It became the International Association of the Congo. In 1879 this second association sent Stanley up the great river, and

he and his men explored much more of the country, founded stations, built roads and made over 400 treaties with native chiefs.

These treaties conveyed the sovereignty which resided in the petty chiefs, contracting parties of the one part, to the International Association of the Congo, of the other. It then appealed to the powers to enable it to combine these many little sovereignties into one independent State.

The United States led the way. The Committee on Foreign Relations reported to the Forty-Eighth Congress that the acts of cession of the native chiefs were within their rights and that the Association could lawfully accept them.

This government accordingly, on April 22nd, 1884, recognized the international Association of the Congo as a Sovereign and independent power under the title of the Congo Free State.

Within a year nearly all the European powers followed the example of the

United States.

Though an independent power, this new State, from the nature of its origin, from the objects of this formation, and from its dependence upon its sponsor, Belgium, occupies a position unlike that of any other member of the family of Nations.

Its character was constituted and defined by the general act of the International Congo Conference, signed at Berlin, February 26, 1885. It was thereby declared neutral and free to the trade of all nations, though the powers reserved for twenty years the right to decide as to the freedom of imports from taxation.
