NEW MUNICIPALITIES. The towns named below are gazetted on the 5th inst. as "towns with municipalities only, or without any municipal organization." The "first division" includes Amherstburgh, Chatham, Guelph, 'second division" includes Barrie, L'Orignal, Queenston, and Sandwich.

The act for the recovery of fugitive slaves, recently passed in the United States, has caused no small excitement throughout the Union-slave masters and their agents having proceeded to the nonslaveholding States, and there, in accordance with the provisions of the new law. arrested parties whom they asserted were their property, and had (some of them many years since) escaped from servitude, and manacled and carried them off to their former bondage, now become the more unendurable from their victims having tasted the sweets of liberty. In several towns and counties, meetings of the colored population have been held, and resolutions passed declaratory of their determination to resist, with arms in their hands, every attempt of the slaveholders to enforce in their localities the provisions of this obnoxious, and-among a people who so proudly vaunt their liberty-most inconsistent and anomalous measure, the

existence of which will in future times be deemed a libel of the historian. The new Act, obtained by the slaveholding States as a sort of compensation for the admission of California into the nion without any conditions in favor of slavery, was hailed by them as no small boon; it is not unlikely, however, that its enforcement will at length awaken the people of the northern States to a sense of the sin and shame of this unnatural traffic. and arouse them to a determination to rid their country of a system the most impious and aborrent the world has ever witnessed. As this law is exceedingly pe-

nal, we give its principal features :-The person having a power of attorney may pursue and reclaim the party charged to be a slave, either by procuring a warrant from a Judge or Commissioner of the United States Court, or by seizing and arresting him, where the same ca be done without process, and taking him before said Judge or Commissioner, &c.

Any person who shall obstruct the arrest, or shall rescue, or attempt to rescue, or shall aid or abet such alleged slave, directly or indirectly, to escape, or shall harbor or conceal such slave, shall for either of said offences be subjected to a fine not exceeding \$1,000 and imprisonment not exceeding six months, and in the event of escape shall forfeit, moreover, on a cival process, the sum of \$1,000 as the value of said slave.

In no trial or hearing under this act shall the testimony of such alleged fugitive be admitted in
