Al-though the figure is not official, The Leader has good au-

Duke of the Abruzzi Encounters Relic
Hunters.
NEW YORK, May 27.—Notwith-
standing the recent polite denials of
the Italian embassy that the Duke of
the Abruzzi was robbed on board his
ship, the Varese, at Hampton Roads,
the fact remains that the thieves de-
sploited the officers' quarters of all

The Duke will appear in Philadelphia
tomorrow in a uniform that has

According to the story told at the

A great many of the articles in the
Duke's room were of solid gold, and
many bore the royal seal.

of gold buttons and gold braid.
Steerage Rates to Be Raised

NEW YORK, May 27.—The im-
migrant faces an increase in steer-
age rates from Europe within six
weeks when the United States law
increasing the head tax from \$2 to
\$4 for every alien entering the country
goes into effect. While the steam-
ship companies have always added
the head tax to the cost of transporta-
tion, they have avoided criticism
and complaint by materially improv-
ing steerage service and conditions.

CASE GO TO BUILD GREAT FACTORIES IS GREASED COST PLEA OF BELL CO.

\$25,000,000 BOND ISSUE TO BUILD AT FORT WILLIAM AND IN RUSSIA

FORT WILLIAM, ONT., May 27.—
English financial papers of late re-
port that the J. I. Case Co. of Racine,
Wis., have issued bonds for five mil-
lion dollars to build factories at
William, Ont., and St. Petersburg,
Russia. The Case Co. owns lot eleva-
tion in the township of Neeshing, as con-
taining 182 acres, which it purchased
of Col. Ray, of Fort Arthur three
years ago. The company has never
given any intimation that it intend-
ed to build, and has always parried
every endeavor to obtain information
on that point. The site has a front-
age on the Kam River, and is con-
sidered an ideal location for a large
factory, as it is touched by all the
transcontinental railroads.

CRIME SHOWS SCIENCE

FRANCE MAY USE MURDERERS FOR MEDICAL EXPERIMENTS

PARIS, May 22.—Patour's famous remark made twenty years ago when experimenting with the pneumatics that if he were king, emperor or president of the republic he would relieve prisoners condemned to death on condition that they underwent inoculation tests has been revived this week by a Parisian doctor, who sees in the idea the solution of the problem of what to do with the murderers.

The situation in France in this respect is a peculiar one. Since July, 1905, to the present time nearly thirty murderers in France and the colonies have been condemned to death and none executed. It is generally supposed the sentences were not carried out because the budget commission of the chamber of deputies has drawn its salary out of the appropriation for the working of the guillotine, but this is not the cause, as the deputies later voted the usual funds on the ground that the penal code could not be altered by a budgetary vote. M. de Paris consequently has drawn his salary as one criminal after another benefiting by the presidential prerogative of mercy. Though several times recently passed resolutions in favor of the maintenance of capital punishment.

Throwing one arm around her neck and grasping one of her wrists with the other hand, Carroll gave a shout of joy.

Aylesworth, Minister of Justice in Canada, notification that the clause in the criminal code dealing with houses of ill-fame had been amended. The clause now reads as follows: "A common bawdy house is a house, room, or set of rooms, or place of any kind kept for purposes of prostitution, or occupied or resorted to by one or more persons for such purposes."

A RISE FOR I. C. R. MEN

\$150,000 To Go To Increasing Pay of Employees

OTTAWA, May 27.—The department of Railways has \$150,000 which was voted last session to gladden the hearts of some employees on the Intercolonial Railway who have not yet received increases in their pay during the past two or three years. Among those who will share in this increase are certain classes of mechanics, clerks, mechanics and carmen. The Deputy Minister of Railways has not yet worked out the schedule. As soon as this is done the money will be paid out, and it may be taken for granted that the distribution will be made as fairly as it is possible to do it.

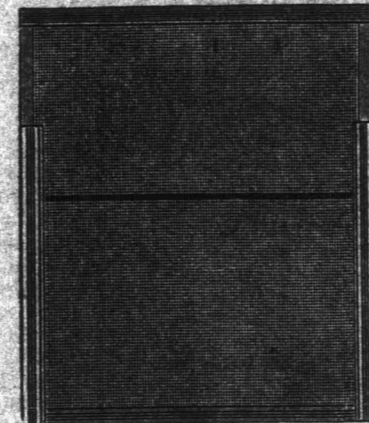
