First, the hides go to the "beam-house; these are "unhaired," "'lined, and bated," for the removal of grease and all other kinds of foreign substances, at the same time being rendered perfectly receptive to the influence of tannic acid.

After leaving the tanning vats, the hides which have now become leather, meet their first introduction to machinery, all the processos up to this point having been conducted entirely by hand. The first machine to make its appearance is the splitting machine. Ac ording to that decision the hide is divided laterally into the proper number of "cuts," or sileses, of different thickness. Each of these different parts is kept with others of the same grade until the process is finished. They are text retained and bleached, and go through softening process of japanning. This is a distinctive trade by itself, and necessitates the close attention to minor details. The imperative use of the very purest oil, its manufacture into different compositions, and the application of these to the leather in variable proportions for different grades of the work, are faciors which determine the ultimate quality of the finished product.

A True Fish Story.

Frank Pierce, a tinsmith, while angling last week in the Delaware, near Stroudsburg, was surprised to see a fish setze a fly and sall up into the air with it. trick, to be cured by punishment, is the scientific opinion of the famous Frenchman, Dr. Edgar Berillon; who was at one time associated with Charcot and is at present secretary of the French society of Hypnology and inspector of stake lunatic asylums. Berillon names this so-called disease "anarchophagie," which at once gives an air of importance to the discussion, and he states, as the results of nine years' study and experimenting, that it is an unerring sign of incipient degeneration of the nervous system. He holds that a child displaying any tendency toward nalibiting, should at once be put under a physician's care, instead of being teased and punished.

The habit is more prevalent among girls than boys, and is probably due to the fact—although this is not brought out in Berillon's recent papers—that boys are permitted to live healthler lives, with more exercise and out-of-door sports. In the report, made from an examination of one of the average mixed schools in Paris, the percentage of nall-biters among the girls was found to be fifty-two, while among the boys it was only twenty. This habit was usually observed among the poorer students. Several instructors in the Paris schools for manual trai ing have pronounced the habitual nall-biters hardest to teach, and often totally unfit for technical education. On rare occasions nall-biting children were found to be "infant prodgics," but with a superficial elevences, invariably outgrown. Although the disease is frequently inherited, it is more often the result of imitation, which practically renders it contagious. In English schools the habit is considered so harmful and so easily contracted that the nall-biting children are isolated and taught in separate classes, but that the habit emands careful and intelligent treatment cannot be doubted, for not only is it on the increase, but in many cases it is accompanied in the second and third generations by marked signs of physical degeneration.

Professor Dewar, the British "wisard of extreme cold," has obtained essuits in his experiments which have been referred to by the journals of chemistry as "wonders of the ninetcenth century." The professor occupies the chair of chemistry in the British Royal Institute, and has been experimenting on the results of evaporation in producing extreme cold since about 1892.

1892. In the latter half of 1898 he succeeded in In the latter half of 1898 he succeeded in obtaining a temperature of \$10 degrees below zero on the centigrade scale, which is equal to 346 degrees of the Fahrenheit instrument. In making these curious experiments he uses a double compartment air compressor. Into the outer chamber of this apparatus he introduces liquid nitrous exide through a pipe, the liquid entering the machine under a pressure of 1,400 pounds to the square inch. The nitrous oxide evaporates almost instantly, and, as a result, the temperature of the air surrounding the inner chamber is quicky reduced to 130 degrees below Fahrenheit's zero. The inner chamber, being thus cooled, is almost instantly made the receptacle of liquid ethylene, which is introduced by means of a pipe, as was the nitrous oxide means of a pipe, as was the nitrous oxidinto the outer chamber. THE SMALLEST REPUBLIC OF ALL.

Távalora Has a Population of 55 and the Women Have the Right to Vote.

Among the tiny republics of the world perhaps the tiniest of all, in point of population, is the Republic of Tavalora, on the island of that name, about eight miles from Sardinia. It has a population of fifty-five, and is less than two miles in length.

Sovereignty was accorded in 1836 by King Charles Albert to the head of the Bartoleon family, who was given the title of King. For nearly fifty years this monarch—Paul I. was hisname—ruled his interoscopic kingdom with skill and judgment, and enjoyed peace with all his neighbors. He died May 20, 1882, after expressing the desire to his sorrowing relatives that none of them should succeed him. He strongly wished his subjects to govern themselves. No pretender arcse, and for nearly four years the simple inhabitants got along comfortably without any hand at the heim of their ship of state. But in 1866, after lengthy discussions, in which the Tavaloran women took a prominent part, a republic was proclaimed. a prominent part, a republic was pro-claimed.
