## Dr. Sawyer's Lecture.

The lecture delivered in College Hall on Friday evening last in connection with the formal opening of the College was well attended and highly appreciated. The subject was, "In the Gallery, or a View of the Past." Dr. Sawyer passed in review the last sixty years, referring to looks of various kinds as illustrative of the life of the past in relation to the life of the present. He spoke of social life and seemed to consider it of a higher order in some respects than that of the present. The books read in families and with which it was bad form not to be familiar were of a higher order than those now popular. Milton, Dickens, Scott, Hawthorne were read by the people, and even Cowper, around an open fire. Burns and Byron were opened. Now there are so many diversions that serious reading is not so popular.

In university books, also, there has been a revolution. The larger range of studies has narrowed the range of each, and new books are made to suit the needs.

In science there has been extensive research and a great change in the bearing of scientific thought on religious questions. Yet through it all Dr. Sawyer believes there has been no loss to religion. The bible still leads as the best selling book.

The men of one age make the books of that age, and while these represent the thought of that time they are not permanent. The certainties of science of one age are considered nonsense by the next, and so on from generation to generation. We must accept, then, certainties, but must also be ready to drop them for the new certainties that will surely be set forth. Amid all the changes, however, we abide, and the Divine Being changes not.

Wolfville people are always glad to hear Dr. Sawyer. For many years he was our foremost citizen, and he retains the confidence and respect of the people as he possessed it when his duties gave the citizens the privilege of hearing him more frequently. His address on Friday evening was in form, matter and delivery worthy of his reputation as a man of learning, ability and wide culture.

## Dr. Sawyer's Lecture.

The lecture delivered in College Hall on Friday evening last in connection with the formal opening of the College was well attended and highly appreciated. The subject was, "In the Gallery, or a View of the Past." Dr. Sawyer passed in review the last sixty years, referring to looks of various kinds as illustrative of the life of the past in relation to the life of the present. He spoke of social life and seemed to consider it of a higher order in some respects than that of the present. The books read in families and with which it was bad form not to be familiar were of a higher order than those now popular. Milton, Dickens, Scott, Hawthorne were read by the people, and even Cowper, around an open fire. Burns and Byron were opened. Now there are so many diversions that serious reading is not so popular.

In university books, also, there has been a revolution. The larger range of studies has narrowed the range of each, and new books are made to suit the needs.

In science there has been extensive research and a great change in the bearing of scientific thought on religious questions. Yet through it all Dr. Sawyer believes there has been no loss to religion. The bible still leads as the best selling book.

The men of one age make the books of that age, and while these represent the thought of that time they are not permanent. The certainties of science of one age are considered nonsense by the next, and so on from generation to generation. We must accept, then, certainties, but must also be ready to drop them for the new certainties that will surely be set forth. Amid all the changes, however, we abide, and the Divine Being changes not.

Wolfville people are always glad to hear Dr. Sawyer. For many years he was our foremost citizen, and he retains the confidence and respect of the people as he possessed it when his duties gave the citizens the privilege of hearing him more frequently. His address on Friday evening was in form, matter and delivery worthy of his reputation as a man of learning, ability and wide culture.

**JUVENILE SMOKING.** Last Thursday a bill was brought into Parliament by Mr. Richard Rigg, M. P., against juvenile smoking. It is intended to carry out one of the recent recommendations of the Select Committee on Physical Deterioration and proposes that any young person under 16 years of age who is found smoking shall be liable to a penalty of ten shillings for each offence—the fine to be recoverable through the parents—and that anyone selling tobacco to a child shall be liable to a fine of 20s. for the first offence, and 40s. for the second offence. There is no prospect of any legislation on the subject this session, but the bill in printed form was issued on Monday. It is supported by Col. Balfour, Mr. Alister, Mr. Cathcart-Watson, Dr. Macnamara, and Mr. Lambert. The intention is to circulate it, and re-introduce it next year.

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
