Moncton Notes. The I. C. R. winter time table went into effect today. The N. B. Telephone Co. are erecting their poles here. Schr. Lutz Price brought a load of plaster from Hillsboro last week. F. A. McCully, Barrister, and John T. Hawke, Editor of the "Advertiser" have been ill with the Typhoid Fever are recovering. We have lately had another change in our night police. Messrs Foster & Reed have both left and Messrs. Reed & McKennie fill the positions. We had some very cold weather here last week for the time of year. Tuesday night the Thermometer dropped to 9 degrees above zero, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday remaining about the same. Sunday cold and windy, and snow to the amount of about 2 inches fell through the night followed by rain which is still falling making it very disagreeable. A few months ago the Town Council decided to abolish gas for street lighting and to use the Electric light in its place as the contract with The Moncton Gas Light & Water Company would expire Nov. 1st. The Council advertised for tenders for supplying Hydrants would expire the same date and tenders were called for 50 Hydrants. At the time for opening the tenders only one had been received, that of the Moncton Gas Light & Water Company, which agreed to supply 30 electric lights, 2080 sandpaper, at \$180 each per year, and 50 Hydrants at \$50 each per year, also exemption from taxation for the term of the contract. But as the tender was beyond all reasonable prices it was not accepted. Some people began to think the Town should put in its own electric light plant and have its own light but this did not succeed. Two or three meetings of electors have been held and a great deal of feeling in the press and among citizens, councillors and company has taken place. Before an agreement could be reached the Company made an offer somewhat lower than the contract, but it was not accepted. So after some time it was made another offer which has at last been accepted. The offer agrees to furnish 30 electric lights 1200 candle power at \$100 each per year and 50 Hydrants at \$50 each per year and no exemption from taxation, the term of contract to be five years. The lights speak of above will be placed at suitable positions over the Town and will be a decided improvement to the gas. The Temperance Committee who have had the business of enforcing the Scott Act here have been bought out by the rum-sellers and have agreed to discontinue all Scott Act cases now commenced and to make no more prosecutions. The rum-sellers have had the money being paid to Grant this afternoon. Now have these gentlemen who oppose this committee been trying to suppress the evil for the sake of Christianity or have they been trying to make money?—(they having got the fines). It looks very plain that they are having been trying to do the latter and now having got a little in debt are willing to let rum be sold without trying to stop it for a small sum of money. The Town Council will probably enforce the act in the future. Nov. 26, 1888.
