

Expect Election In Manitoba Very Soon

Winnipeg, April 13-Possibilities or a general election in Manitoba during the coming summer were nev er brighter than today, says the Winnineg Free Press this afternoon in a news story on the authority of "general opinion at the parliament buildings." The division in the legislature yesterday when by the deciding vote of the Speaker, the government was saved from defeat on a resolution which called for its resignation and the reconstruction of the Cabinet to represent all groups, is said to have "placed the government in the position where it feels that an appeal to the people is almost imminent."

An Appreciation Of A. Bonar Law

(By an Old Parliamentary Friend in • the London Times)

Seldom in the history of Parlia ment, and never within the recollec tion of the present House of Com mons, has there been witnessed so moving a spectacle as that which took place when the Prime Minister announced the resignation of Mr Bonar Law. Members appeared to find it difficult to believe that the familiar figure who had won his way into the respect and affection of every one had vanished, possibly for ever, certainly for a considerable time.


Mr. Bonar Law has none of the at tributes of genius. He has the outward and visible sign of his fellow man, the inward and invisible signs of real statesmanship, coupled with a high sense of duty to his country. When the skein of debat, f. cane tan gled it was he who unravelled the threads. He was essentially a House of Commons man, but that is not all. In the Council Chamber his place may

be best summed up in the words of a distinguished friend with whom he loss which is felt by every member, sometimes differed: "The annoying the predominant feeling is one of thing about Bonar is that he is usual. thankfulness that Mr. Bonar Law has ly right." Of necessity his best work was

negative in character. It was rather those things which he prevented being done than those which he did for which the country must be grateful. This fact, coupled with an innate dread of publicity, has kept him out of the limelight. The least masterful of men, his mastery of debate and of the House of Commons sprang from his perfect hands and innate sympathy with the horse he rode, and, above all things, from his unerring judge ment.

WAR SERVICES

To his services the country durng the war history will, no doubt, give their true value. The letter which, in conjunction with Lord Lansdowne, he wrote without consultation with his colleagues on August 2, 1914, to Mr. Asquith will always remain a landmark in British history. On the formation of the first Coalition, although he had not before oc cupied one of the high offices of State, he rose to the full height of his responsibility, and it is an open secret that it was due largely to his unerring instinct and to the energy with which he pursued it that the bandonment of the tragic enterprise in Gallipoli was due. On the fall of the first Coalition he had the courage to refuse the highest office in the State because he thought that the present Prime Minister possessed in a higher degree than he that peculiar magnetic quality which is essential to a democratic leader in a time of national crisis. On the formation of the second Coalition , the burden which was placed on his shoulders was almost superhuman and for the two last and most critical years of the war he bore it uncom plainly and untiringly. His first duty on becoming Chancellor of the Exchequer was the raising of the Victory Loan of over £1,000,000,000. It was during this time that he suf fered the loss in action of his eldest son, whose younger brother had fallen at Gaza twelve months before. It was no unusual occurrence for Mr. Bonar Law to be working in the early hours of the morning in his room long after the House had risen. Perhaps an idea of the strain of his work can best be given by relating that after a particularly long and arduous day in Parliament, followed next morning by a spell of official work in Downing Street he motored to Hendon, flew to Paris by aeroplane. and attended the same afternoon an Inter-Allied conference by no means as a spectator, and the next day flew back in time to take his place as Leader of the House of Commons. After the Armistice came the Peace Conference in Paris, on which he
