THE
MYSTERY OF KILLARD.

PART I.—THE RACE OF LANE.
CHAPTER V.
A CHRISTIAN HERO.
At a time when the popular faith
of Ireland was under severe ban
and suffered persecution, a Bishop of
the Catholic Church, driven from his
diocese in the midland, sought security
in Clare, and subsequently was
obliged to retire to a place of obscurity;
thus he came to a small island,
on which he built a hut. Here he
dwelt for many years, his pursuers
believing him dead, or fled beyond
the seas into France. But his life was
not one of idleness; he soon made
his name well known among the
rude fishermen of the coast, and
drew them around him, ministering
to them, and affording them medical
aid, for he was learned in the healing
art as practised at that time. He
lived to extreme old age, and after
his death the island was regarded
almost as sacred by the people who
knew his history, and in memory of
the exile to whom it had afforded a
shelter they called it the Bishop's
Island, which name it retains to this
day.
The coast of Clare is bold, barren
and desolate in the neighbourhood of
Killard. Nothing but heroic cliffs
could withstand the unimpeded fury
of the Atlantic. For miles inland
there is no vegetation on the land but
unprofitable moss-like grass. No
tree, or shrub, or plant rises to break
the dull monotony of plain. The
coast line is ragged, and torn into
huge chasms by the sea. At Killard
the cliffs rise to a hundred and fifty
feet sheer out of the water. The
village is built around a little bay,
whose waters are secured against the
violence of the exterior billows by a
chain of rocks running across the
mouth of the bay, and leaving two
narrow openings through which boats
may pass.
Although the rocks and cliffs now
forming the sea are extremely hard
and durable, there must have been
soft figures in them ages ago, for the
whole coast is pierced with caves and
chloven into abrupt chasms. These
caves vary in kind and size. Some
are mere shafts reaching to no considerable
distance. Others vast and
intricate labyrinths, with miles of
chambers, into whose gloomy depths
the murmur of the wild storm
never penetrates, whose black,
mysterious waters are never stirred by
a ripple from the ocean. Frequently
the roofs reach to prodigious heights,
looming upward, it is impossible
to believe the cliffs can afford roofs for
such unexplored vaults of darkness.
In many cases the caverns are through
the solid rock, until the roofs fall in
leaving a network of dangerous
passages exposed. This last phenomenon
has given birth to a number
of small pillar-like islands, which rise
from the shallow depths of the sea,
and have summits level with the
surrounding cliffs. Of such origin is
the Bishop's Island.

circular edge roughly corresponds to
the solid rock, until the roofs fall in
leaving a network of dangerous
passages exposed. This last phenomenon
has given birth to a number
of small pillar-like islands, which rise
from the shallow depths of the sea,
and have summits level with the
surrounding cliffs. Of such origin is
the Bishop's Island.

Clomore, the town in which
the village sold its fish, went from
the centre of the latter at right angles
to the coast line of the bay.
In the meantime Edward Martin
had taken into the employment
of Cantillon, and now fished in one of
the latter's boats. The young man
stood at the end of the village fort
from Cantillon's house, that is to say,
at the other side of the little bay.
He had made a most favorable im-
pression on his master. The elder
man had in him a resolute spirit and

great outward world of Clomore.
