fwenty-Five Buyers are Sentenced, With Their Fines, to Five Years' Disfranchisement,

West Union, Ohio, Jan. 1 .- For the first time since the civil war, there is a county in the United States that has to active politicians. This county is Adams, along the southern border of Ohio, and just across the river from Kentucky. The political workers have pleaded guilty of vote buying and have been fined and disfranchised for the next five years. There are about twenty-five of these men, equaly divided among the two parties. The number of men indicted by the

grand jury for selling their votes passed the 1,200 mark, and to-morrow morning, according to Mr. Shoemaker, will pass the 1,300 point.
