Civic Matters.

Now that the City Council has suitably housed itself and its officials and has received a suitable send-off from His Honour the Administrator, and comfortable words from the Premier, the Attorney General, the ex-Attorney General and the President of the Board of Trade, the public may expect renewed attention to the great problems which confront the city and which were dilated upon yesterday. As the Premier reminded the assembly, and the words struck home to many of his Tory colleagues, the days of the Tory rule, the rule of the few against the many, are over, and the city rulers are the chosen of the many. Earnest attention is therefore expected to the problem of clean streets, healthy houses, plentiful water, disposal of sewerage, and more elbow room for children at play. We have a Mayor, honest and earnest in his efforts, backed up by a body of Councillors desirous of doing their duty to the public, but cribbed, confined and embarrassed by a lack of funds to undertake what is most required. The financial side of city administration appears to be the key to rest, and when they have tackled that and convinced the public that money must be forthcoming from economy in administration and increased civic taxation things tangible and needed can be attempted. Till then we must be contented with such earnest efforts as cleanliness as we see on Water Street, and such extensions of water pipes and sewerage as having been going on. But the talk of better housing will be still a reform of the distant future.

The City Hall.

The old Scamen's Home has been transformed and made as modern and as suitable to the requirements of civic administration. With the basement there are five flats. In the basement is the heating apparatus, with the water pipes well protected from frost. The ground floor from Duckworth Street, contains the entrance, the general offices, the collectors', accountants' and the Secretary-Treasurer's quarters are to be found here. On the third floor can be seen the Mayor's office, a waiting room and the Council Chamber which is adorned by the City Coat of Arms. On the third floor will be found the offices of Engineer, Assistant Engineer, and of the Sanitary, Water, Plumbing and other inspectors. On the top floor the janitor has his quarters.

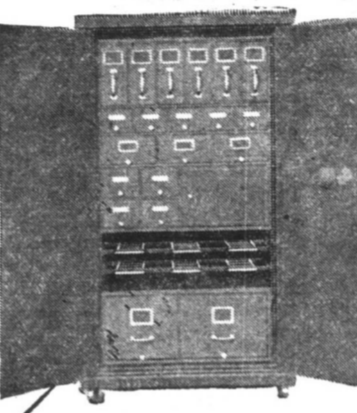

Saved From Drowning by J. J. Brown of Torbay.
"Michael Prendergast, of Fall River, a fisherman, who is 56 years of age, fell over at Pinniger & Manchester's wharf early yesterday afternoon and had a narrow escape from losing his life. He lost his balance and fell backward into the water on the south side of the wharf about 50 feet from any boat moored. John J. Brown, a fisherman, attached to the fishing steamer Vigilant, jumped into a boat, after calling for assistance and threw a line to the man, who had sunken twice.
Many men heard Brown's cry and fully 100 were on the spot in five minutes, coming from at least 10 fishing steamers which were moored nearby. Brown succeeded in putting the line about Prendergast's shoulders and hauling him into the dory in which he had jumped when he saw the man fall overboard.
Prendergast was finally put aboard the Vigilant from whence he was put on shore and resuscitated. He was very weak from exhaustion and the salt water he had swallowed, also from a dislocated shoulder which he received in his fall from the dock. No doctor was needed to revive him. The fingers of a fisherman slipped his shoulder in place, and by 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon he was walking up Thames Street as though he had never fallen overboard in his life.
The men who answered the "man overboard" cry were from the Vigilant, Falcott, W. C. Wells, Sterling, Rover, J. S. Willard, Walter Adams, George Hudson, E. J. Cord, Raymond J. Anderton and the Susquehanna."
The above cutting is from a Newport, Rhode Island, paper of recent date. Mr. J. J. Brown is a Torbay man, who goes to Newport, Rhode Island, every spring fishing. We congratulate Mr. Brown on his promptness and success in the performance of a worthy deed. His father lives at Torbay.

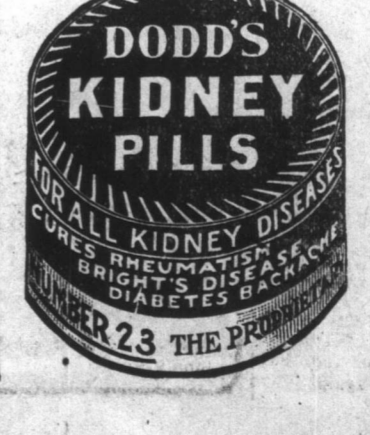

City Hall Opened By His Excellency Sir W. H. Horwood.

The new City Hall on Duckworth Street, formerly the Seamen's Home, was opened formally at 3 p.m. yesterday by the Deputy Governor, Sir W. Horwood in presence of a large gathering of citizens. Amongst them were R. Hon. Sir E. J. Morris, Hon. D. Merison, Hon. W. C. Job, Hon. R. Watson, Hon. D. J. Greene, Hon. J. D. Egan, Hon. M. G. Winter, Hon. Geo. Siskion, Lady Horwood, Lady Morris, Mrs. Morrison, Mrs. Job, Mrs. J. M. Kent, Mrs. H. Y. Mott, Mrs. Channing, Mrs. Mullaly, ex-Councillors M. Power, J. R. Bennett, John Cowan, S. G. Collier, T. M. White, J. M. Kent, H. Y. Mott, J. W. Withers, Secretary Carter and Mayor Ellis and the sitting Councillors—J. T. Martin, J. F. Channing, J. Coaker, M. Myrick, J. J. Mullaly and C. W. Ryan.

Mayor Ellis addressed the gathering first and extended a welcome to all present. He dwelt on the advantages that the Council would now enjoy in having their own home in which to transact the business of the city. He believed that a city's prosperity and the intelligence and enterprise of its people were best advertised by the existence of an up-to-date City Hall. He asked the good will of the people of St. John's and also their co-operation in civic affairs in order that the Council may be able to carry out its schemes for the improvement of the city.

Sir William Horwood on being handed the key formally unlocked the door of the building. He delivered a short but most interesting address, beginning by thanking the Council for the privilege of participating in such an important function. It is the first time in the history of the city that people could boast of having a hall of their own for civic business. He felt that the work of the Councilors was not appreciated as it should be. The City Councilors laboured under great difficulties and had really made great progress. The citizens of St. John's had not been brought up to exercise that interest in city affairs so noticeable in other countries. Councils cannot do much without the help of the people. In all new cities of the West the people quite willingly paid the taxes knowing that they would get back good value in improvements. He would like to see the most capable citizens taking part in civic government, men who would be all the time working for more improvements in municipal affairs. He hoped that the City of St. John's would now advance along the road to civic reform and would become a source of pride to all citizens.

Lady Horwood then unfolded the flag and hoisted it aloft while the gathering gave three cheers.

The Premier next addressed the assemblage. The hall was a new departure in civic life. The Council would now be less cramped for space in the administration of affairs and better things could be looked for from the building.

Councillors and officials. The Council dates from 1888, when the first attempt was made at Municipal reform. In the eighties civic rule was in the hands of the few, now it was in the hands of the many. Many improvements had already been made, more would be made. The East End park had been beautified and so had the West End park; water and sewerage had been extended largely through the city. The housing of the poor, the improvement of public health, and the making and upkeep of good roads would contribute largely to the prosperity and happiness of the people.

Mr. J. M. Kent, K.C., senior member for St. John's East, spoke next and expressed his pleasure at the privilege of taking part in the ceremony of opening the new City Hall. The acquisition of the building and its equipment as a City Hall he looked upon as a forward step in civic life. He spoke of the duties of citizens and council, and hoped that both would realize their responsibilities. Intelligent co-operation would go far in the attempt to make a city beautiful, healthy and comfortable. There were many opportunities for effort in the way of providing better homes for the people; playgrounds for the children, and generally for the betterment of the city and its people.

Hon. D. Morrison followed and spoke as one who had served on the Council Board of this his birthplace. The struggle for betterment had been long, but now it might be said the Council was trying to get the city clean. He commended the acquisition of the City Hall as a right step. He made reference to housing and absent landlords.

Hon. W. C. Job, President of the Board of Trade, extended congratulations to the Council on entering the new home. It is true that many merchants in the old days looked with suspicion on the incorporation of a Municipal Council, but experience had shown that they were not inclined to enter upon criticism or even suggestion generally, he could not help stating that he would like to see the dredging of the harbour begun at an early date and brought to a satisfactory completion. He was strict in the enforcement of the law relating to the erection of brick and stone buildings along the waterfront, and eliminate all wooden structures and shacks, which were a menace to the city and kept up insurance rates. The beautification of the city by the planting of trees found an ardent advocate in Mr. Job.

The Deputy Mayor, Mr. Martin, proposed a vote of thanks to The Administrator which was seconded by Mr. John Cowan, the ex-Councillor.

Cheers were then given and the speeches brought to a conclusion by the singing of the National Anthem and an inspection of the new Home of the Council.

Big Muster of Peers.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The Parliament Bill, bereft of the 17 bills added by the peers when it was last in their hands, reappeared in the House of Lords yesterday, but whether it is to be a farewell or only a penultimate appearance cannot be foretold with certainty. The counting of heads of the different factions of "die hards," "surrenderers" and "ministerialists," has shown the possibility of a vote so close that people hesitate to say whether the Government bill will be defeated. Should the bill be thrown out, its next coming into the upper chamber would be accompanied by a battalion of new barons, strong enough to swamp any combination of Unionists. The House was crowded with the biggest muster of peers since the rejection of the Home Rule Bill in 1883. Lord Morley is supported by the largest force of radical peers ever gathered together in the memory of the oldest member. The debate will be continued till to-day.

Dwellings in Danger.

Special to Evening Telegram. ST. GEORGE'S, Aug. 9. There are forest fires raging east and west of St. George's; several houses are in danger and people are moving out their household effects.

Peace Treaties Under Fire.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day. The arbitration treaties with Britain and France are being earnestly defended by Secretary of State Knox before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. He undertook to show especially that the agreements have robbed the Senate of none of its constitutional privileges. The opposition to the treaties, based on the contention that the Monroe doctrine would be virtually abrogated, so far as Britain and France are concerned, is not taken seriously by President Taft and Secretary Knox.

Mine Strike Over.

Special Evening Telegram. CHICAGO, To-Day. Two thousand workers in the Indiana coal mines, who have been on strike for the past two months, have now resumed work after a settlement of the disputes.

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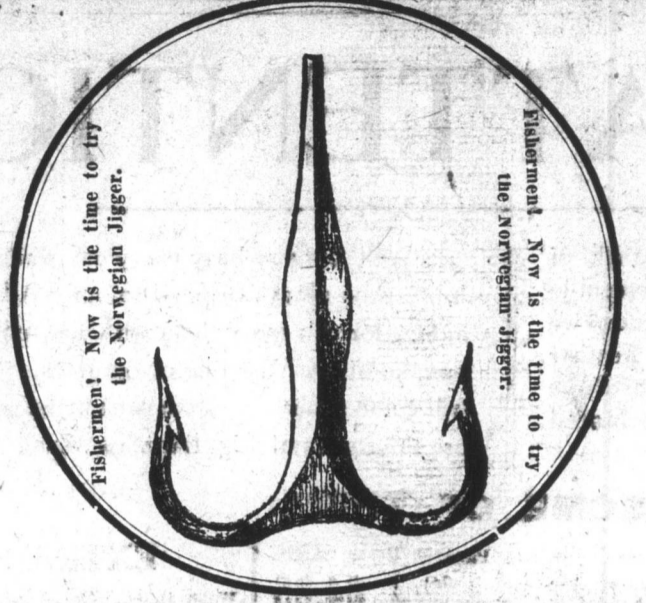

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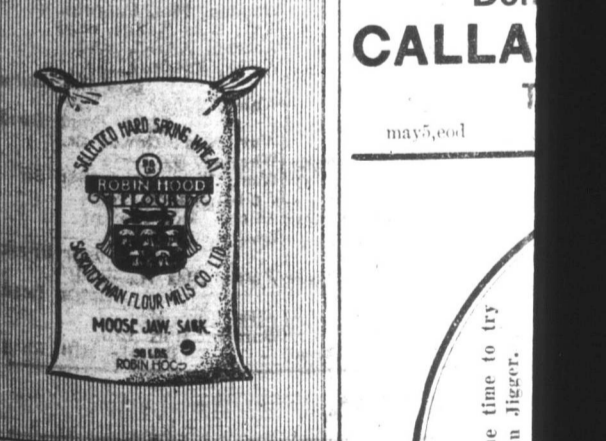
