We are without doubt being favoured by exceptionally beautiful weather. The air is most agreeable and the temperature pleasantly warm. The weather is as near ideal as it well can be. If the "spell" will last to take us over the Regatta everybody will be well pleased.

This morning the city resounded with guns in welcome of the large body of delegates from North America, who arrived in town at 10 o'clock via Placentia. This week will be largely devoted to meetings of the Orange brethren. It is the first time the Orange body of North America has held its Sovereign Grand Lodge conference in Newfoundland.

This morning we were pleased to receive a visit from our old friend the Rev. D. Blackall. Mr. Blackall was one of our colleagues at Bishop Field College. Later he entered Queen's College, and was ordained by the Bishop of Newfoundland. He had charge of a mission in Newtown, B. B., and at other places and some six years ago left for England, where he remained nearly two years. For the past four years he has been in New Brunswick. He was the first of the Orange delegates from the continent to arrive here. He comes as proxy for the Master of the Charlotte County Lodge of New Brunswick, of which he is chaplain. He delivered rousing speeches at Victoria Hall on Thursday and Friday night. Many of his Newfoundland friends will be pleased with the opportunity of greeting him once more. His wife who is a Harbor Grace lady, accompanies him.

PROSPERO BACK.—The s.s. Prospero, Capt. A. Kean, arrived yesterday from Sydney, which port she went to get bunker coal. The coasters is now taking freight and sails for the northward on Wednesday morning. Quite a number of round-trippers are booked to go by her.

Cable News.

ST. PETERSBURG, Today.
The proposal made by the Russian Government that a joint naval demonstration be made off Constantinople to coincide with the mobilization of Russian troops in the south western provinces has been abandoned. Germany flatly declined to consider the plans. Russia's allies, Britain and France, replied evasively. Russia is unable to assume the task single handed of bringing pressure to bear upon the Turks in Europe. She is unwilling to do so in Asia Minor, realising such course would encourage an American uprising which would only further complicate the Turkish problem. Owing to the breakdown of the European concert, the Russian Government sees no hope of arresting the Turks by force. Russia however, may land a force on Burgas, a Black Sea port, 75 miles Northeast of Adrianople for the protection of lives and property of Russian subjects, if the Turks march in that direction. At a Council of Ministers it was agreed that the Russian Government do their utmost to avert further bloodshed in the Balkans. If a program of military operations led to wholesale massacres the responsibility would rest on the other Powers. Russian policy is understood now to be entirely concerned with patching up the Balkan League, including Roumania as the sole means of arresting the Turkish forces.

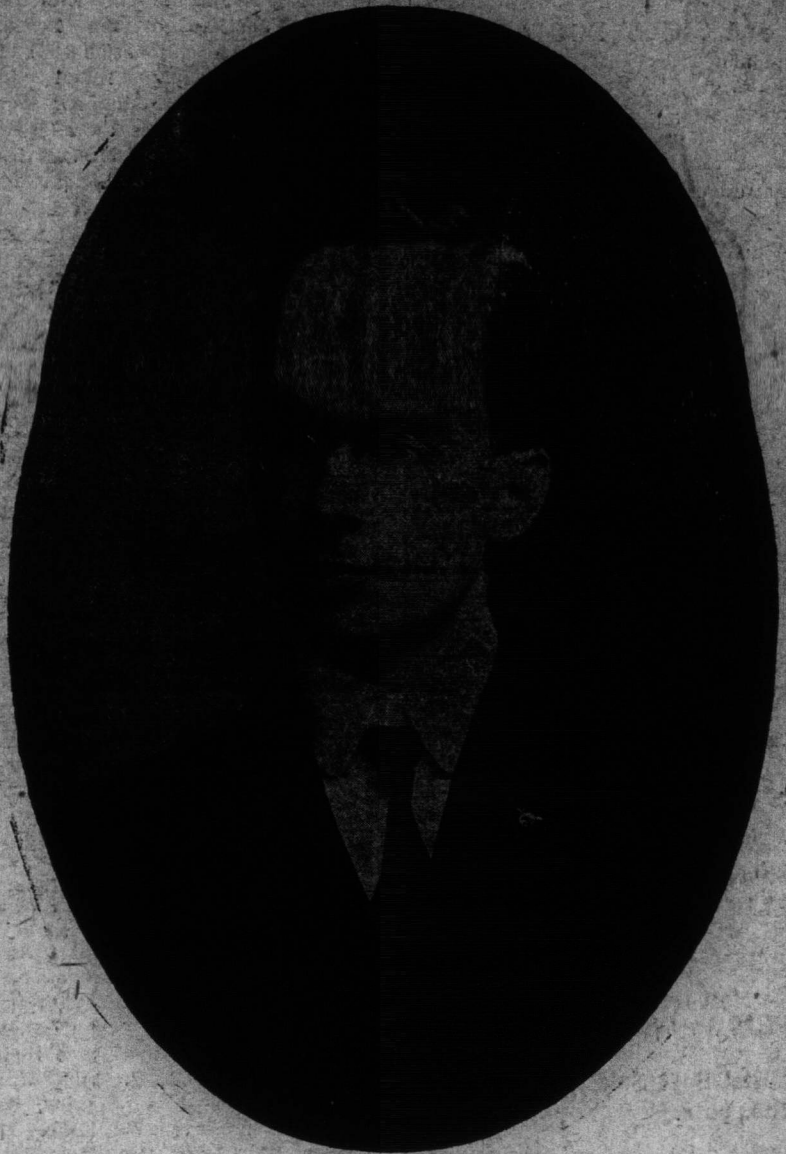

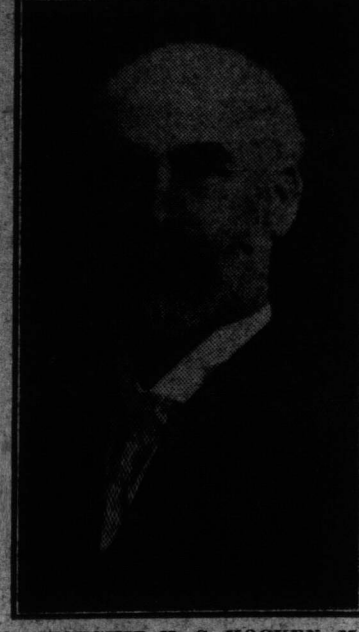
HON. T. S. SPROULE, M.D., Past Grand Master, Grand Lodge of British America, Speaker of the Canadian House of Commons.

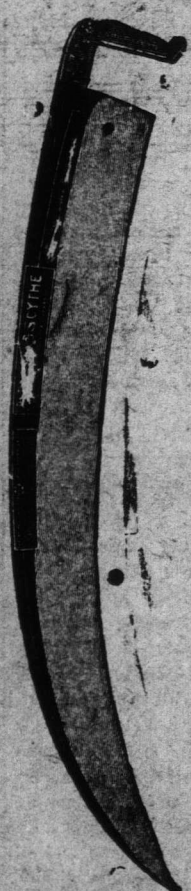

London's Tribute to Major Melkieleh of the Gordons.

London, July 27.—To have survived the perils of three campaigns and to die in bed, after being thrown from his horse at a "peacetime" parade in Hyde Park, must seem a "side-way ending" to the career of a soldier like Major Melkieleh. He was in the army one of the Gray Gordons—a regiment which it has been said, fought and kissed its way round the world—and he served in the Chitral expedition of 1895, the Tirah expedition of 1897, and the Boer war. It was in this last campaign that Major Melkieleh won his bronze cross, the cheapest from the money point of view, yet the most coveted of the trophies of war. Major Melkieleh was only forty-three years of age at the time of his death and he had given promise of attaining a high position in the profession of his choice. The mishap that brought his life to an untimely end would not have occurred if the chances of a soldier's life had not deprived him of his right arm. He lost this as the result of wounds received at Elandsbaagte, and his quality as a soldier may be inferred from the story of his submission to the surgeon's knife. Putting a cigarette, he said to the surgeons when they were preparing for the operation: "The silly beggars didn't know I was left-handed." But the loss of his good right arm prevented him controlling his startled horse, and he was thrown heavily to the ground. By his death the army has lost a gallant officer, and the general staff at the war office an administrator and adviser of experience and ability.

Thousands of people lined the route taken by the funeral procession of Major Melkieleh, V.C., on Tuesday. The gallant Major had faced death so often that his grim novelty passed. But the people who bared their heads as he went through London were thinking less of his battle honors than of the last great honor of all when he laid down his life for children in a London park.

On June 21st Major Melkieleh was riding through Hyde Park, to attend a review of the University of London officers' training corps. Suddenly his horse bolted, taking fright at the band. Straight ahead was a clear gallop, and a chance to pull up. But there were children in the way; some

of them might be hurt, and with the one arm the Major wrenched the horse's head aside and set it for the railings. He knew the horse could never jump them. It was certain death and he knew it.

After a short service in the chapel at Middlesex Hospital, the coffin, covered with a Union Jack on which lay the Major's sword and plumed bonnet, was carried out to the gun carriage, while companies of the Coldstream and Grenadier Guards presented arms. Through the streets to the Necropolis Station in Westminster Bridge Road, the procession passed, the troops pacing slowly with reversed arms, the Guards band playing the Dead March, and representatives of officers' training corps from several schools following the gun carriage that is so grim and proud a bier.

At the station the troops again presented arms, the Army saluted his gallant dead, and the special train moved out to Brookwood cemetery.

BOMB OUTRAGES STIR N. Y.

New York, July 27.—Four bomb explosions during the past 24 hours left the tenement dwellers of New York to-day in a state of terror. In each case the outrage followed written demands for money. The explosion last night drove several hundred persons into the streets, and caused considerable damage to property, but all the occupants of the buildings where the bombs were planted, escaped without serious injury.

Sixth Avenue's Strange Tragedy.

In Crowd of Shoppers, Man Fires Three Shots at Sweetheart, Then Kills Himself.

New York, July 27.—Frank Castario, twenty-eight years old, barber, No. 221, West Twenty-Seventh Street, is dead in his home, having fired a bullet into his brain after having attempted to take the life of his sweetheart, Mary Spallino, twenty-one years old, of No. 245 Seventh Avenue. The attempted murder and suicide occurred yesterday morning in the doorway of the Masonic Temple, No. 382 Sixth Avenue, when hundreds of shoppers were passing.

Castario and Mary Spallino were engaged to be married and the ceremony was to have been performed next month. Recently Castario was stricken with appendicitis and was taken to a hospital, where an operation was performed. When he was able to leave the hospital he complained that he still suffered pain and seemed depressed.

Miss Spallino is a dress finisher employed by a Sixth Avenue concern. She was regarded as the prettiest girl in the establishment and had many suitors. Yesterday morning she decided that she would not go to work, but would go for a walk with Castario, and try to make him forget his worries.

Just before noon they were seen walking in Sixth Avenue in direction of Twenty-third street. They appeared to be arguing about something, and when they reached the freight entrance to the Masonic Temple they stepped into the doorway. One man, who refused to give his name, declared that he heard Castario accuse the girl of not loving him. Some one hurried to the corner of Twenty-third street and told Policeman Gavigan, of the West Seventeenth street station, of the argument, and the policeman started for the doorway.

Three shots rang out, and as the policeman approached, Miss Spallino sank to the ground. Castario stood over her. Policeman Gavigan closed in on the man, who when he saw he was about to be arrested, placed the revolver to his temple and fired. He fell dead across the body of his sweetheart. One bullet had struck the girl in the right cheek, but her injury was not serious.

At the home of the girl, who is one of five children, it was stated that jealousy could not have been the cause of the tragedy, because Mary had been very much in love with Castario. A brother of Castario gave dependency as the cause of the shooting.

Victoria City Cannot Secure Money On Bonds.

Victoria, B. C., June 18.—An intimation that the Dominion Securities Company, Victoria's financial agents, are unable to procure money for \$2,350,000 city bonds underwritten several weeks ago, is contained in a letter to the City Council. The bonds were underwritten at a price netting the city slightly over \$2. It was a foregone conclusion that the city would be a long time getting the money because less than twenty per cent of the issue was disposed of in London. Part of this was forwarded to the city treasurer, and further sums representing the proceeds of the sale, also came along, but the bulk of the money the agents found themselves unable to raise.—Montreal Star.

Neither Sport Nor Pastime.

English Authorities Abandon Prosecution for Sunday Aviation.

London, July 17.—The police of Hull, in attempting to prohibit flying on the Sabbath, took the names of 3,000 persons attending a forbidden exhibition of airmanship last Sunday, with the idea of prosecuting the promoters. It is now discovered that flying is neither a sport nor a pastime within the meaning of the act of Charles I, under which it was proposed to take action. The prosecution was therefore dropped. The act was intended to prevent people from assembling outside their own parish for cockfighting and bull-baiting.

The Kimono.



The kimono is a long, loose fitting garment which is a cross between a cotton flannel nightgown and a 12-bushel gunny sack, and when draped upon the physique of a short woman weighing 240 pounds, net, can hardly be told from an Empire gown.

The kimono does not conceal any stays or whalebone attachments, but falls in graceful, flowing lines until stopped by the floor. It is in high favor with husbands because it does not have to be hooked up in the back, some day somebody will invent a kimono with forty-two close-coupled hooks and eyes running up and down its spinal column, and then divorcees will be more common than they are at present.

The kimono is used extensively in Japan, where it was first tried out as a substitute for clothes. It attained immediate and widespread popularity, owing to the fact that a woman whose washing had not come home could borrow one of her neighbor's kimonos without having to let it out or take it in. The kimono has no neck to speak of, and will fit anything from a snake-wood cane to a kerosene barrel.

Kimonos are usually made of some non-shrinking material which is not good for anything else except to paper the bed room. It comes in figured patterns, ranging from the saporite stamflower to the blood-sweating, benevolent, holy writ, and runs to ray colors, which after one washing lose considerable of their identity. A very nice kimono can be made from eight-eighths yards of green, chambray, embroidered in yellow and pink lilies-of-the-valley. When a near-sighted husband who has sworn off drinking comes home at night and sees his wife standing coyly under a gas jet, attired in one of these kimonos, he will perform a relay of agile fits in the front hall.

If it were not for the sleeves of the kimono, it could be built out of one bolt of cloth. A woman who wears a kimono for the first time has more trouble keeping the sleeves out of the soup tureen than she does in matching her hat at the department store. But for solid comfort the kimono makes all other garments feel like a straight-front.

Crack Safe Almost in Shadow of New York Police Headquarters.

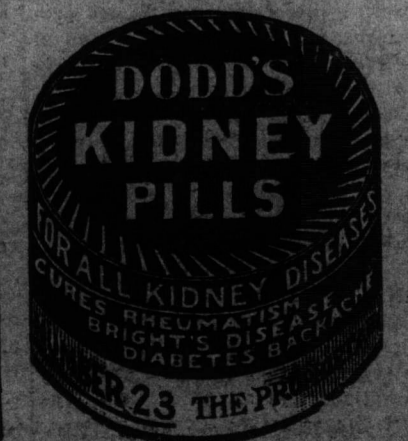

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKING, To-day. Volunteers, American, British, and other citizens are guarding the approaches to the mountains of the town. Kiu Ling where thousands of foreigners, mostly American and British women and children, have taken refuge from the heat of a Chinese summer month. A few American blue-jackets on the heights are maintaining signal communications with the States' gunboat, Helena, lying off the River at Fort Kiu Kiang. After a fortnight's rebellion, the Northern Government forces have had bitter fighting at three main points of contact namely, Shanghai, Kiu Kiang, and along the Tien Tsin Puttow railway. Whilst much ammunition has been expended by gun-firing which lasted for days there has been no decisive battle which foreigners believe essential. The Provisional President Yuan Shi K'ai's success has British, German and American sympathy. The Yangtze Kiang ports as well as Peking, overwhelmed with fever. President Yuan Shi K'ai, while Japanese and Russians favor the Southerners.

SHANGHAI, To-day.

The landing of sailors from foreign warships in this city, greatly relieved foreigners and the better class of the Chinese country people returned home. The country district around Shanghai, presents a picture of desolation. Houses burned, crops ruined and rotting corpses are lying everywhere. Philanthropic institutions are caring for refugees in thousands now camping on the street.

Napoleon's Hat Sold.

A cosmopolitan crowd of buyers attended the sale of Napoleon relics at Sotheby's, in London, the other day yet white duty authenticated they brought only \$7,507. Spink paid \$1,750 for a portrait in oils of Napoleon by Rene-Theodore Berthou, a pupil of David; \$950 for a colossal marble bust of Napoleon by Chaudet, sculptured by order of Napoleon, who presented it to his uncle, Cardinal Fesch; \$500 for a marble bust of Napoleon as Emperor, and \$435 for Napoleon's hat worn when he was First Consul, with an original document certifying its genuineness. Bernain paid \$675 for Napoleon's sun's hat lock sporting rifle, which belonged for many years to Egge, the famous gun-maker, and \$145 for an engraving, "Napoleon Premier, Empereur des Francais et Roi d'Italie," by Casanova, after P. Vandervall, in colors. Some Nelson relics were offered, too. The christening shirt worn by Lord Nelson sold for \$150. It was fully authenticated by Mrs. Garret, to whose husband it was given at the time of their marriage. He was nephew of Admiral Sir Robert Barlow, first cousin to Lady Nelson, the great admiral's sister-in-law.

Bargees To Stop Swearing.

"To swear like a bargee" is a synonym in England for the limit in cursing. Sixty-seven bargees who navigate the waterway connecting Sittingbourne with the River Medway mean to remove this reproach and have formed themselves into a brotherhood for this purpose. They are pledged to say prayers every day, to attend Divine service once every Sunday, and to "endeavor" not to swear.

Finds Microbe of Rheumatism.

Paris, July 27.—An investigation, communitation has been made to the French Biological Society concerning the discovery of a schizothallic microbe, not belonging to this vegetable kingdom, which is supposed to be the cause of rheumatism. These microbes, which are very minute, are very powerful microscope, are termed proteobacteria and are invariably found in the blood joints of persons suffering from rheumatism. Britain Wants Oil For Fuel.

Oil is Best for the Navy, But Harder to Obtain.

Washington, July 23.—The British Admiralty realizes that regarding the change from coal to oil it will be wise to go slow, inasmuch as England has practically a monopoly of the best naval coal, whereas in oil she is on equal terms with her rivals, if not handicapped by their closer proximity to the great fields of oil. England, it is believed, will be forced to adopt a definitely increased standard of seapower to protect her oil carrying fleet and unless some reliable and cheap method of distilling naval oil from England's coals is discovered, the navy must largely depend upon imported fuel which would be liable to capture. Germany, on the other hand, can get oil across her frontier from Roumania without risk. Oil is the naval fuel of the future. In equal weight it gives forty per cent. greater efficiency. With an internal combustion engine, merely as a motive force, becomes three or four times better than coal. Speed is more attainable, and far higher speeds are attained. There is economy in storage. An oil-driven craft has a far higher radius of action.

The process of re-coaling is abolished. Blockading vessels can keep their stations afloat. Oil bunkers can easily be replenished through a tube. Warships at sea can be fed directly from tank steamers. Fewer stokers are needed, and they work under less strain. Upon a given displacement oil means, for various reasons, greater gun-power, and also more rapid raising of steam, a swifter speed, and a wider radius of action. Yet there are fears that England may buy these advantages too dearly.

Conference of the Premiers.

Toronto, July 19.—The Prime Minister of Ontario and the Prime Minister of Quebec have issued a joint letter to the Prime Ministers of the various provinces calling an inter-provincial conference to be held in the city of Ottawa on October 20.

In 1910 a conference was called at the request of the Maritime Provinces to consider a proposal to amend the British North America Act in regard to the representation of the Maritime Provinces in the Parliament of Canada.

This conference after some discussion was adjourned to a future date. The forthcoming conference is intended to afford an opportunity of proceeding with the business of the adjourned conference and also any other business that may be brought before it by the members.

Diana Here With McMillan Party.

The s.s. Diana, Capt. T. Waite, which went ashore in the Belle Isle Straits while en route to the far north with the McMillan expedition party, arrived back to port yesterday.

On June 23rd the ship left here for New York where she was boarded by Dr. McMillan and a couple of his scientists. Boston was the next place visited where other associates of the chief of the expedition joined the vessel. A delay of five days was made at Boston. After taking on board supplies and the necessary equipment needed by the party, the Diana proceeded to Sydney where a good supply of coal was got; also a supply of dog biscuit. She left Sydney, deeply laden, on July 13th. Heavy weather was met at the outset. North and Northeasterly gales were frequent, and in consequence Capt. Waite kept his ship as near as possible to the land. Two days after leaving Sydney fog was met. The Diana was then off Lance au Loup. The fog lifted, after a short while, allowing the ship to keep steaming, and then set in thick again. Up to that time going through the Straits a great many icebergs were sighted while "growlers" were passed in galore and it was with the greatest difficulty that these menaces were avoided. The Diana was going at a reduced rate of speed and was being gradually dragged in on the shore.

On the night of Monday, July 14th, Capt. Waite had just come on watch when the vessel grounded on Barge Point, near Red Bay. Capt. Waite, who was aroused, ordered the engines to be worked full speed, astern but this did not bring her into high water. All boats were then lowered and took ashore freight to lighten the ship. A number of men from Red Bay assisted in the work. This was about four o'clock on the morning of July 15th. At 9 a.m. the Stella Maris came on the scene and tried to tow the Diana off, but was unsuccessful. When more cargo was taken out the Stella Maris made an

other attempt to take her off and succeeded in doing so. When the Diana floated off the work of putting aboard her freight again was immediately gone ahead with. She then proceeded to Red Bay to get some cargo brought there by vessels, thence going to Battle Harbor from which port the Diana bore up for St. John's. The Diana left here on Friday last arriving at 10.30 a.m. yesterday. Right along to Cape Bonavista on her run south the ship had dense fog and many bergs were met particularly in the Straits of Belle Isle. The ship did not strike very heavily and is making very little water. She was given a grand send off at Brooklyn Navy Yard and at Boston hundreds of Newfoundlanders came on board, the crew meeting many old friends. The Erik now coaling at Harvey's will leave for the north shortly. The transfer of the stores, etc., will be made quickly. Prof. McMillan and his party will land, if they can, near Cape Sabine or Cape York and will remain three years in the north. The ship will also land two of the members of the expedition at Ponds Inlet who will hunt there for a while and then return to Newfoundland. It is said that friends of the explorers will go north to see them and will, it is said, charter one of our steel sealing ships for the enterprise.

Fisherman Drowned at Labrador.

By the Kyle there arrived from Sand Hill, Labrador the body of a man named Ryan, of Trinity Bay. The poor chap was fishing with two others when a squall upset their boat and they were thrown into the water. Two of them clung to the bottom of the boat but Ryan could not reach it, and sank. The others were rescued later by other boats. Ryan's body was recovered the day after the accident.

Capt. Parsons reports that from Hopedale to Cape Harrison there is only a bare sign of fish, traps securing daily about 1 and 2 qtls. Holton to Indian Harbour traps doing well and fish fairly plentiful. Pack's Harbour, little fish going, and Long Island traps report from 50 to 100 qtls. Good work is being done at Flat Islands. Mann & Co's traps have 500 qtls. ashore, Saug Harbour—doing fairly well, Sheridan's crew, of Harbour Grace, have over 50 qtls. ashore, and other crews doing fairly. At Battle Harbour there is not much doing for hook and line or traps. Some of the schooners at Leadwill Island did well and two secured over 200 qtls. each and are now gone north. Taken all round the prospects for a good fishery, at least as they appear to be to date, are not encouraging.

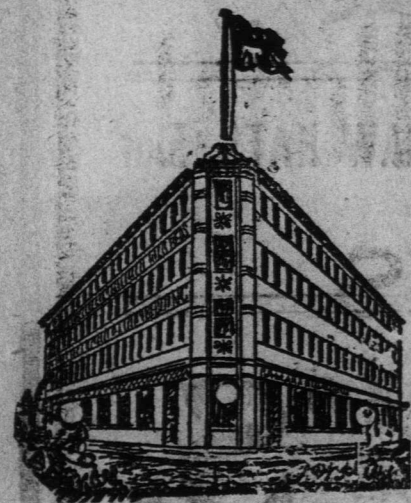

Household Notes.

Table jellies mixed are delicious—pineapple and raspberry, or lemon and cherry, according to taste. A jelly added to stewed fruit improves it and thickens the syrup. Sufficient may be added to make a mold and turn out to serve with cream of custard.

A substitute for egg is made by preparing a thick paste of flour and water, then dip the fish or cutlet to be fried into batter, and sprinkle with breadcrumbs. You will find this answer well, giving a beautiful brown appearance and preserving the delicate flavor.

When making a baked custard, add two tablespoonfuls of breadcrumbs. Delicious with stewed fruit. When making a boiled custard, add a spoonful of corn flour, mixed with a little cold milk, and boil in the usual way. This just thickens it and prevents burning.

Fish scrambled on toast is a good luncheon dish. Any good white fish left over may be shredded, seasoned with pepper, salt, saffron and lemon juice. Heat the fish with a little butter in a saucepan, add two beaten eggs and spread the mixture on toast dipped in salted water.

Spiced jelly for decorating meat dishes is made with gelatine—a boxful soaked in a cup of consommé. Let the liquid simmer and add a cupful of tarragon vinegar, two tablespoonfuls of fruit juice, any kind, and two of lemon juice, and a teaspoonful of salt. Cook five minutes, strain and chill.

To make lemon sponge, dissolve a pint packet of lemon jelly and allow to cool. As the jelly begins to set, add the whites of three eggs and whisk until the mixture is frothy. Pile in a glass dish and allow to set. Sprinkle the top with chopped pistachio nuts, or decorate with strips of angelica and cherries.

For boiling water starch, use one tablespoonful of the best white starch, three tablespoonfuls of cold water to mix, half a teaspoonful of borax or glycerol, and a bit of wax to make the iron glide smoothly. Pour on boiling water, stirring until the starch is cooked and looks semitransparent, dilute with cold water as required. For starch water, use one tablespoonful of this standard starch to half a pint of cold water.

Suffering Drives Engineer to Suicide.

Plunged in Wreck, Besieged by "Pat End to His Agony—Testing New Engine When Accident Occurs—'For God's Sake Pat Me, Out of this Living Hell!' He Pleads.

Decatur, Ala., July 21.—Caught under an overturned locomotive in the Louisville and Nashville yards here, Huston G. Fleming, a twenty-six year old engineer whose wedding date was set within the week, killed himself by cutting his throat with his pocket-knife to bring relief from the agony he was suffering. With his legs crushed and steam fairly cooking his body, the young man begged fellow-workmen to kill him. The men refused though they could not rescue him from the wreck.

"For God's sake," the young man cried, "put me out of this living hell; kill me!"

Beneath the tangled mass of machinery the man's white face was seen by the crowd. Then, with half paralyzed hands, he managed to grope toward a pocket of his coat. Out of it he brought a penknife. He opened a blade of it with his teeth.

"Well, if none of you men have the nerve, I'll do it myself."

Without hesitation he drew the blade across his throat. He made a deep wound that severed the jugular vein, and that instant the suffering man escaped his agony.

With Floyd Hamlin, an air inspector, Fleming was testing the engine. A new one in the railroad yards. It was a big machine, devised for service on long distance express trains.

While it was speeding through the yard a switch engine shot up on a side track, lurching into a switch, and smashed into the side of the big locomotive, causing it to turn turtle.

Hamlin was thrown from the cab, and his skull fractured. He was unconscious, and died in a hospital later.

John Smith, a fireman who was a witness to Fleming's terrible and dramatic death, said:

"It was too awful to look at. And we couldn't do a thing for Fleming—one of the best liked men among us. We lost no time in getting the wrecker down here and trying to lift the engine, but the wrecker wasn't big enough to lift such a big locomotive. And all we could do was to stand there and see him suffer and hear him beg us to kill him. He was feeling fearful pain; it seemed almost as if somebody should do as he asked. But, of course, none of us could bring ourselves to do that. And finally the boy got out his own knife, watching him for any of us to think of taking the knife away from him. We just stood there, staring while he cut his throat."

The wedding of Fleming was to have taken place in a few days, and his fiancée is prostrated by the tragedy.

Locked in Small Boy's Brest.

Locked securely in his breast for over a week, little ten-year-old Jackie Robinson, of 41 Fulham street, had a drastic secret. On Friday, 6th June, his seven-year-old playmate, John Kwiatka disappeared and yesterday his little body was recovered from the river. "Sobbing bitterly," Jackie told the detectives sent to find him that he and his chum had gone down to the river against their parents' orders, and played at launching sticks with pebbles on them to represent cargo boats. John Kwiatka overbalanced, fell in, sank, and was carried away by the current. The frightened onlooker rushed home, but fearful of punishment for his disobedience, kept his lips sealed.
