"Oh, so-so; I mustn't complain. I've had my ups and downs, of course, but I'm not doing so badly."


He leaned back, and put his thumbs in his waistcoat pocket with the air of a man who is too modest to boast.

**AT THE HOUSE.**

Another unusually brief and quiet  
session occurred yesterday afternoon  
in the Assembly Chamber and the only  
debate on was the question on two oc-  
casions of Parliamentary procedure.

Petitions were presented by Mr.  
Downey, from Ballantyne's Cove for a  
road countrywards; from Little River  
for an increase in road grant; from  
South Branch for bridge at Coal  
Brook; from Bay of Islands for ex-  
tension of telegraph to North and Mid-  
dle Arms; also for grant of \$1,200 for  
McVior's Road, from Codroy and  
Grand River for appointment of an  
agent at Doyle's Station; by Mr. Ab-  
bott from Charlottetown for road; by  
Mr. Targett from Hant's Harbor re  
mailman's wages; by Mr. Parsons  
from Carbonar regarding road; by  
the Premier on behalf of Mr. Clapp,  
for telegraph extension to Trout Riv-  
er; by Mr. Jennings for Twillingate re-  
road; from Pilley's Island and Carl  
Harbor re road, ferry and bridge;  
from Exploits for repairs to bridge;  
and from Somerford and Norris' Arm  
for road; by Mr. Halfyard from Hare  
Bay for a well; from Change Islands  
for road to Tilling; from Indian Is-  
lands for telegraph office; by Mr.  
Stone from Ireland's Eye for telegraph  
office.

The report of the Select Committee  
appointed to draw the Address in Re-  
ply to the Governor's Speech from the  
Throne was presented by Mr. Dever-  
aux. During the temporary absence  
of the Leader of the Opposition, Mr.  
Clift and Mr. Coaker, the motion for  
the adoption of the Address was put  
through. Just as the Speaker was  
about to put the motion Mr. Halfyard  
arose to speak on the Address, but  
was declared out of order by the  
Speaker, who ruled that the member  
was not technically in keeping with  
parliamentary procedure. The Speak-  
er added that it was not his intention  
to choke off debate and that Mr. Half-  
yard, if he wished, could move the  
adjournment of the House and speak  
on the Address at the next sitting.

Mr. Coaker asked the Premier to  
table (a) A statement showing the  
cost per ton ex-ship of the load of  
Cadiz salt recently imported by the  
Government per S. S. "Dunelmia" and  
at what price per ton it was sold to  
Job Bros. & Co. (b) If the salt was  
offered to other firms, if so, to whom,  
and what offers were received from  
such.

The Premier replied that the Gov-  
ernment had not imported any salt  
and this was the first he had heard of  
the Government importing any, con-  
sequently he did not know what the  
price was.

Mr. Coaker stated that the entries  
at the Custom House were, in the  
name of the Government.

The Daylight Bill passed its third  
reading and the three Imperial Bills,  
namely: (1) An Act Respecting Dis-  
cipline on Ships Controlled by the Ad-  
miralty; (2) An Act to Restrict the  
Transfer and Mortgage of British  
Ships; and (3) An Act to Facilitate the  
Reciprocal Enforcement of Judgments,  
Orders and Awards in Newfoundland  
and other parts of His Majesty's Do-  
minions, went through Committee.

The Colonial Secretary moved the  
second reading of Bills, An Act for the  
Confirmation of a Contract with the  
Riverside Woolen Mills, Limited, and  
An Act for the Confirmation of a Con-  
tract with the Nfld. Knitting Mills,  
Ltd., and had spoken at length on  
the Bills when moved out of order by  
the Leader of the Opposition, who  
stated the proper course for the Col-  
onial Secretary to take was to move a  
Resolution asking leave to introduce  
the Bills, and when leave was granted  
the House to be moved into Committee  
of the Whole, to discuss the Bills. The  
objection was sustained by the Speak-  
er, who informed the Colonial Secre-  
tary to withdraw the Bills and leave  
was then asked to introduce the Re-  
solutions to-day. The House then ad-  
journed.

**Canada and Newfoundland.**

There will be no coalition of Government forces in Canada. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has made his choice, apparently perforce, since he is known to have favoured the coalition proposal, and the hopes of the best part of the country are belied. So be it. There, as here, party politics have conquered patriotism. There, as here, the hand of a Government none too content is strengthened. There, as here, the country will suffer for it but those responsible will suffer more. Their contention, which is perfectly correct, that the offer to share the burden of Government should have come two years earlier, now through their action loses all its force in their favour, for by disregarding now the needs of the country at large, more imperative than they were then, they show that if the offer had been made, they would have accepted it not in the country's interests but in their own. It is a miserable business, but we cannot sit in judgment here, having done precisely the same thing in almost exactly similar circumstances. We can believe that the Borden party are quite content with the position. If there is now an election, the veriest tyro can see how it will go. Try as they will, the Liberals will be unable to discover their present refusal from the question of conscription. That will be made the great issue, and there is no doubt of the feeling of the majority of the electorate upon it. There is no election, the Government, of course, wins the victory without having to fight for it.

Newfoundland is placed in almost exactly the same position. The Opposition have merely reinforced the Government by refusing to co-operate with them. Because of this plainly we have been accused by many Opposition adherents of wishing to see the Government continued in office. If that must be the alternative to a general election, the accusation is correct. Regrettable as it would be to see the present Government inflicted on the country for another year, it would be still worse to have to endure the distractions and dissensions of an election at home while the chief duty of the country lies in Europe. The Opposition had it in their power to prevent both possibilities; for some reason which we are utterly unable to fathom they have declined to use it. The country has great need of the abilities of such men as Mr. Coaker and Dr. Lloyd. They have been denied it, and must be wasted on mere opposition, which is bound to be quite ineffective, and on more criticism and obstruction which is equally unhelpful and co-operation are what is imperatively wanted. The contrast between Canada and Newfoundland on the one hand and Great Britain, Australia and the United States on the other, suggests an explanation in a different attitude towards large questions which, out of respect for our national pride, we will refrain from elaborating.

**Air Raids and Submarines.**

There may possibly be a bright side to the story of the German air raids, recently of so much larger proportions, which has escaped general notice. Constantly during the war, the Germans have betrayed the success of various operations against them by spiteful rejoinders which do them no military good. One careful observer, for instance, has remarked that every time

the Germans have suffered a reverse at the hands of the French, they have bombarded Rhims cathedral, and that the extent of the reverse is generally to be gauged by the extent of the bombardment. It is not fanciful, but perfectly natural, to see the success of the anti-submarine efforts reflected in these air raids on England. The British are playing havoc with many submarine bases—certainly Zebrugge cannot be a healthy place to live in—and even in Germany the late failure of the submarines will bring the losses lower still, and they are still too heavy to be comfortable. Little has been heard of late from Germany on the subject; it will be interesting to hear what next they have to say about it.

Referring yesterday to the recent disorders in Twillingate, resulting from a number of men taking some pit-props that were lying there, we stated that they had acted in so doing on the advice of certain parties here. We have learned to-day the full circumstances of the case, from which it is clear that these men acted on their own initiative and did not seek advice until after they had got into trouble. We are glad to make this explanation and regret that we were misinformed. This unfortunate occurrence suggests the need that exists of making the whole question of these pit-props clear, not merely with regard to the property in them but with regard to the cutting of them on the three-mile limit, a matter on which the law does not seem to be definite or strict enough.

"We ought to do something for her," said another.

"Let's send her some flowers."

"Maybe she could go out in my machine some pleasant day."

But They Forgot The Woman Who Held On.

So the talk ran, full of pity for the woman and of eagerness to do something for her because she had gone all to pieces.

Which was right and kind.

But all the time I had a deeper pity in my heart for someone they never mentioned. And that was her sister who had not gone all to pieces.

The two were under similar strain, illness in the family, financial worries, overwork in business.

And she went all to pieces.

While the other has held on to herself with an iron hand and simply wouldn't let herself go to pieces.

They Deserve A Shining Reward.

In every community there are a few brave souls who are making that supreme sacrifice,—enduring to the point where further endurance seems impossible and they long to let themselves go,—and then taking a fresh hold on themselves and still enduring.

And to my mind there are no heroes or heroines in all the world who deserve a more shining reward.

When one lets oneself go to pieces, one immediately becomes the centre of the stage. Cares are removed from one's shoulders, the oil of love is poured into one's wounds. People who haven't paid any attention to one before become sympathetic and pitying (witness my friends and their flowers and "ahoes"). One ceases to lean on one's own strength and leans on the strength of others.

Like Laying One's Aching Bones In Bed.

It is like giving in to an illness with which one has long been struggling and relaxing one's weary aching body in bed.

It is the natural, the human thing to do when the strain becomes too great, just loose the bonds of self-control and stop trying to be a responsible being.

And it is the super-natural, super-human thing to do, to take a fresh hold on oneself and simply refuse to let oneself go to pieces.

If there are any gradations of Heaven, any upper and lower paradise, I know where such people will go.

If you have the Sunday dinner to prepare yourself, do most of it on Saturday. Chicken can be stewed, salad dressing can be made, beans can be boiled, rice can be boiled, the dessert made. All this can be done on Saturday morning, warmed and served on Sunday.

PLUMBING.

Plumbing is an expensive attachment to a new house which serves forever after as a meal ticket for the members of the Joint Fitters' Union. It is not unusually included in the contract price, and is guaranteed only against tornadoes and earthquakes, which are not the fault of the party of the second part.

Men who have built several houses in rapid succession draw up a separate contract for the plumbing, which specifies that all holes in the foundation walls large enough to admit cats and other insects shall be carefully stopped up with No. 1 putty instead of discarded coats, pants and other regalia. Putty is a durable substance, and when properly applied will retard the progress of a determined rat for several hours. The contract also provides that in case of a leak in the bath room pipes the repair charge shall not exceed the original contract price, but the courts have declared this unconstitutional.

There are two kinds of plumbing—open and concealed, the only difference being that with concealed plumbing it becomes necessary to take down the house in sections in order to locate a clog in the drain pipe.

while with the open kind it can be found almost instantly after two or three days' search by the head plumber. Open plumbing can also be reached better by the prying nose of the vacuum cleaner, and in case of an explosion in the pipes does not prevent the water from escaping to the floor below and alarming the inmates.

In some places it is still the fashion to insert plumbing just inside the siding on the north wall, where it can freeze in one solid piece and cause an unavoidable postponement of the weekly bath. It also works a hardship on the plumber, who has to climb out on the roof with a blow-pipe and work fast in order to escape being converted into an icicle, in direct violation of the rules of the union.

It is doubtful if the improvement in plumbing which has taken place during recent years has kept pace with the improvement in charging, but nobody objects to the charge when the grand piano is four feet under water.

### Your Boys and Girls.

If a child is two or more years old, the only effective means of weaning from the bottle is through hunger. The bottle should be taken away at once and entirely, and nothing allowed except milk from a cup until the child takes this willingly. Sometimes a child will go an entire day without food, occasionally as long as two days, but one should not be alarmed on this account and yield. This is a matter of the child's will and not of his digestion, and when once he has been conquered it is seldom that any further trouble is experienced.

Few mothers realize how to properly lift their children. When a young baby is to be lifted from its bed, the right hand should grasp the clothing below the feet, and the left hand should be slipped beneath the infant's body to its head. It is then raised upon the left arm.
