



Mr. Burns, who said he had been engaged by the Morgan firm to make an investigation of the accident, stated that his personal investigation convinced him that a wagon containing a bomb or bombs was left in front of the sub-Treasury building with timing device so fixed as to cause it to explode precisely at noon. No trace of the driver of the wagon has been found he said, and added that in his opinion the man es-

caped a few moments before the ex-plosion occurred. Fire Chief Kenlon and officers from Bureau of Combustiand omcers from Bureau of Combusti-bles, also expressed the belief that the explosion was caused by bomb. After examining fragments of metal found in front of Morgan's offices, Dr. William F. 



Cathedral Tower and Spire

The preliminary drawings for the external completion of the Cathedral were prepared by Mr. G. Gilbert Scott, A.R.A., during his recent visit to St. John's. The design combines in an eminent degree simplicity and dignity

the result being a tower and spire of

graceful proportions and uncommo

beauty.

The work has been designed in the Decorated Gothic Style in conformity with the general architecture of the Cathedral. The tower is carried 42 feet above the ridge of the Nave and is surmounted by a spire 75 feet high. The total height from the ground level

of the Church yard to the apex of the pinnacle is 205 feet. The tower is 34 feet square with external stone facing of the same materials as the existing work. Each face is relieved by two lofty belfry windows, deeply recessed and filled with graceful geometrical tracery. Each pair of windows is surmounted by six smaller belfry lights of lancet shape; and all the windows are surrounded with deep moulded architraves and flanked with slender shafts. The faces of the tower are divided by uttresses terminating in triangular

gablets. The Spire, which is octagonal in form, rises direct from the tower without any intervening parapet; in its construction it is proposed to make use of reinforced concrete—a material which will allow of great strength combined with lightness. The spire will be covered in copper..

It is proposed to construct the internal vaulting over the crossing. This

will protect the building while the tower is being erected, and will also form part of the permanent stone vaulting which, it is hoped, will be completed at some future time. It has been the aim of the distinguished Architect to design the tower and there is no doubt that this aim will be attended if the scheme is car-

If We Could Excel the Animals.

EVEN SCIENTISTS GET HELP FROM SPIDERS.

Man-vain man-is prone to boast of his prowess, but in many respects the lower orders of the kingdom to which he belongs are immeasurably more wonderful than he is.

Can he jump as well, in proportion to size, as the despised cricket, which can spring from the ground on to a witchen table? If he could he would be able to hop over the highest building in the country.

If, again, he had a memory as tenacious in proportion as that of the ant, he would never forget anything. And what would man do with innumerable animal products? Can he. with all his machinery, make a thread as strong and elastic as silk? Can he manufacture a thread as fine, strong, elastic, light, and durable as that of the spider's web? No.

It is for such qualities that astron mers use this exquisite thread in preerence to all others, metallic or vegetable. They stretch it across the field of view of their telescopes. where it performs an important funcion. When one of those instruments is directed towards a star, the image of the body is a minute point of light. As soon as the point coicides with the intersection of two central spider lines the instrument is properly

The aid of the spider has also to be called in when the filar micrometer is used, because here, too, the astronomer must have the utmost nicety. Again, the shoemaker's boast, "Noth-

Do Films Hurt Eyes?

AN EYE EXPERT GIVES HIS VIEWS

Gaze at a landscape or out to sea for as long as you like, and you will feel no strain, but watch the hand of an electric clock outside a building for the half-minute jerk forward, and you will find the difference. It is as if someone were pulling steadily at

The Strain in Side Seats.

The best seat at a cinema from an optical standpoint is one about thirty to fifty feet from the screen and on a level with its centre. A person sitting any closer has to raise the eyeballs from the horizontal, which has a straining effect on them, being especially harmful to the nerve which one uses to raise the eye to the required position.

In some halls there are numbers of 'side seats" from which the picture appears distorted, and the practice of watching a film from this position is extremely injurious to the vision. It s especially necessary that young children should be given good seats in the cinema, as their eyes are much more likely to be affected than those

A good deal, of course, depends upon the perfection of the film and the skill of the operator. The "flicker" varies considerably in different balls; the film which appears in a London hall, newly released and as perfect as yet possible, has degenerated considerably by the time it has feached the provincial "gaff."

There can be no doubt that some wornout films are extremely injurious to the eyes, and the exhibition of them should be prevented in the public interest, especially as many of the




