She was out driving with a couple of ladies, and visited the new Episcopal Church. In stepping into the back seat of the outer her foot caught in the strap which holds the foot-board in its place, and the horse starting before she was seated, the unfortunate lady fell out, with the result as stated.

A WONDERFUL CASE OF SONNAMBULISM.—An aristocratic gentleman boarding in one of our first-class hotels in town, got up one night last week in his sleep, dressed himself, descended the stairs, and made his way to the street. He seemed to be led by instinct to a bakery on Wyndham street. By some means he procured a table and sealed the walls of the bakery. The watchman, being near at hand, heard strange sounds breaking the stillness of the night. Making his way towards where the sounds proceeded, he was surprised to see the somnambulist trying with all his might to put the table upon the chimney top, ten or twelve feet in height. Asking him in a friendly way if he was moving, the sound of a human voice aroused him to his perilous position. He was faint with exertion and trembling from the sudden view of the destruction to which he was exposed, and as quick as possible returned to the ground.—Com.

HORSE TRAINING.—After the free exhibition given in the art of horse-training, on the Market Square, by Messrs. Rockwell & Hurlburt, on Monday, the large crowd adjourned to the Drill shed to witness a further display of their power. Professor Rockwell then delivered a short lecture on the importance of the art of which he appears to be a perfect master, after which the trained horses were put through a number of wonderful performances. A beautiful milk-white steed was made to do everything but talk, and a grey-hound rode around the ring much more cleverly than many men could have done, defeating all the efforts of the pony to unseat him, and causing much merriment. A class of some sixty persons was then formed and the show cleared. A young colt, the property of Mr. Charles Davidson, was then brought into the ring and hauled. In less than twenty minutes the animal stood quietly while being mounted and re-mounted, and would follow his master with as much apparent good will as a dog. An exceedingly lively horse, the property of Mr. E. Lovetree, was next introduced, harnessed and driven to a cart. The traces were passed between the hind legs, and the horse driven the vehicle was run upon his legs—and every effort made to induce the animal to balk, but without effect. The Professor then took a long bar, passed it from behind between the horse's legs and patted him on the belly and legs therewith, thus proving conclusively that the nervous animal had been effectually cured of all timidity. Every person was fully satisfied with the exhibition. These gentlemen will remain here to-day and to-morrow, and we would advise all who wish to receive instruction in the art, to join the class without delay. On Monday afternoon Hon. R. E. Cameron was sworn in as Lieutenant Governor by Justice Duval, assisted by Justices Teschereau, Stuart, and Drouet. A detachment of the Quebec Canadian artillery was drawn up as a guard of honour at the entry, while the Provincial police lined the streets. At the conclusion of the administration of the oath a salute of 13 guns was fired by the artillery on the Esplanade.

The Italian Parliamentary Committee on Religious Corporations had decided to abolish the houses of the heads of religious orders, but to provide for the support of the heads themselves, and their indemnification for loss of property.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

Affairs in Spain.

Conservative Generals Supporting the Republic.
Great Rain Flood in Pittsburg
Railway Accident.
Tremendous Land Slides.
Heavy Libel Suit.

Paris, Feb. 17.—The manifesto of Castelar, Spanish Minister of Foreign Affairs, has reached Paris, and will be delivered to Thiers to-day. The recognition of the Spanish Republic by France is expected to follow immediately. The members of the Moderate Left in the Assembly decline to join in the address of the Extreme Left to the Republicans of Spain.

Madrid, Feb. 17.—A majority of the Conservative Generals of the Spanish army have assured the Government that they will not oppose the Republic.

Lisbon, Feb. 17.—Government organs officially deny there is any movement in Portugal for the establishment of a Republic.

Pittsburg, Feb. 17.—The flood is increasing, and it is impossible to estimate the damage done; but it is considered the heaviest rain disaster ever experienced here. The rumors of the loss of twelve lives on the coal flier prove untrue; only two men are known to have been drowned. At 9:30 p.m. the flood marked 79½ feet. It is thought the flood will culminate by midnight.

Washington, Feb. 17.—It is learned that the last offer of \$271,000 from Phelps, Dodge & Co. to the Treasury Department will be accepted upon certain conditions, not yet definitely ascertained.

Titusville, Pa., Feb. 17.—A train coming north on the Allegheny Valley Railroad rounding Brady's Bend yesterday was thrown from the track by a broken rail. Three ladies and the conductor were slightly injured.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 18.—Heavy rains are reported from all sections of the State during the past two days. Heavy land slides on several railroads have taken place, causing a detention of trains.

The river at Lynchburg is about 14 feet above its usual level. At this point it is about 10 feet, which will be greatly increased by the flood from above.

London, Feb. 18.—Owners of the steamer *Murillo* have brought an action for libel against Lloyds, claiming \$10,000 damages.

New York, Feb. 18.—Fortunately no one was killed by the accident on the Hudson River railroad this morning. Bat conductor Cummings and a brakeman are probably fatally injured. None of the passengers received serious injuries, but many of them were badly contused.

Brutal Murder in Abinger Township.

THE MURDERER LYNCHED AND HUNG TO A TREE!
 Special to THE MERCURY.

Tanworth, Feb. 18.—On Friday last a most brutal murder was committed and lynched in the Township of Abinger, in Skend's shanty. It appears there were two men working in the shanty who have been quarrelling with one another all winter, and on Friday night they fought it out. The man who got badly hurt got out of his bed, found a butcher knife and stabbed his opponent fatally. The other man sprang up, and seeing this conduct, their feelings were aroused, and they took him and lashed him fast, tied morning, when they formed a jury, tried him and then took him to a tree and hanged him till he was dead, then cut him down and buried him.

Twelve of the party were arrested and taken to Belleville yesterday for trial. The man who was stabbed yesterday. We have not been able to get the names of the parties or full particulars of the murder.

Editorial Items.

The Privy Council sat at Ottawa on Monday for a short time. Being the first sitting for some days, present appearances indicate that the Government will be caught in their usual state of unreadiness on the opening of the session.

The mineral lands in the townships on the north side of the Ottawa river are just now attracting considerable attention. Within the last few days 5,000 acres have been purchased for mining purposes. Operations in mining of iron and phosphates are expected to be quite active on the opening of spring.

An Irishman was asked how he and his wife were near to the woman's suffrage question. "The job," says Pat, "is too much respect for me to furnish this to answer the question with."

On Saturday last the Toronto Herald's Trick apparatus, Mr. Alderman Charles Hamilton made in the presence of the late Mr. P. O. H. Hamilton.

Charles Hamilton is 63, and Driscoll is 67.

Ottawa is about creating a Female College.

Town Council.

Council met on Monday evening. The Mayor in the chair. Present Messrs. Chadwick, Hefferman, Horsman, McLagan, Bell, Massie, Hogg, Coffee, Howard, Richard Mitchell, Robert Mitchell, Crowe, and Kennedy.

Mr. T. W. Saunders, Police Magistrate, prayed that his salary might be increased from \$600 to \$800 per annum. Where the population in towns is over 6,000 and under 8,000, the salary shall not be less than \$600 per annum; and where the population is over 8,000 the salary shall not be less than \$1,000 per annum. The population of the town being now over 7,000 he thought it but fair that his salary should be increased to the sum named. Referred to Finance Committee.

Peter Mann asked for the remission of \$2, fees paid on wood contract, contrary to ruling of Police Magistrate. Referred to Finance Committee.

Mr. Philip Sprague offered himself as a candidate for the office of tavern-inspector.

Mr. J. Hirsch asked to be relieved from the payment of taxes on his new factory.

A sufferer complained that the streets of the town were unknown by name to many, and hoped the Council would see the propriety of taking immediate steps to have the names of streets painted and put up in conspicuous places. Referred to Road and Bridge Committee.

Mr. Jerry Kelley asked for assistance, as he was suffering from rheumatism. Referred to Finance Committee. A similar petition from a man named Wilson was referred to the same Committee.

The use of the Town hall and Council chamber was granted to the Fire Brigade, free of charge, for their ball on Thursday evening.

Mr. Massie read the following communication from Dr. Clarke:—

I hereby offer to grant a lease to the town of the site of St. George's Church, in St. George's Square, Guelph, at a rent of \$500 per annum for ten years, payable half yearly from first of January last. Said lease to contain an option on the part of the town to purchase the property for \$6,250, payable at any time within ten years. The town to pay me \$1,000 for gravel and sand if removed, and if lot not afterwards purchased, this sum to be deducted from price if town purchase the lot. The town to have a right to encumber the lot except by the two stone pillars.

Mr. Hogg moved, seconded by Mr. Chadwick, that the petition of Mr. T. W. Saunders be granted, and that his salary be \$800 per annum.

Mr. Massie thought it would be best to refer the petition of Mr. Saunders to the Committee on Finance, in order that we might get a report on it.

Moved by Mr. Massie, seconded by Mr. Horsman, that the offer of Dr. Clarke be accepted, and that a by-law be introduced on the subject in view and read a first and second time.

Mr. Hefferman thought it would be well to refer the offer of Dr. Clarke to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Massie had no objection, and withdrew his resolution, and the matter was referred to the Finance Committee, and the application of Philip Sprague was out of order.

Mr. Howard thought otherwise, and considered Mr. Sprague's application perfectly in order. Mr. Massie was of the same opinion.

Moved by Mr. Richard Mitchell, seconded by Mr. Chadwick, that the by-law for the appointment of Assessors, Collectors, and Tavern Inspector be read a third time and passed.—Lost.

Moved in amendment by Mr. McLagan, seconded by Mr. Crowe, that the by-law be not now read a third time, but that the Council go into Committee on the whole on its consideration.—Carried.

The Mayor held that the amendment was out of order, and appealed to the Council to sustain his ruling. Six members of the Council sustained the Mayor's ruling, and seven voted against it.

Mr. Chadwick was not satisfied with the vote, and called for the yeas and nays, insisting that the Mayor should vote.

Messrs. Howard and Massie never heard of such a thing as a member of Council insisting on the Mayor voting. The yeas and nays were taken.

For Mr. McLagan's amendment—Messrs. Massie, Howard, McLagan, Kennedy, Bell, Crowe, and Hogg—7.
 For Mr. Mitchell's motion—Messrs. Hefferman, Horsman, Robert Mitchell, Coffee, Richard Mitchell, and Chadwick—6.

Council went into Committee of the whole, in accordance with amendment, Mr. Crowe in the chair.
 Mr. Chadwick said that because Croft beat Ainley in a fair fight, at last meeting, Ainley's friends wanted to take advantage of Croft's friends because there was not a full Council. Croft had been appointed inspector by a majority of the Council, and no power or right was left to change that now. It was a small, mean, contemptible piece of business to attempt to change the by-law at its third reading. (Cries of order, order.)

Mr. Bell moved that rule 37 of the Council be suspended. Lost for want of a seconder.

Moved by Mr. Massie, seconded by Mr. McLagan, that the Committee do now rise. Carried on a division.

The Mayor again took the chair, insisted that Mr. McLagan's amendment was out of order, and held that Mr. Croft was elected.

Mr. Massie said that if the Mayor's ruling was right there was no necessity of reading a by-law a third time at all.

Lagan's motion was out of order, and would have the Council go into Committee of the whole on the by-law. Lost for want of a seconder.

Mr. Coffee was pained to see some of the members of the Council so obstreperous. He was satisfied that Mr. Croft was a good man, and hoped that the Mayor would rule against such high-handedness. He would pledge himself to vote for the best interests of the town.

Mr. Howard was astonished to see any one objecting to the fitness of Mr. Ainley for the office of Inspector. He believed that the last named gentleman was the best in the lot. (Laughter.) Mr. Howard meant Mr. Ainley, but it so happened that Mr. Sprague's name was last mentioned, and as Mr. H. was supporting the old incumbent, the laugh came in.

The Mayor again said that he did not think the Council had the power to amend a by-law on the third reading.

At this juncture of the proceedings, Mr. Hogg being mixed up considerably, the Clerk stood upon his feet and wanted to know how he could record such contradictions on the minutes.

Mr. Chadwick was of opinion that the Council had better start afresh.

The friends of Mr. Croft had put off time until Mr. Hogg had been sent for, should arrive. Mr. Hogg took his seat, and Mr. Hefferman asked that the vote be taken again.

Mr. Massie held that by-laws could be changed at any time before the third reading, notwithstanding that the Mayor had ruled otherwise.

The Mayor then called upon all who were favorable to Mr. Mitchell's motion (that the by-law be read a third time and passed) to rise, when a tie occurred. The Mayor gave his casting vote in favour of the motion, which was then decided carried.

The by-law was then read a third time and passed.

Mr. Mitchell read the report of Road and Bridge Committee, recommending that \$200 be placed to their credit.

The report of the Fire and Water Committee was read by Mr. Hefferman, which recommended that Hawley Call's salary for the present year, be \$100, provided that he finds an assistant engineer and thoroughly instructs the caretaker in the proper management of the engine. Also recommended that \$200 be placed to their credit for the purchase of wood and incidental expenses. The report was received and adopted.

The Relief Committee asked for a grant of \$300, which was given.

Moved by Mr. Massie, seconded by Mr. Horsman, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to acquire a leasehold of St. George's square for the use of a public garden, and hold it for all time a first and second time. Carried.

Mr. Chadwick objected to the introduction of a by-law for any such purpose, and thought that \$6,250 was altogether too much money for the property. It was not right to assess the town for the benefit of a few on upper Wyndham street.

Mr. Hefferman was of Mr. Chadwick's opinion.

Mr. Massie was astonished to hear the gentlemen so express themselves. The property holders of upper Wyndham street were prepared to purchase St. George's square, and hold it for all time to come, on certain conditions. A vote was taken on Mr. Massie's motion, which was declared to be carried.

Mr. Hefferman insisted on the yeas and nays being taken.

In favor of the motion—Messrs. Massie, Howard, Horsman, Coffee, Bell, Kennedy, McLagan, Crowe, Robert Mitchell, Richard Mitchell, Hogg—11.

Against the motion—Messrs. Chadwick, Hefferman and Holliday—3.
 Moved by Mr. Chadwick, seconded by Mr. Hogg, that the Road and Bridge Committee ascertain the cost of getting the names of the streets painted and put up.—Carried.

Ontario Legislature.

Feb. 17.
 Mr. Scott (Grey) asked if it is the intention of the Government to proceed with the erection of the Agricultural College and other buildings on the ground purchased by the late Government at Mimico for that purpose.

Attorney-General Mowat said that the policy of the Government in relation to the Agricultural College would be announced to the House shortly.

Mr. Fawcett moved for the appointment of a Select Committee into the working of the Tavern and Shop License Act of 1868, and into the subject of the Liquor Traffic of the Province, the said Committee to have power to send for persons and papers. Carried.

Mr. Frazer resumed the debate on the remainder of the sitting, and at the close, at the request of the leader of the Opposition, the debate was adjourned.

Effects of Running Horses.

On Tuesday, the 8th of October last, as Mr. John McMillan, of Springs, his wife and children were returning from Erin Show, when about a mile from the village two teams came up to them at fall gallop, running abreast. In trying to save themselves from being run over, they were driven into the ditch, and Mr. McMillan was thrown from his buggy, breaking the small bone of the right leg near the knee. The names of the men who drove their teams so furiously as to cause this accident, were Johnston and Kerr, both of whom appeared before Judge McDonald, last week, to answer the charge. After the hearing of two witnesses the case was withdrawn by defendants paying plaintiff \$100 damages, and costs of Court. The plaintiff's costs were \$81. Mr. A. H. McDonald, for plaintiff; Mr. Guthrie for defendant.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A young man named Robert, son of Mr. John Grievie of the fourth concession, Eramosa, met with an accident one day last week, in Michigan, U. S., where he had been laboring for the past twelve months. By some unaccountable means a tree fell upon him, causing such injury that the unfortunate young fellow died shortly afterwards. His remains were brought home for interment to-day. The family have the sympathy of the community.

Toronto Correspondence.

We have had any amount of entertainments during the past week. Balls, lectures, legislative debates, mass meetings, theatrical sensations, &c., being amongst the most noteworthy of the mental pabulum afforded the citizens of the "Queen City," so that if the intellectual and non-intellectual appetite has not experienced satiety, the fault can not justly be attributed to a want of variety of choice.

The citizens were considerably startled to observe, in the papers of Friday last, that some person connected with the Marmora Mining Company had been brutally assaulted by a gang of men on Simcoe street, and robbed of some \$500. An attempt was made to steal the person's watch also, but in the hurry to secure their booty they jerked it out of the man's pocket with such violence that it parted company with the chain and buried itself in the adjacent snowbank. It is supposed the murderous weapon, called a *skull-cracker*, was used on the occasion, and it is likewise probable that the assassin must have previously "spotted" their man, who had probably incautiously displaying his temporary riches. It is remarkable that such a villainous assault should have taken place at so frequented a spot, and at such an hour, when members of Parliament and others must, in all probability, have been returning in groups to the Parliament Buildings.

A friend stated to me an exceedingly strange circumstance that occurred a few nights ago, and, if true, of which few seem little doubt, reveals an alarming state of matters connected with our Police Force. The case as stated to me is as follows:—Between 10 and 11 o'clock about ten days ago, two young men left a house on Queen street, with the view of returning to their homes. After walking a short distance they perceived two policemen walking together on the opposite side of the street. They had recently done more than get slightly abreast of the policeman than they heard the crash of a window pane in the immediate vicinity of the policeman, and with almost lightning rapidity the proprietor of the store, lamp in hand, appeared at the door with the view of ascertaining the delinquency. The two policemen and the two young men alluded to, were, it is asserted, sole occupants of the streets at the time of the occurrence, and it being necessary to make some show of lynx-eyed activity, they ran across the road and seized the young men, accusing them of being the perpetrators of a crime. They stoutly protested their innocence, and the impossibility of their having done it, referring the policeman at the same time to the parties living in the house they had just left, and the enquiry being satisfactory on the point required, the young men were released from further custody. The policeman of Toronto present an almost unrivaled appearance with reference to mere "physique," whatever may be their virtues morally.

The Rev. Dr. Topp, having been appointed lecturer *pro tem*, in one of the theological courses of Knox College, finds the task assigned him incompatible with the due performance of his pulpit duties, and has arranged to have the pulpit of Knox Church supplied, during the Theological Session, with some of the more eminent of ministerial celebrities, and during the first of Sabbath school terms, to have the services of Rev. Dr. Punshon as a preacher of one of its anniversary sermons, and so talismanic is the influence of his rich pulpit gifts that, by ten o'clock, the church was crowded, numbers contenting themselves with inconvenient sitting or standing places, the numbers retired from the doors in sheer despair. Those who were fortunate enough to secure accommodation were treated to a masterly and eloquent sermon of impressive appropriateness to the occasion.

I have had the pleasing satisfaction of witnessing in the new famous Provincial "Metropolitan Tabernaclc," which seems to possess in remarkable excellence all the characteristics deemed requisite in so large and magnificent a building; its comfort is unquestionable, its church furniture is exceedingly rich and artistic, its lighting is faultless, its acoustics perfect, and to the spectator standing behind the pulpit, the view of the interior, especially on an evening, with the various pews occupied, presents a spectacle that cannot fail to impress him with rapturous delight. The organ, too, is a magnificent instrument, and accords forth its inspiring strains of solemnity, its melodious notes of praise, joined in vocal effort by a numerous, well-entitled choir of choice voices in the various parts. The preacher on the occasion was the Rev. Mr. Cochrane, brother-in-law of Mr. J. A. Davidson, of The Manxton office, and who delivered a most admirable, instructive, impressive sermon on the occasion. I understand that he had conducted the service since his recovery from that very prostrating and almost fatal attack of typhoid fever, which laid him aside from pasturing duty since the latter part of the summer of 1872. The reverend gentleman still bears the marks of his recent invalidism, in the delicate looking cast of his countenance, although one fails to find any trace of it in his voice, which yields forth its fervid utterances in tones of a clear pellucid characteristic, and of volume indeed that it were well with which nature adorned every public speaker. I understand that the rev. gentleman has declined the Wesleyan Japanese Mission principally, it is said, on account of his better half's objection to so distant a separation from enlightened civilization.

On Saturday night, while Mr. John Wright, Freight Manager of the Great Western Railway, Paris, was at church, his house was entered by robbers, who took his watch and \$50 in money, besides other valuable articles. The same parties broke into the Grand Trunk Railway ticket-office and a grocery store close by during the night, but did not get anything. No trace as yet has been discovered of the guilty parties.

On the evening of the 15th inst. an oyster supper was given at the Commercial Hotel, New Hamburg, by Mr. Samuel Hearn, as a token of thanks to his friends for the honor they have conferred upon him in electing him Reeve of this place for the last two years, also Warden for the County of Waterloo for the present year.

Asylums for the Insane.

We have received the report of the Inspector and the Medical Superintendent of the Asylum for the insane in Toronto, for the year ending first October, 1872. The total number of patients admitted to the Asylum during the year was 148--88 men and 50 women. The number of deaths that have taken place during the year was 27 men and 11 women. The receipts from the payment of patients' board has increased from \$3,477.78 in 1866, to \$16,046.28 for the present year; the total receipts from all sources amounted to \$16,303.37. Deducing this amount from the entire cost of the Asylum, we find that the actual cost to the Province of maintaining the Asylum for the year was \$64,977.44. When one approaches the subject of provision for imbricates, its magnitude is almost disheartening. There are more imbricates than lunatics in this Province requiring benevolent protection; and there are more families suffering under the consequences of intemperance, than under all the domestic horrors and disquietudes of insanity. If every tavern in Ontario represents only one imbricate, requiring asylum provision, this estimate falls far short. Restoration of the curable insane, when they are timeously submitted to asylum treatment, is not a very tedious process; but the reclamation of imbricates is not to be achieved in any brief period of time. From the report it would appear that insane women live longer than insane men. The discharges of the year have been 78, together with 2 elopements, of whom 57 were recovered, 17 much improved, and 4 unimproved. The two who eloped were in a state of fair mental competency. One was so rational as to make his way to Buffalo, and there to resume his occupation as a skilful machinist, at good wages. His insanity was manifested exclusively in jealousy of his wife, unfounded, no doubt, as all jealousy usually is. The second eloper made himself a key of tough wood, and let himself out at a suitable time in the evening. His whereabouts was learned, but the farmer for whom he was working declared he was not insane, and would not part with him. Since the establishment of the asylum, thirty-two years ago, Wellington has contributed 162 inmates. The total applications for admission during the year have been 282, only 148 of the number were admitted. Of the 134 unadmitted 37 were awarded admission, but their friends declined to avail of the vacancies offered. Of the number admitted during the year 32 were discharged, 6 died, 13 remained curable, 31 doubtful, 14 very doubtful, and 45 incurable. The general appearance of the patients, both in respect to clothing and personal cleanliness, is most satisfactory. With the exception of shoes, all the clothing is made at the Asylum, by the patients, with the assistance of a tailor on the male side, and a seamstress on the female side of the institution. Every corridor, dormitory, and room in the Asylum is in the best possible order, and in the highest state of cleanliness throughout; and the general administration of its affairs is most efficient, and highly creditable to Dr. Workman, who has had the management for the past twenty years.

Complimentary Dinner to Mr. B. H. Kean.

The leading men in Nassagaweya, besides a number of the most intelligent and public spirited residents in the surrounding Township, entertained Mr. B. H. Kean, late Reeve of Nassagaweya, at a public dinner on Thursday evening the 14th inst. in the large Hall attached to the Hall House, Hartonville, on the occasion of his leaving the Township to take up his residence in Nelson. The Hall was liberally decorated for the occasion with evergreens, and presented a fine appearance. Two tables extended the whole length of the hall. Mr. M. Lyons acted on the occasion, and the excellent and variety of the viands supplied gave great satisfaction. Close on a hundred set down to dinner. The Chair was occupied by Mr. John Ramsay, Reeve of the Township, the Vice-Chairman being Mr. Thomas Elliott, Deputy Reeve. Among the company present were Messrs. George Easterbrook, John Kean and D. Gillies, Councillors, Nassagaweya; John Wallie, Reeve, and Henry Foster, Deputy Reeve of Nelson; W. B. Irons, Warden of the County; Drs. Buck, Starr, Carter, Winn, &c. Mr. S. R. Lister asked a blessing, and when all had done ample justice to the good things so abundantly supplied, the Chairman gave the first toast.

"The Queen and Royal Family." In proposing it he remarked that there was no portion of the people of Canada more loyal than those living in Nassagaweya. The toast was honored with three hearty cheers.

"The Army, Navy and Volunteers" came next and was received with enthusiasm. Mr. Henry Foster responded to the toast.

"The Governor-General" followed, and was received with three hearty cheers. Mr. Wallie was called on and suitably responded.

"The Dominion and Ontario Governments" came next, and responses were made by Mr. Lyons and Mr. Foster. The Chairman called on the company to fill a bumper to the next toast, which was the toast of the evening, and which had been the means of bringing them together to show their respect to a faithful and long-trying servant, who had for years spent his time and talents for the good of

the Township. He then proposed the health of the guest of the evening, Mr. B. H. Kean, which was received with the greatest enthusiasm and cheers more than thrice renewed.

Mr. Kean in returning thanks, said he had lived in the Township for over forty years, and he would leave the company to judge of his feelings when on the eve of leaving his old friends and neighbors to take up his residence in an adjoining Township. He spoke at some length on the first settlement and progress of the Township to the present time, and briefly referred to the business transacted by the Council during last year.

The other toasts were "The Legal Profession," responded to by Mr. S. R. Lister, "The Medical Profession" by Dr. Starr, Georgetown; Dr. Buck, Trafalgar, Dr. Carter, Acton, and Dr. Winn, Nassagaweya; "The Agricultural interests of the County," ably responded to by Mr. P. Campbell, Nelson, and Allan Ramsay, Nassagaweya; "The Mercantile interests of the County," by Mr. John Easterbrook and Mr. S. R. Lister; "The County Council," by Mr. W. D. Lyons, Warden, Mr. John Wallie, Reeve, Nelson, and Dr. Henry Foster, Deputy Reeve, Nelson; "The Township Council of the Township of Nassagaweya," by Mr. John Ramsay, Reeve, Mr. Thomas Elliott, Deputy Reeve, Mr. John Kean, Mr. George Easterbrook and Mr. Duncan Gillies, Councillors; "The manufacturing interests of Canada," by Mr. D. Wheligan and Mr. James Menzies. The proceedings were enlivened several times during the evening by songs by Mr. E. Chapman who was in excellent voice for the occasion, and was heartily cheered.

After several other toasts and songs, the proceedings were brought to a close about two o'clock, with a vote of thanks to the Chairman, and singing the National Anthem. The best of feeling prevailed during the evening.

The Municipal Loan Fund, the Distribution of the Surplus, the Estimates and the Model Farm question are all promised for this week in the House.

It is reported that Mr. Dormer, of Victoria, will move the address first reply to the Speech from the Throne at the opening of Parliament.

The Quebec Bar has had a sitting which strongly condemned the action of the Local Government in delaying legislation with respect to the loss of documentary papers in the late fire at the Court House.

Four thousand miners have resumed work in Wales.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Rockledge, of Kincardine, celebrated their golden wedding by a family re-union at their residence on Monday.

The Paris and Galt curling clubs met on the Galt ice on Monday. The ice was very soft, and play was only continued for one hour. At the end of that time the Paris club was nine shots ahead.

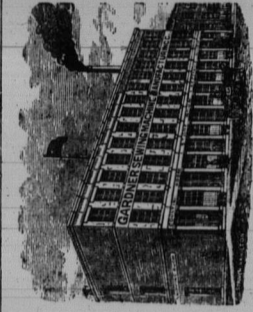

CHAPTER VI.
EVIL TIDINGS FOR MRS. LANGTON—THE FATAL DISCOVERY.

In a charming boudoir, the predominating features of which were blue satin and gold, sat the mistress of this princely abode, writing at an elegant desk inlaid with ivory. We have seen Mrs. Langton before this, and the reader will remember the occasion and the circumstances.
