The Fishery Question Settled by the Treaty of Washington.

The laws required to carry into effect the articles of the Treaty of Washington in relation to the fisheries having been passed by the Congress of the United States on the one part, and by the Imperial Parleament of Great Britain and the Legislature of Newfoundland on the other, the President has issued a proclamation declaring that such articles shall take effect, in accordance with article thirty-three of said treaty between the citizens of the United States of America and Her Majesty's subjects in the colony of Newfoundland, on the 1st day of June next.

The articles of the treaty referred to in the President's proclamation provide that for a term of ten years is hold and fish of all kinds, except is hold and fish of the hold and of the rivers falling into them, and except fish preserved in oil, being the produce of the fisheness of the United States or of the Dominion of Canada or of Prince Edward's Island, shall be admitted into each country tree of duty, there being an agreement that the people of one country may fish on the coast and shores of the other without being restricted by any distance from the shore; and that it is also agreed that one country in transporting goods from one of its ports to another shall have free transit through the intermediate territory.

We learn from the Globe that the Hon. Mr. Mowat is taking steps for the consolidation, of the Provincial Statutes—a work of no small labour, but of the first importance to the legal profession as well as to the people at large. Our contemporary says that the Attorney General has engaged the services of Messrs. Langton and Kingsford, of Toronto, two young and talented lawyers, who are well qualified to perform the work. They will classify all the laws of, or effecting, the Province of Ontario; and adhering as strictly as possible to the language of the existing Statutes, they will consolidate in one volume all the Acts over which the Provincial Legislature has jurisdiction, and arrange for publication in another values all the Acts over

the Provincial Legislature has jurisdiction, and arrange for publication in another volume all the Acts over which the Provincial Legislature has not jurisdiction, but which form part of our judicial code.

In order to secure thorough accuracy in the arrangement and consolidation of the Statutes, Mr. Mowat proposes to appoint an honorary commission, composed of the highest legal functionaries, whose duty it will be to finally revise the labors of Messrs. Langton and Kingsford. This will be the best possible guarantee that the work will be carefully and correctly done, and when completed it will form a most valuable look of reference to the lawyers and pleted it will form a most valuable look of reference to the lawyers and to the public.

From British Columbia. Mr. Robert Dickie, son of Mr. John Dickie of Puslinch, writing from Lake Lahach Valley, on the east side of the Cascade Mountains in British Columbia, says that that locality is better adapted to the rearing of cattle than for agricultural pursuits; as the land has to be irrigated before a crop can be produced. This necessity arises from the fact that the moisture from the Pacific Ocean condenses, and falls before reaching the summit of the Cascade Mountains, and consequently never neaches the valley beyond. Butter and beef are the chief producbeyond. Butter and beef are the chief production of this region, the former selling at 50 ets. per lb on the fort. In whiter the cattle are not housed (except the calves) and are fed with hay, which grows in natural meadows. These meadows are flooded with water until near the end of June. They resemble our swamps, but the hay is of much better quality than that produced here on low uncultivated grounds.

In the valleys below Lake Lahach valley, the cattle receive no attendance during winter, but subsist on a plant called sage-weed, which grows from one to two feet high; but a severe winter causes many of them to die.

Stock has decreased in value fully one half within the last two years.

As to how he likes the country, Mr. Dickie says that nothing could induce him to settle permanently in it; as farming in the farming districts scarcely pays the trouble of taking the produce to market.

No doubt when travelling facilities are improved, railway and communication established, agricultural interests will not be at such a discount.—Com.

London, June 1st.—A despatch from forecce says: 12,000 inhabitants of the city of the city of Fez have risen in consequence of the reimposition of the gate tax. All business is stopped, but at last accounts there had been no fighting.

London, June 2nd .- The Times con tradicts the reports of the complete with-drawal of Cunand steamers from Boston because of the scarcity of freight, and states that the only change to be made is that some of the steamers which go to Boston will return by way of New York. The national line will establish a weekly service to Boston on a similar plan. Madrid, June 1st.—A Spanish frigate

has arrived at Orin, Algiers, to take on board and bring to this country the convicts who escaped from Carthagena at the time of the suppression of the Intransigente insurrection.

Melbourne, May 30th.-The ship British Admiral, from Liverpool for this port, went ashore on King's Island, in Bass Strait, and became a total wreck. She had on board forty-four passengers and a crew of thirty-eight persons, and all were lost except four passengers and five seamen. King's Island is uninhabited and very dangerous to shipping, several vessels having gone ashore there and become totally lost.

New York, June 1st .- The hod-carriers by order of the Labourers' United Benevolent Society, struck to-day for higher wages. This strike necessarily prevents bricklayers and masons from working, and is likely to cause much distraces.

New York, June 2.—The Herald says It is reported from Washington that LACROSSE AND RUBBER BALLS Secretary Fish will interfere to prevent landing on the Atlantic Coast of the new cable and asks, in whose interest. The Communist, Rochefort, dined with

M. Pelletur last evening, and received a-few members of French Societies, but declines attending any of their meeting, or taking any action in politics at present. He will lecture here on Friday morning and sail for Europe next week. Chicago, June 1st.—A large and ex-

cellent brick, corner of Madison and Market streets, owned and occupied by M D. Wells & Co., wholesale manufacturer and shoes, was entirely destroyed by fire this morning. The loss on the stock is not less than \$300,000, and on the building \$90,000. The building was insured for \$60,000 and the stock for \$200,000.
