Mrs. Keans, Author and Com poser of the "Riders of the Plains."


Mrs. (Dr.) Keane (nee Amy Hoskins) author of the accompanying song and music, "The Riders of the Plains," is a native born Canadian, the third daughter of the late L. Hoskins, a ploncer of the Northumberland county, Ontario. Ontario was badly off for schools and teachers in its early days of settlement, and as Mr. Hoskins was university education, he was requested by his fellow settlers to take charge of the district school, and hence taught school for many years after coming for this country.
