Chicago, May 23.—All prospects of a cessation of the strike have disappeared and it will be open war from this time on. A conference looking toward adjustment was held tonight between James B. Barry, business agent for the express drivers' union, and the local managers of the seven express companies. The conference had been set for an early hour in the afternoon, but owing to the failure of Mr. Barry to receive proper notice it was postponed until this evening. When the meeting finally took place, the conversation was brief and pointed. Business Agent Barry opened the negotiations by saying: "Our position is this: I want all the men reinstated except those who have been guiky of violence. I cannot do anything different. That is what the local unions want, and that is what the local officers have told me to demand. The men told me they all want to go back in a body or they wont go back at all. That is the position of the union and the union officers."

The reply of the representatives of the express companies was: "Our opposition to the reinstatement of the men will be the same four years from now as it is today. We will not take them back under any conditions."

This brought the conference to a close and all parties concerned in it left the city hall.

Strike Again Spreads.

The spread of the strike was today not as large as was anticipated, it being understood in many quarters that there was still a possibility of peace being reached. Four hundred and sixty-two drivers employed by twenty-eight firms belonging to the lumbermen's association went out today. In each case the men were ordered to make deliveries to boy-cotted houses. Other firms to the number of fifty-five belonging to the lumbermen's exchange will make similar requests of their men tomorrow, and by night it is expected that the full number of 2,000 drivers employed by these lumber concerns will be on strike.



They came from Toronto, where James and William Ramsay were employed in the well-known candy house of Robertson Bros., and started in the wholesale candy line in Victoria, remaining there about six months, when they bought out the aforesaid company in Vancouver. They remained in the candy business for about ten years, when they bought out the Imperial Syrup Co., opposite the B. C. Sugar Refinery, on Powell street.

About two years afterwards they installed a cracker plant, for the manufacture of all kinds of fancy and plain is biscuits. This might be a more serious matter than it is if Mr. Emerson represented a large element of the logging interests of the Coast, but from information we have received, the membership is made up of persons principally in his own employ. His statements, therefore, are made largely upon his own responsibility.

As already intimated, the limits of the company were examined by independent experts on behalf of British investors, and their reports were very favorable indeed, more than sustaining, we understand, the representations made by the promoters. It would be very unwise now for the Government, even if it were so inclined, to place obstacles in the way of the industry being undertaken as soon as possible as arranged for. Of course, it would be impossible in British Columbia to get a limit with sufficient pulp timber on it for the purpose required without including other timber suitable only for lumber, but the pulp and paper company will be obliged to pay the "egular dues on such timber as do those engaged in logging. Besides, it would have been an act of sheer folly for the promoters to have pursued a policy of misrepresentation and fraud, such as it alleged, in order to induce capitalists to invest. The promoters are paid largely in stock of the company, which would be worth so much waste paper if the limits were useless for pulp making.

GOES NORTH AS GOVERNOR

Appointment of W. W. B. McInnes as Yukon Commissioner Formally Passed at Federal Cabinet Council.

Ottawa, May 20.—(Special.)—Frederick Congdon left for the Coast today, having abandoned all hope of securing the appointment as commissioner of the Yukon. It is likely the government will find something else for him. The question of filling the vacant office was discussed in the cabinet today, and it was decided that W. W. B. McIanes should get the plum. The formal order appointing him will at once be sent to the Governor-General at Toronto for his signature.

Mr. McInnes has been at Ottawa for the past two weeks in connection with the appointment announced above, which, as stated in the Colonist just one month ago, was practically decided upon at that date, although, for political reasons, the formal announcement has been withheld. Mr. McInnes is a son of the late Hon. Thomas R. McInnes, who, during a long residence in this province, himself took a foremost part in public life, successively serving in the parliament, the senate and the executive mansion. His son, the coming governor of the Yukon, entered public life as member of the House of Commons for Nanaimo city (where he was practicing law) ten years or more ago, being, so far as known, the youngest member ever seated in the Canadian parliament; and quickly winning a place for himself among the older heads by his energy and effective style in debate—"the boy orator from British Columbia" he was duly, if informally, christened in very short order. His career at Ottawa was not of an extended character, the "boy orator" resenting the failure of the government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to redeem its promises in the matter of Chinese imigration restriction, and resigning in protest. Entering provincial politics as member for Nanaimo, he was for a time provincial secretary in the Dunsmuir government, and at the division of the local legislature on party lines, he was by many regarded as the natural choice of the party for the leadership—a position which many impartial critics believe he is infinitely better fitted to fill than is the member for Rossland, the compromise selection of British Columbia's Liberals in the local House, who now is their accepted chieftain.

The new governor of the Yukon is perhaps the youngest appointee to so high office under the British flag, being not yet thirty-five years of age. The Yukon commissionership is a particularly attractive office, the salary being \$12,000 per annum, exclusive of the executive mansion, or official residence, and an adequate appropriation for its maintenance.

### TROUBLE FEARED AT SALMO MILL

The Chinese and Japanese Now Protected by Armed

Harry Wright, M. P. P. for the Ymir district, arrived in town yesterday, not on pleasure but on business bent. He is here to see what can be done towards relieving the tension prevailing at Salmo, where a month ago 25 Japs and 18 Chinese were imported to work in the local shingle mill to the exclusion of white labor. At the time serious disturbances were averted by the calling in of provincial police, but the feeling against the Orientals is every day growing more intense and further trouble is brooding. Salmo is one of the little towns of the Kootenays where there is no love for the Chinaman or Jap—in fact, the people of the place were wont to boast that they never had or never would tolerate the presence of an almond-eyed Celestial within their boundary. Even the Chinese laundryman was unknown there. With such a sentiment prevailing, the feelings of the public can be understood when a batch of 43 representatives of the races was landed to supplant the white men engaged in and around the mill and logging camps. For days the newcomers had to be guarded by armed police, and even still they continue to be shut up on the mill premises, afraid to show themselves in public. Threats upon the lives of the men are freely made, and it is considered a moral certainty that some of them will come to grief, as they are marked men.

Mr. Wright's mission in Victoria is to see the owners of the Salmo mill, and also the Chinese and Japanese consuls, as well as the government. He fears that there is serious trouble ahead, and is anxious to avoid it if possible. If the Chinese and Japa are to remain at Salmo, and peace is to be preserved, Mr. Wright says that the police guard must be strengthened, and this he does not wish to encourage. Most of the men formerly employed about the mill are at present engaged in the neighboring mines, but they are still keeping a wicked eye on Salmo.


