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CARPENTERS AND JOINERS' FEDERATION.

THE HONOLULU VOLCANO IN FULL ENRAGE.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—Advises from Honolulu report that the flow of lava from the volcano threatens to cause serious losses at Hilo. It has advanced more than twenty feet in three days, and is moving at the rate of twenty-five feet an hour. Water offers no obstruction to the lava, which at times runs six feet under it, maintaining a white heat.

RETRIBUTION OF THE TRANSVAAL.
PRETORIA, Aug. 9.—The retrocession of the Transvaal to the Boers has been formally effected. The Boer government has issued a proclamation announcing the establishment of a South African republic, and a secretary of state and other officials have been appointed. The proceedings were orderly.

A BARN FIRED BY A THRESHING MACHINE.
BELLEVILLE, Aug. 9.—A threshing machine which was at work yesterday at Stephen Kildin's farm, Hungerford, took fire and was burned, and the horses attached to it were also badly injured. The barn with all its contents, consisting of hay, vehicles and implements, was totally destroyed; no insurance.

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WINNIPEG'S JULY REVENUE.
WINNIPEG, Aug. 9.—The customs returns for the month ending July 1881, show that the amount of duties collected was \$49,322.03, and for the corresponding month last year \$25,775.55, being an increase in favor of this year of \$23,546.48. The inland revenue returns for July show receipts \$11,171.71, and for the corresponding month last year \$9,022.62, an increase of \$2,149.09.

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
