The body of the duke of Albany will be embaimed and brought to England, at the end of next week to be buried at Frogmore. The cause of the duke's death was effusion of blood into the stomach and lungs. There were no unusual premonitions, but the symptoms have long been threatening. [The late prince was the intelligent, the most earnest, the most highly cultured of the sons of the Prince Consort, and he is said to have resembled At the time of Prince Albert's death, Prince Leopold was only in his ninth year, having been born April 7, 1853, and being consequently at the time of his demise very near the completion of his thirty-first year. His royal highness filled the position of private secretary to the queen and in many ways occupied the position of confidential minister. In this office he manifested a faithfulness to the sovereign on the one side, and a courteousness to all on the other side with whom he came in contact that he won universal respect and admiration. Prince Leopold had little heart, it is said, for political questions, at any rate for political warfare he had no love, and was willing to leave the strife for other to engage in for others to engage in. Still he had his own opinions, and sometimes made them felt. In the negotiations with different statesmen during the ministerial interregnum of 1880 he was actively and no doubt usefully employed, and it is whispered that much of the alleged personal dislike of her majesty to the present premier is due to his not finding favor in the eyes of Prince Leopold. A letter-written by Queen Victoria soon after the birth of the prince explains why he was named Leopold. The letter was written before that month closed, and was addressed to Leopold, king of the Belgians and Victoria's uncle. In this letter she

writes:

Buckingham Palace, April, 1853.—I can report mostfavorably of myself, for I have never been better or stronger. Steckmer will have told you that Leopold is to be the name of our fourth young gentleman. It is a mark of love and affection, of which I hope you will not disapprove. It is a name which is dearest to me after Albert's, and one which recalls the almost only happy days of my sad childhood. To hear "Prince Leopold" again will make me think of those days! His other names will be George Duncan Albert, and the sponsors the king of Hanover, Ernest Hohenlohe, the prince of Prussia and Mary Cambridge. George is after the king of Hanover and Duncan is a compliment to dear Scotland.

The christening of the prince took place with the usual ceremony in the private chapel of Buckingham palace. King George of Hanover composed the hymn and music for the occasion, and during the remainder of his life evinced the greatest interest in his favorite godson. Soon after

Soon after the christening the royal family, including the Queen and Prince Albert, were prostrated by that popular disease of children, the measles. Strange to say, the little prince escaped; but when at eight years of age he was attacked by the same disease in so malignant a form that he has never fully recovered from its effects. As soon as he was able to endure the journey soon as he was able to endure the journe it was decided by the court physician to send him to France for a change o climate. After his return to England climate. After his return to England he was for many years seldom absent from the queen's residence. When she visited the king of the Belgians, or journeyed to Cobourg, Leopard accompanied her. Whether she stayed at Lucerne or retired to Rosenau—a place sacred to her from its associations with the early life of her husband—the child of her heart was there also. It is characteristic heart was there also. It is characteristic of her that she should select this son—whose delicate health had for so many years been a continual source of anxietyand make him the one central object of he ove and care. The prince was educated by Eaton tutors and spent three years at

Oxford university.
In 1880 Prince Leopold visited this coun try. He came in company with the Princess Louise, and after spending some weeks in Canada made an extended tour through the states. He was present at the convention which nominated the late President Garfield. On his return to Canida he went into camp with the vice-rega party in the Restigouche, where he met with an accident which, though it would have been slight to an ordinarily healthy man, prostrated him for months. The accident consisted of a wrench to the knee, which developed a tendency to white swelling. Throughout his life the prince suffered from an obscure disease. On the slightest provocation the blood would exude from the vessels. It is said that one of the skins was absent from his person and that this was the cause of his weak

He was married April 27, 1882, to the Princess Helena of Waldeck. The nuptials were celebrated in St. George's Adamsh chapel with royal magnificence. A daughter, Alice Mary Victoria, was born of this

THE FISHERY CLAUSES

THE MARITIME MEMBERS AN-MIOUS FOR THEIR RENEWAL.

Arrangement With British Columbia Confirmed-Rushing Business. OTTAWA, Ont., March 28 .- In the house

f commons to-day Mr. Chapleau introduced a bill to amend the civil service act. He explained that the amendments provided that in examinations for promotion the candidates should only be examined upon subjects in connection with the particular branch or department in which they were employed. Promotions for special qualifications must be made after consultation between the minister and his

Mr. Blake asked the government to state what the order of business would be for the remainder of the session

Sir John Macdonald said that the gov rnment were anxious that parliamen should be prorogued before Easter, and to ccomplish this they would abandon the franchise bill for the present session. There would be a few bills from the senate. and one or two measures of minor importance were yet to be disposed of.

An arrangement was then made that all notions for returns which were not to be discussed should be disposed of at once, and in half an hour nearly all the "innocents' were slaughtered.

Sir Charles Tupper moved the third reading of the bill to confirm the arrangement with British Columbia.

Messrs. Gordon and Homer protested against the bill. The former moved an endment to the effect that the bill should not go into force until its provi-sions should be submitted to the votes of the people of British Columbia.

The amendment was declared lost, and after remarks by Messrs. Mitchell, Shakespeare and Baker, of Victoria, the bill was read a third time and passed.

On the motion to go into committee of supply

supply, Mr. Davies called attention to the necessity of the government taking immediate action in reference to a renewal of the fishery clauses of the Washington treaty. Unless some action was taken this Unless some action was taken this session, parliament would not have another opportunity of dealing with the subject before the treaty was abrogated. Our fisheries should be used as a lever to secure a better commercial arrangement between the dominion and the United States, instead of being sold out for so much money, as had been done in the past. This was a subject of the greatest possible. Dr. White of Cottam has written to the government asking for an official investigation of the municipal affairs of that place, as they are badly muddled.

Canadians should not be put to the humiliation of another rebuff from the Washington authorities. He hoped whatever action the government might think fit to take would not be hampered

by such a resolution.

Mr. Mills pointed out that large quanti ties of coal were annually imported into Canada from the United States, while Nova Scotia coal was also exported to that country, and it was very desirable that some arrangement should be made with reference to this article.

the microscope worms were found in all stages. Ludwig Schultz and the Gallefamily of six, who ate pork at the same time, are all in a very serious condition. It is probable Schultz and four of the Gallefamily will die. The former is in a comatose condition, and is unable to swallow solid food. He cannot open his mouth or move his arms from his side.

THE TORIES TRIUMPHANT.

Mr. Gladstone's Government Defeated by a Majority of Eleven.

London, March 28.—In the commons to-night Albert Pell, conservative, moved a resolution in favor of the relief of local taxation. The government opposed the resolution, which was carried by a vote of 208 to 197. The result was greeted with loud conservative cheers and cries of "re sign, resign."

Sims Reeves, the Veteran Tenor. the well-known tenor singer, in an interview, declared that the sole cause of his frequent failure to fulfil engagements was gout flying to his throat. BUFFALO, N.Y., March 28.-Goldwin Smith talked politics here to-day. He said the Irish catholics were very troublesome in Canada. They form a distinct set, are in religious sympathy with the French are in religious sympathy with the French catholics of Quebec. The Irish catholics, he said, have no political principles, and simply seek plunder. Their vote is large enough to give them the balance of power, and they hold the parties in a kind of slavery. "Do not the Irish in Canada assimilate with the other population?" was asked. "Very slowly," was the reply. "They cling together and are very troublesome. Indeed they are a great curse to the politics of Canada." Mr. Smith also expressed a most unfavorable opinion of the Irish in Ireland. They make very little progress in civilization. 
