THE FAMINE IN INDIA.

It Threatens to Surpass in Famility the Russian Familie.

[Frank Van Allen, Medical Missionary to Medusa, in The Scientific American.]

The attention of the whole world is direct-In The Scientific American.]

The attention of the whole world is directed to the terrible famine in Russia, consequently it is not generally known that a similar scourge is efflicting India. In this country all the horrors which follow in the wake of starvation occur with fearful regularity every 15 years, or twice in every generation. The last great famine was in 1876, and it was estimated by the Government that 5,000,000 persons died of starvation and the two diseases that go with it—dysentery and famine fevor.

The cycle is completed again. Owing to a partial failure of rains, the fearful calamity of another famine was threatened a year ago. This year the rains have entirely failed; however, the famine is not yet at its height, for there are districts here and there where a slender harvest is possible, which for a few weeks will ameliorate the condition of the people who live in these favored parts. When this small supply of grain is exhausted the famine, which is already very serious, will grip the whole nation in its withering hand.

In many places fodder for cattle is unattainable, and the people are tearing thatches from buildings to feed the famine-ing animals. In other localities cattle are being killed in great numbers, as their owners are unable to feed them. Also thousands and thousands have died and are dying of starvation. Every effort is made to keep a certain number alive, which must be done at all hazards, for plowing when the next seeding time comes.



MR. BLAKE'S OPENING SPEECH. He Claims To Know Just What Gladstone

Londonderry, July 7.—In his opening address to a crowded meeting of Justin McCarthy's supporters yesterday, Mr. Blake said he had returned to the country of his origin, though not of his birth, to pay a debt which every son of Ireland owed to the old land. He had been asked by their representations of the land and help by their respected leader to come and help them in the struggle for justice and free-

dom.

He did not aspire to the leadership of the Irish party; he desired to serve in the ranks.

He denied that Mr. Gladstone's Home Rule scheme meant the separation and disintegration of the empire. On the contrary it would voluntarily bind the people of the three kingdoms teacher.

His experience with Home Rule in Canada had convinced him of the value of the establishment of an Irish Parliament under certain conditions and reservations, at the same time with all necessary power. For example, the Government would be of incalculable benefit to the Country and of great advantage to the Empire. There could be no religious persecution in Ireland as a result of the establishment of Home Rule, because the bill granting Home Rule would expressly prohibit interference with the religion of any man and what might be regarded as undue prominence and power of the priests in politics would be counteracted by giving the Government.



Guff From Gotham.

Henry Allen & Co. to John J. Dixon & Co.: The stock market to-day has been weak, and closing quotations show bottom prices. Exchange rates foreshadow further gold export and there are disagreements at Washington, which, according to Wall-street bears, will enable the free silver crowd to set party caususes at naught and force their cheap money legislation through the House. It has been a long while since Wall-street has had an exhibition of such sensitiveness as attaches to the present talk about congressional action. There will be no silver bill any more than there will be an anti-option bill passed. Much the most serious development in the financial situation came to-day through the announcement that the leading iron company of Pennsylvania has cut prices \$1 per ton. This has disheartened a good many people. It reflects a worse condition in the iron trade than has been anywhere anticipated, but a canvass of houses high in the trade this afternoon shows that this cut of one dollar is the worst thing possible and that nothing further in the same line can be done. The head of one of the most important commission houses in the iron trade says that at the present cut rate every ton of Iron that can be manufactured north or south will find a market at once. According to authorities like this the iron trade is likely to show improvement from this time on. Much of the weakness to-day has been caused by the uncovering of stop orders in two or three conspicuous stocks. These have threatened the market for some time. It is a relief to know that they are out of the way. Something of an advance has been imade in call loan rates, but in banking circles it is agreed that the rates which have been prevailing for some time past will soon be in force again. Money is likely to be easy enough throughout the remainder of the summer.
