The Prices of most kinds of Lumber have been highly remunerative to the manufacturers, though canal freights have been onerously high, and have somewhat decreased the profits, which would have otherwise proved to their benefit. Although prices were sustained, the demand was considerably checked, leaving on hand a much larger amount to be wintered than is usual in the market. The closing sales were at a slightly reduced figure, and indicate lower prices for another season. Manufacturers and western buyers should, therefore, be cautious. The receipts of good pine were diminished from Michigan, Illinois and Canada West, which have usually come to this market, having been diverted to Chicago, a place of great importance in the inland lumber trade. Heretofore it has taken mostly common pine; but it is now a formidable rival for the better qualities:-




