Lenten Services.

February 25th being Ash Wednesday there will be a Celebration of the Holy Communion at 8 a.m. and Matins and Holy Communion at 11 a.m. A special service for young people at 4.15 p.m. and the usual Evening Service at 8 p.m. Courses will be given on Wednesday evenings and Friday afternoons by the Rev. C. B. Kenrick and the Rev. C. A. Seager, and Evensong will be said daily (except on these days) at 5.30 p.m. On Thursdays there will be Celebrations of the Holy Communion at noon. Further particulars will be given in the Lenten Leaflet.

The Confirmation Classes are now in progress and are held on Fridays at 5 p.m. and at 8 p.m.

PARISH NOTES.

The month of January always reflects something of the warm and genial spirit of Christmastide, tangible results of which are seen in the various treats and entertainments in connection with the Parish. The regular Sunday Sel sol Festival was held on Tuesday, 13th, and was voted a grand success. First of all came tea, followed by some splendid selections from a phonograph, kindly lent by Mr. Arthur Hagarty, and then came a series of wonderful feats of conjuring, in which gold-fish and guinea-pigs grew out of hats and other unlikely things. Mr. Frank Kenrick was applauded to the echo for some of his manoeuvres, and many expect he will become a formidable rival of Kellar. Great mystery attended the performance, but some whispered that Mr. Harry Smith knew more about it than he appeared to. The evening closed with the distribution of a goodly number of prizes amongst the good and deserving. The next day saw the children of the Infant Class entertained at tea, after which, with a splendid impartiality, presents were distributed to every child. Then came the choir boys treat which had to wait for seasonable weather for their sleigh-drive. This took place on the 25th, a very cold night indeed, but any danger of chill was averted by hot chocolate, etc., at Patterson's, which was provided by the Rector. Other social gatherings of the month were on the 15th, when the Rev. Carey Ward lectured on Rome, and on the 30th, when Canon Sweeny gave his talk on the King's progress through London. Both lectures were beautifully illustrated, and an added attraction was the music and singing of Mrs Coward, Miss Rachael Gwyn and Mr. Bruce Harman.

THE YEAR OF 1902.

On looking over the February number of this paper for last year, one sees the first mention of the effort that was made last spring to pay off our floating debt of some \$1,500. Every one remembers how successful that effort was, more than \$1,200 being raised during the six weeks of Lent. Since then many necessary expenses had to be incurred for the church, and one almost feared that a fresh debt would take the place of the old. First of all we had to get a new furnace in the church, and outside many repairs had to be executed—the bricks were repointed, gables

blown down were renewed and strengthened and all the windows everywhere mended and done up. Then the organ had to be overhauled and renovated, with the result that we no longer are disturbed by its wheezings, creakings, or other vagaries. All these things cost money, and it was with some apprehension we attended the finance meeting of Jan. 12th. What was our relief to find that we only owe \$400, and even this it is hoped may be paid off by Easter. Not a bad showing for the parish church, which also well maintains its reputation of keeping its outside contributions up to the mark.
