The old time splendor of Mississippi river steamboating is to be revived between St. Paul and St. Louis during the season of the next summer by the Exposition organized in St. Paul.

Anthony one of the best known owners and operators of Mississippi steamboats, who for many years has been identified with the excursion business on the upper river. Paul D. Chandler, an official of the Mutual Transit Company, whose boats ply the great lakes between Buffalo and Duluth, has been chosen as general passenger agent.

The rapidity with which bookings are being made even thus early, would indicate that the success of this unique project is assured, and that the Company will be obliged to reject late applicants on account of lack of space.




