- W. B. Smith, a druggist in the smanl village of Drayton, Ont, has bowed to the times and gone under. His liabilities are little over $\$ 2000$ and his nominal assets something less. He is a worthy young man, nud possesses the confidence of his ecreditors sufficiently to secire a compromise. He was formerly in the grocery and hard ware business also with a Mr. McBenn; but they dissolved about two years since.

It would have been sonelhing marvellous if Mr. 'lifley, with all the outside assistance that he was able to procure, together with that of his enlleagues, had heen able to protuce a tanif that would sive universal satisfiction. lnereased taxes are never acomptatle to the gencmal publie, and it was ahsolutely meeessary
 nhtained from the eustons in addition to the old tarill. We have reat with care the very able sjecech in whish Mr. 'lilley's predecessor eriticiacel his fimacial statement. It camot be denied that Mr. Tilley and thase with whom he aeted, prior to the change of chministation, assumed the Provincial debts, a measure which, if they could have forescen events, they would probably have at least post poned. But after all, the buthen thown on Dominion revenues has been taken oft those of the Provinces, and the mass of the people are much th the same position. When these debts were assumed it was
not contemplaled that the Paeifie Raitway would be so serious a charge on the reveme, nor cond it have been reasomably aprehented that so severe a commercial depression would have fallen on the whole work. A good deal ol Mr. CartWright's speed was devoted to a criticism on Mr.'Thilley's bulged ot 1S73, and to at delenee of his own poliey, fopies into which we do not propnse to enter, at all erents at present. The tarift is the Guestion of the moment, ami Mr. C:untwrighti's eriticisms an it aro of contse deseving of respectint attention. 'Ihat darift has been visibed with severo censure not nuly hy the regnlar opposition, which fought the free tmate batele fairly at the hustings, hat likewise ly leating argans of public opinion in Great Britain and in the United States. Moreover, amons those who may he looked on as general sipporters of the fiseat poliey of the fiovermuent., there are many who take exception to the details on now grome or another.

We have alrealystater it asomb amion that the tariff proposed hy the fovernment mast he hold to be strietly in acomance with the pledges, which they gave to the constituencies during the campaign which preceded the general election: We do not pretend to have rath all the eampaizn speeches of the Premier, but we have noticed a very severe attack on him in the Gilobe, hased on a telegram sent to Mr. Boga ol St. Joln, N.B., in July last. It must he bome in mind hat this telegram was in reply to one liom Mr. Pned, informing him that. the fovernment press stated it fo be his intention to mise the tarift generally to (3i) per eent. 'lhis statement was hased on a speech said to have been delivered at Shalluog. Sir Jobn Macdonaldstated in reply: " 1 l is an absurd falsehood; "neither at d ondom nor elsewhere hive 1 "gone heyond my motion in limlimment, "anl hate never proposed an increase but "omly a reatinstmeat of tarifl:" Now the motion in Paliament. was frameal in gronemal tems, and was complatined of as nonemmuitial; indeed it was repeatedly alleged by theibopponents that it was mot the intention of the dovemment to make any matorial change in the farlt: Sin dolm Macdonald dedared that he houl nover proposed an increase, but only a realjustment ol the taviff, but surcly it is most umbeasomable to place streh a constutution on the alove language as to impute bad faith to the fiovermment because, limling atditional levemis absohutely necessary, in orter to meet the pullic expenditure, his Government should propose such increase on the basis
of his resolution in Purlinmentand of his public utterances. The necessity of rais. ing an alditional two millions of revenue is the keystone to the whole liscal poliey ol the Government.

We gather from Mr. 'l'illey's speech that he estimates the increased revente fonn placing unemumerated articles at 20 per cent. insteal of $17!$ at 5750,000 , which is a considamble portion ol the defieit. Now, even the most extreme free traders ctut harlly ohpect to his pmposition, which many of licir number axpected that. Mr. (ibtwright wonld haye himself proposed. Considering the deerease in the price of goods since the time when the tatith was la pel cent., it must, he abluilted that the consumbers of the gnods comprised in the thenmmeralen list will not pisy higher taxes on them than they did in. 1s:3. Jhaving dealt with Hat branch of the gurstion, the next subinet that would matumbly emgage considemation would be the free list. It must he admilted that no ariole shonld be allowed to reman on that list exception very special gromets. The polios herefofore has been to abmit fiee of duty, ar at a very low duty, several atieles not strictly raw material, but which are used extensively by our manufachurers. Among these are pig iron and bars, rots, mils amd other articles comins maler the renemal hent of iron, jig cop. per, lead, steel in ingots, tin in blocks, mine, do. All these articles were either on the free list or adnilled at a nominal dity, and when revenise became neeessary it. Was fomd impossible to leave lhem sin. They have accordingly heen sulpected to a dily of something like 10 per cent. ard valorem. It is scarcely necessary to remark that on all these articles the daties in the United States are at least comble or treble thase proposed. The other dutiable articles formerly on the free list ate agriculduma probluts, coal and sabl. It camot be denied that wide ditherences af opinion preval as to the wistom of the govermment poliey regarding these duties, and the question is complicated ly the emitroversy helween the farmors and millers as to the wheat and dont datios, When these duties were imposed in 1500 , 4 eents a bushel was the duty on wheat and 2 a cents a hamel on flomi, whereas the present proposal is l5 or lo cents on wheat and 50 cents on thour. The former is mapestimably ton high. in proportion to the latier, but it is satid that the sup. poiters of the Government fiom ontario are urgent for its imposition. It wouk handly have been possible for the Government to have avoided placing a duty on coal, and the probability is that they had to resist a strong pressure to make it 75 cents, the rate in the United States. It
would have been impossible to make a distinction between anthracite and bituminous coal without giving just ground of complaint to Great Britain, which will certainly keep a vigilant oye over our proceedings. The salt duty is precisely the same as that in the United States, but salt for the fisheries is free as it was before. We may have omitted noticing some articles on the free list on which duties have been imposed, but if so they cannot be of much importance.

If it be admitted that it was expedient or necessary to place duties on the articles in the free list to whichreference has been made, it seems only fair to the manufacturers to increase the duties on the perfectly manufactured article in which such articles as we have noticed are used as material, or in the case of coal as an auxiliary. The revenue duty being 20 per cent., protection has been given in specified cases by duties varying from 25 to 35 per cent. In the highest class is furniture, which is placed precisely at the same rate as that imposed in the United States. This duty will be in all probability prohibitory, but it is hardly probable that prices can be raised on a description of manufacture in which there is so much competition in every locality. The duties on cottons and woollens are much of the same character. A combined specific and ad valorem cluty is placed on such articles as are actually manufactured in Canada, and which have been exposed chiefly to the competition of the United States. 'The duties average from 25 to 30 per cent. ad valorem. All iron and steel manufactures are placed at high rates of duty, that is 25 to 30 per cent., owing to the imposition of duties on the materials formerly admitted free. Complaints have been made, and not without plausibility, that in some cases adequate protection has not been given to Canadian industries, as the duties on materials will place the manufacturer in a worse position than when they had them duty free, with-the incidental protection of the revenue duty of $17 \frac{3}{2}$ per cent., now raised to 20 per cent. The Finance Minister will, we have no doubt, listen to all well-founded complaints of this nature, and, if satisfied that they are juist, will make the necessary al. terations. Great care must be taken not to discriminate agninst Great Britain. We pointed out in our last number that the remission of the duty on sugar packages should be extended to the United King. dom.

## TREATY WITH FRANCE

We read with no litue surprise an arLicle in Le Journal de Quatec criticising some remarks of ours on the French tariff. We are charged with holding sentiments. extremely hostile to France, the proof of which charge is, that we criticised letters written under a nom de plame, the olject of which was to advocnte Canadian inde. pendence as the only means of obtaining justice from France. The writer of those letters affirmed that "in six months from " the day of Canadian independence our "Minister of Foreig" Amars will have "opened every frontier to the importation " of our goods on the terms of the most " favored nation." We took some pains to prove that the remedy was in our own hands, and it is for this that the Jomenal de Québec has taken us to trask. Judging from the tone of his remaiks, we should infer that he did not in the least comprehend the gist of our argument. He considers it singular that we should claim for Canada, which has invariably acted towards France with the utmost liberality, the right to be placed on the footing of the most favored nation, without purchas. ing that right by reducing our duties on French wines, which are imposed for revenue purposes alone. In order to enlighten our ignorance, the rather self-sufficient editor of Le Journal gives us a lecture on commercial treaties. He assures us that all tariffs have for their exclusive object the protection of national indus. tries, that protection is the policy of the United States, Germany, and even Canada, and that it is puerile to reproach France with its protective tariff. The writer proceeds to affirm that France does not impose differential duties, and that no other nation complains of its tariff. Our answer is very simple. We have made no complaint whatever of the Protectionist character of the French tariff. We have complained that Canada was not placed by France on the footing of the most farored nation, in other words, on the footing of Great Britain, and, we fully believe, of the United States. Le Journal is wholly ignorant of the subject which he discusses. France, we admit, has a general tariff, but it has commercial treaties with various nations containing what is known as "the most favored nation clause," and it was owing to this clause being embodied in the treaty with Great Britain that British ships were admitted to registry in France, in virtue of a treaty with some other power (we believe Austria), by which ships were admitted at'a lower duty than under the general tarifl. We may not be under the influence of the same prejudice in favor of France as the Jour-
nal, whon scems unable to believe in the possibility of any wrong doing on the part of that nation, but on the other hand we woull not treat France differently from any other nation: Canala has never imposed diserminating duties against France, and we maintain that if any such duties are imposed on her productions, she should promptly retaliate by refusing to admit French manufactures on the footing of the most faromed nation. The same principle we woul ! adout towards any other mation.
We have not failed to notice that the Journal complains that Prance has a just canse of complaint against Camada. He charges the Canadian Government of 186 with violating a stipulation made wilh the Consul-General of France. This, we atmit, is a serious charge, but it should be formulated with more precision. 1563 was, if we are not mistaken; the year when the Administration of the late Mr. J. Sanfiela Macdonald was in power, and there was a reconstruction of the Cabinct early in May. Some gentlemen now living were in both Administrations, viz. : Chief Justice Dorion, Mr. Macdougall and Mr. Mowland, while several others were in the new Cabinet, Mr. Molton having been Inspector General. We feel assured that a satisfactory explanation of the serious charge made by the Journal could be given, but it ought to be more precisely formulated.

## TIE UNITED STATES PRESS ON THE TARIFF.

It is not a little amusing to read the comments of our cousins across the border on the fiscal policy of the Canadian Gov. ermment. We have scarcely read one of those comments that does not betray the ignorance of the writer. The Boston Advertiser labors under the delusion that one scale of duties is imposed on goods from European countries and a higher scale on goods from the United States, and this by way of revenge. This idea has arisen from a total misconception of a passage in Mr . Tilley's speech. It by no means follows that because the tarifY will affect imports from the United States more than those from England that it is discriminating. For instance, there is a high duty placed on cabinct ware and firniture, and it happens that the imports of these articles are almost exelusively from the United States, but nevertheless the duty would be precisely the same if imported from England. Again, cotton goods are imported from England to the United States at duties ranging from 45 to 60 per cent. The very same kind of goods would pay 20 per cent. in Canada, but other qualities
of cotton goods defined, such as sheetings, drills, ducks, bleached and unbleached cottons, are subjected to a claty of 1 cent. per square yard and $1 \tilde{0}$ per cent. ad valorem, the United States duty being 5 ? cents and 10 per cent. Now these goods are manufactured in Canada, and are not largely imported from England. All that Mr. 'Tilley meant by his speech was that the Canadian manufacturers suffered more from the competition with the United States than with England, but he did not propose discriminating duties except in cases in which the United States has already discriminated against Canada, such as tea, coflee and other articles imported from places lying eastward of the Cape of Good Hope. The New Forls Therall imagines that the object of the tariff is to obtain a new reciprocity treaty, and advises that the United States should meet us in a frjendly spirit. We do not imagine that there are many in Canada who expect that any scheme of reciprocity can be devised that will satisfy both parties. At all events it is for the United States to state what they expect, and they may be assured that they will receive a prompt reply. The Boston Post has a great deal to learn as to the powers of the self.goveming colonies of the British Empire. He considers our tarifl scheme "equivalent to a threat of independence," and is surprised that any dependency should dream of "protecting its omn industries." Canada, too, is said to be "in a pitiful condition" and " $\dot{i}$ lamentable situation," but if this is the consequence of our very morlerate tariff; what must be the condition of the United States with dulies of 60 per cent. on a great variety of goods on which ours are 20 . It is refreshing to find the Doston Post so horrified at "the unigue conglomerate of specific and ad yalorem duties," as if such conglomeration was quite a new irlea which had never occurred to a citi\%en of the Union. But we are told that, accorling to the scheme, there is an average increase of from 17 to $3 \overline{3}$ per cent. Now the increase is really from 5 to 15 per cent., instead of what the Boston Post asserts it to be.

The New York Commercial Bulletin, having strong free-trade proclivities, cannot be expected to approve of the protectionist character of the tariff, but he does not do justice to Mr. Tilley in describing the measure as retaliatory. The Bulletin should bear in mind that increased duties were absolutely necessary; owing principally to the great fall in the price of goods, which necessarily operates to reduce an ad valorem tarify. The leading object of the Finance Minister was to raise two and a quarter millions of revenue
to compensate for the loss caused by the reduced values of our imports. The BulTetin wams us that the citizens of the Union are not given to nogotiate under a threat, the meaning of which is that we are to go on for another ten years with our commercial relations as they have been. We will present a case to the $B_{u}$ letin by wny of illustration. Coal is an article that every one in Canada would wish to be free of duty. Calmada has collieries in Nova Scotia, in the neighborhood of the North Eastern States of the Union, which would be her natural market, while on the other hand the consumers in Ontario and Quebec could obtain their conl more advantageously from Pennsylvania and Ohio. The United States persists in imposing a cluty of 75 cents a ton on coal, thereby excluding Camadian coal; while Canada has for years acimitted United States coal duty free. Aggrieved by this treatment, against which Canada has romonstrated for years, she lins at length imposed a duty of 50 cents on coal, and at once there is a cry of retaliation, threatening, \&c., de. We wish the Bulletin would have the candor to deal with this specific case, and we promise him that wo can give him several other nuts to crack that he will fand just as diflieult. The Bullctin further charges that the present Government " have not made any advances towards bringing about reciprocity:" 'his from an United States commercinl journal fully cognizant of the scheme submitted after protracted negotiations in JST4, and which, after having been apparently sanctioned by our Govermment, was summarily rejected by the Senate ! We sincerely trust that no Canadian Statesman will ever again expose his country to the humiliation of ljegging for a treaty of commerce with such a government as the United States. Inal the Government of the United States declared frankly, when applied to, that negotiation on the subject woiad be fruitless, no fecling of irritation would have been caused, but we presume that the difficulty lies in the constitution, which places peculiar obstacles in the wry of negotiations with foreign powers. It is hardly possible to negotiate a treaty of any-kind with such a body as the Scnate of the United States, and yet all negotiations with the Government of the country conducted with the confidential advisers of the Executive may be perfectly fruitless. It is not fair uncler the circumstances for the Jutletin. to complain that Canada, after her overtures being rejected, first at the treaty of Washington, and again in 1874 , should renew its application for a commercial treaty. It has gone to all reasonable
lengths when it has signified its perfect rendiness to negotiate, and it is certanly not for the United States to complain if it imposes duties much lower in almost every case than those to which it is sub. jected.

## THE BANK STATTMEENES.

The bank returns show a considerable increase in Govermment deposits buta decrease in the public deposits and circtlation. The requirements of merehants for the means of paying duties owing to the new tarift coming into force hive been considerable, and will tell more in the next statement. The overdue notes have increased during ten months, but are still less than at the comesponding period of 1878.

## TORONTO AND ITS SATSAGE COR TS

The Fire and Water Committee of Toronto have lately passed a resolution to the effect that, unless the fire insurance oflices agree to subscribe for the mainte. nance of that city's salvage corps, the same will be disbanded within the perior of two months. This would be somewhat severe upon the companies, for not only liave the latter fixel their rates of premium upon
the understanding that cortain means are provided for the protection against fire (including the sorps in question), but several of them formerly gave a donation towards the purchase of the stem fire engines, of which at one time the town possessed four, but the same committee. not very long ago either sold or gave away two of said steamers, concluding, weapresume, that such were quite superfluous in a city whose water works were capable of such wonderful performances as were exhibited on the 2 ned October last. Thus not only is 'loronto reduced to two steam-ers-one of which we understand is utterly useless, but the fire companies may well have doults whether, if they were to pay for the salvage corps, the committee illluded to might not send it alter the engines to Guelph or some other city.
The cry for economy and retrenchment we believe has brought about the resolution we are discussing, but we would remind the City Council of 'loronto that there is such a thing as being "penny wise and pound foolish," and it was only the other day, during tho late severe weather, that a fire occurred in the freight sheds of the Northern Railway Company which might have been a very serious one had it not been for the very salvage corps in question, who extinguislied the flames for a trifling damage, where the fire bygade were uttenly powenless from the fact that every hydrant within reach was frozen!

It is well known that in the harge towns in England, and many if not all the cities in the United States, the salvage corps are kept up by the insurance oflices, the argument being that such corps are for the benefit of the fire companies, not of the public, for the simple reason that, if one of the latter be fully indemnified by his policy, it is a matter of indifference to him whether the loss be total or only partial, but the company on the other hand loses less if there be a salvage. But if the companies maintain a salvage corps, it is only just that they should control and govein the same since it is their own property, which we do not think is what is intended by the present action of the Toronto Fire and Water Committee.
However that may be, it is a matter of very small moment, the plain matter at issue being simply that the Board of Fire Underwriters arranged theirrates of premiums calculating upon certain means of protection being afforded by the city authorities against fre, and, if such protaction be withdrawn, one of two results must inevitably follow, namely, cither an increase of rates or a clecrease in the indem. nity offered by the companies fo the
public. We, of course, are taking it for granted hat 'Toronto underwriters understand their own business, although, from what we have heard, there are many in the said city who consicler rates exorbitantly high, and the fire appliances out of all proportion to what necessity demands; in other words that the said objectors are much more competent insurance managers than tho underwriters themselves. 'This is an error' of which the public has been guilty very often, and beem obliged to acknowledge in "ashes" if not in "sackeloth" at Chicago, Boston and other places. We cannot but regret the action recently taken by the Toronto Fire and Water Committee, for should their threat be carried out, and the rates of premiun are not increased, it is palpable that if insurance is sold below its cost, the compainies, and consequently the public, must sulfer as surely as when any other branch of commerce is upon an unsound basis. In either case the money, whether for increased rates or decreased indemnity, must eventually come out of the pockets of the public, and therefore we must condemm what is clearly a fulse economy.
We have already alluded to the muchboasted of water supply in Toronto, and should the-what we honestly believealready ineflicient appliances for fire protection be decreased, we fear that the lesson to be learned will be taught by the same destroyer which has laid low so many fair cities on this continent, ruining thousands, and blotting out at one fell sweep the accumulations of years of inclustry and thrift. In the interests of the public no less than the insurance companies, we must record our protest against a policy liable to produce such terrible results.

## LAW OF INSURANCE IN PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

We understand there is a case now before the Supreme Court which is likely to prove of considerable interest to Insurance Companies. The Corporation have been assessing the several companies $\$ 400$ as a special tax, and also assessing them some $\$ 15.75$ as a business tax, whereas it is contended that the $\$ 400$ should cogrer all. Apart from this, it is also contender that the by-law assessing the $\$ 400$ is wut in strict accordance with the Act empowering, the city to make such assessment. In comnection with this the natural enquiry arises, whether the lusal Government has the power to pass an Act granting the Corporation the right to issess compauins at all, as, in view of tae recent decision against the Governmeat by the Privy Council in Pagland in the

Insurance stamp cases, it cannot clelegate a power which it does not itself possess. The issue of the first points will be watched with interest, when the latted will maturally follow to be iestect.

## MULLARKY \& CU.

We glatly give insertion to a letter from Mr. Mallaky on another page of this number, that the public may the more readily understand the merits of the subject. Audi allerampartem should be amplied to every case. We deem it proper, however, to make a few comments upon this letter, and to begin, we must disclaim any intention whatever of making an "attack" upon that gentleman, nor can the article, in view of all the circumstances, bear any such construction. But to take Mr. Mullarky's answers scriatem: 1st. It is well under. stood that the late M. Uughes, agent of the Company in New York, received or retained his appointment largely through Mr. Mullarky"s influence, and harmony in consequence dil not always prevail at the meetings of the board; that it was most mischievous in its results was not to be forescen, of course. 2nd. Of this investment wo were assured by a leading creditor present at the meeting. ## ONTARIO DIVISION COURT SUITS.

In Ontario there are many comphants about the Division Courte, and the diticulty of a layman entering them. Fomerly they were called " the poor man's Cours;" but since suits up 10 Sloo can be entered in them, the phatintills and defendants bave bad to stand aside forlaw students to try their hands, nad. gradually burristers have erept in, until now no man is safe to carry on a suit without a lawyer; aud the quirks and quibbles appear to be more resorted to than in the Upper Courts. Had these Courts have had their jurisdiction extended, as was proposed during the last session of the Untario Lesgislature, the smatl cases would bare been driven entirely away, and it is now a fuestion whether counsel fees should be allowed or counsellors exchaded. The former would increase the cost of suits, the latter would be unjust to the ignorant or inexperienced.

- A writ of attachment was issued last Tuesday agaiast Richard Jellyman, of his city, maunfacturer of paper boxes, de. His linbilitjes aro about $\$: 200,000$. Mr. Jellyman has been in business about thirty years, and has always been looked upon as quite successful in his own business, but through his good mature he was led into too many enterprises, and the result is as might have been expected, He began with litlle or no capital. In February; 1574, he bought out the bankrupt estate of Rice Bros., paper collar manufucturers, in the same building, Cratg street, for $\$ 32,000$ cash, which has been carried on by him ever since, but undev the former managetacnt. Is also a special partuer to monot of $\$ 10,000$ in the firm
inf Johm Crilly \& Co.; has a lranch in Toronto, and is the principnl in the Union Machine Compans, whose works are situated over his UottéStreet factory. He made a statement in spring of 1857 , by which he chamed a surplus of $\$ 136,000$; assets $\$ 250,000$, less liabilities of $\$ 119,000$. The assets included real estate valued at \$03,000, inemmered for about Su0,000, the surplus being largely in machinery and other unealizenbe assets. He endorsed dae composition notes of Young, MeNaughton E Co.some two years ago, but we have not ascertained whether these have all been pad as yot. A meeting was held yesterday, and the following wore appointed a commitlee to examine and report on the 14 th April: Messrs. Boyd, MeFatane, Holland and iV. Miler. The business is being continued as usuat.
- The new Enecits of ently ripening grape recenty introduced to the Gamudian publie, to the townsman and vilager who possesses only a few rods of garden as well as to the famer who endivates fifty or one hundred neres, pro. mises wonderful resulis, if the experiments made last scason by Mr. Menzice, manager of the Mechanics bank in this city are to be relied on as satisfactory cridence. That the county is adapted to the growth of grapes is powed by the fire that hey are found growitis witd in rarions sections. If it be possible to produce the fruit so reatily and ripen it so early in our short seasons, there is no reason why our combtry population should not in at few years compete in some degree with their consins in la belle france in the caltivation of the vine and the several products thereof. Mr. Menzies has assuciated with him in the vineyide, known as the "Beaconslield," at Point Claite, a few miles from the eity, Mr. Geo. F. Gallagher, for many years commected wih at leading nursery house in Rochester. At all events the experiment is worth turing. Every body having a rod of gronad shouhd ordera few plants or chts, which they cain do by addressing Messes. Menaies and Gallagher at the vineyard, Pointe Chate, P.Q. Instructions for planting will be furnished next week or on applying as above.
- Nr. Alexander Seath, of this city, wholesale foreign leather merchant, against whom a writ of attachnomt issued last Suturday, shows lusses in business.during the last three months of $S_{61,780}$ of which $S 50,000$ was lust through four firms from the 10 th to the loth instati. This, coupled with losses of about 560,000 hast year, was more than even sume stronger houses could stand. Mc. Seath is a man of known business ability, and proposals have been made by which he could resume without delay. His indirect liabilities to the bunks are about S175; 000 ; direct only abont 535,000 . He and another leading firm or this city assisted J. \& J , Woodey of Quebee to pay their hast instalment lately. He lost $\$ 14,000$ through Leggat $\&$ Juhnsun's failure ; $\$ 10,000$ by Richird Simitdon; $\$ 3,500$ by John Tumer \& Co.; \$c,000 by Mullarky \& Co. ; $\$ 2,500$ by $W$. McLaren \& Co., and $\$ 21,200$ by J. \& J. Woodley, nearly withia tive datys, constituting probably the severest series of hard knocks ever deilt to any firm in the trade in so, shorl a time.
- We observe that the stiggestions made in these coltums under the head of t Ourions Disclusures" lare had the effect of rousing the
present Government to take action with a viow of preventing for the future the systematic under-valuations which have been going on for years at various ports of entry hiroughoud the Dominion. The remedy we proposed hats been reterred to in Mr. Tilley's Budget speech, and should of itselt; if carried ont, go fat towards sumpling the deticiency in the Revenue. The suggestions made in our columas as to the sugat duties as well as those concerning tho diflerential duties on tea, ele.; have also borne fruit. Let us hope that the impetus given to trade will enable the nation the more easily to bear the additional burthen of over two millions dollars taxes which the Government imposes for the coming year. We observe that the two locomotive engines recently imported into this Province have paid duty on their full value.

'lhis simily illustrates the collective energy and push of our neighbors, and exphains in a small way the reason so few American fimes appear as ereditors even for small amounts in insolvent estates in Oanada, notwithstanding the anount of business transacted. A Cithadian would not bother himself with suth at trifle; an American collects it on princible, to assist in educating the people into paying promptly.

- 'The anmal report of the Merchants' Marine Iusumance Co., of this city, which we publish elsewhere, although not showing very satisfactory results for the shareholders, is still an honest exhibit, and now that the company hats a stock of dear lought experience on hand, we may hoge for a better fatire. The questions raised by Mr. Hickford of Halifax, as representing several shareholders in that city, were amicably discussed at the meeting, and a satisfictory understanding was arrived at all round. Had the item of $\$ 15,054.33$, "Balance to eredit of profit and loss," been called by any other bame; it would have made no material difference in the position of the company. We feel inpelled to remark that it is high time the management were invested witb a little moro frecdom of action, as many minor although important defails are allowed to drag, owing to the difficulty often experienced of getting together a guortm of the directors.
- Alexander Ramsay, of the firm of Ramsay, Drake \& Dorls, merohants, deposed on the 15th inst vefore a Magisurate, that on the 1st October last Dituiel Bowes, of'Toronto, trader, conspired with another person ta obtain from the firm seal oil to the value of \$207.75." They oblained it on creclit, lonving obtained $a$ fair "anting" in Dun, Wiman' \& Co.'s mercantile agency through representing that they had put S10,000 in the business. Un the 27 th November the accused obtained from the firm seven more burels of seal oil, worth $\$ 141.31$, on credit in a similar vay. The prisoner is also accused of
having transferred seven barrels of oil immediately after the reccipt to a relative of his named James Bowes, and having since gone into insolvency. The accused was arrested in Toronto, and brought to this city.
Tifunder and Small Beer.-Messrs. Devine \& Thunder have for some time pasi, represented the Prescott Brewing Co., in this city. Devine, who had formerly been o. subaltern in charge of the barracks' on St." Helen's Island, opposite this city, resigned under some peculiar circumstances connected with the fire there some three years agoand began the beer business. Thinder is $\pi$ minor, and is only recestly from England. His desire to appear well connected and as the fature beir of weath in England, as usual with men of his class, led to his arrest on a capias lately, and this led to the writ of attachment. The Brewing Company is contesting the writ Both partners began with nothing and ended in the sane way. The total liabilities are about $\$ 4,000$, of which $\$ 2,000$ to $\$ 3,000$ is to the Brewing Company.
- Anmouncement is made that the Oriental Bank of London, Englatad, has been ubliged to pass its half-yearly dividend and has lost all its reserve. The Oriental is the leading bank in the Eastern trade - with India, China and Japan. The depreciation in silver and the bad business of the Eastem trade are sulticient to account for large losses. The bank has a capital of $£ 1,500$,000 . The same causes that operated in 1878 , when silver varied a great deal, were the reasons for the lusses of the year $187 \%$. In that year the bank, al thongh paying 10 per cent dividends,
 the latter at 5325,000 . The annanl statement for that year showed liabilities of $£ 17,980,000$ and assets of $210,590,777$.
- The New York Insuranee Times for February knows not whereof it speaks in saying that we, in a recent article concerning the Royal Camadian Insurance Co. of this city, expressed any opinion editorially as to Mr. Sise's muagement of the United States business. We merely grve a resume of the discussion anent that gentleman which took place at the annual mecting, and which tie carefully prepared report furnished by the company failed to show. The Times had better reserve its ammunition for the Scottish Commercial. The resolutions may be dealt with again.
- The proprietors of the conl mines in Grundy County, Illinois, have begun the use of a new labor-saving machine which, if successful, must contribute largely towards reducing the price of conl. It is known as the Iron man; and it certainly would require to be possessed of an iron constitution to do all the work expected of it, and iron muscles to witbstand the blows that are likely to be levelled at it by the miners, who are anxiously awaiting the results of the experiment before deciding whether it is to be looked upon as a friend or a foe.
- A special meeting of the Montreal Board of Trade was held last Wednesday to consider the question of insolvency legislation and other matters. Mr. J. P. Oleghorm proposed a resolution deprecating the imposition of duty as proposed by the Government, upon inland freights and charges on goods, describing this course as vexatious and troublesome alike to
both importers and shippers, which was passed b ya large majority.
- The Hochelaga Coton Mills Company are about to add a wing to the building, and purpose entering upon the manufncture of bleached shectings, drills, etc. The entergrise is highly successful, and realized profits amounting to $\$ 90,000$ last year, equaling about 33 per cent. Mr. Whitehead, the munager, was presented with the sum of $\$ 2,000$ at the end of the year, in addition to his salary.
- The Grand Jury and Court of Queen's Bench will have some interesting cases to consider during the present session, chief of which are Dunbar Browne, for embezalement, Jean $S$. Paquet, casbier Mochelaga Bank, and H. W. Goldring, phosphate land speculator, conspiring to defriud. The examination in last-named case is about finished, and both sides claim an ultimate victory.
- The Toronto Evening Telegr..m of the 26th inst. says: Messrs. W. J. Shaw \& Co., wholesale grocers, Adelaide street cast, have made an assignment to Mr. J. B. Bonstead. The ussets athd liabilities have not yet been ascertained. The fuilure is attributed in some mensure to the defalcations of Snart \& Rimer, who recently absconded. The sherift was in possession of the warchonse yesterday under a $f$ i. fit, issued at the suit of the Merchants' Bank for, it is said, 85,000 . It is reported that the name of the tirm was on some of Sharr's paper, and also on Rimer's paper.

GENTLEMEN,
In accordance with annual custom, we now lay before you our report of the business of the company; for the past year.

The balance sheet, and general revenue account, for the year ending December 21st, 1878, are duly certilied by the anditor.

Our gross premiums during the year were $\$ 93,20311$, and our receipts for interest $52,296.60$. in all $\$ 101,498,71$; out of which we paid $\$ 17,364.76$ for re-insurances, rebates, return premiums and canceiled policies; $\$ 34,320.22$ for losses on the year's business; $\$ 6,186.23$ for commissiuns ; $\$ 8,050$ for salaries, including those of all inspectors and other officinls: Rud $86,078.89$ for all other charges, including bead office and agents' telegrams, adjuster's fees, postages, travelling and legal expenses, rent, taxes and office furniture, avertising, printing, books and stationery,
$\& c$., \&c.,-a sum total of $\$ 72,000.10$; leaving a credit balance of $\$ 29,408.61$; from which, setting aside $\$ 15,000$, to provide against outstanding losses and re-insurance reserve, the net gain on the year's business is $\$ 14,498.61$.

This, in the face of a considerable falling off in premiums, occasioned by depressed rates, and our declining risks which past experience showed to be undesirable, is, we think, a satisfactory result.
We hare also paid during the past year, $\$ 60,055.45$ for losses on previous years' business, and we carry furward to the credit of profit and loss, on 31st December, 1878 , the sum of \$15,054.33.

We continue to show a decrease in our outsfanding risks at the commencement of the year having only 181 policies, covering 5445,298 this year, against 268 policies, covering $\$ 630,191$ in 1878, and 441 policies, covering $\$ 984,908$ in 1877.

In accordance with the Act of Incorporation three of the Directors retrie by rotation, but are eligible for re-election.

Ioffered her this stock, which she refused to ncceps, saying sho winted no more to do with stocks, and Ianswered, "I have nothing else to give you unless you inke my furniture," and she replie d. "I will take your furniture nud tansfer gou bnels the 200 shates of the St. Pierre Land Compans." I had to alleruative but to comply with her request, feeling I never was cilled tpon to make a more fifir or honest transaction in the whole course of my life. I now regret exceedingly that she did not take the Royal Canadian Insurance Compmay stock, as by doing so she would be sputed trouble and anooyance in now proving her just chaim to the firniture, as some of my ereditors seem disposed to dispute her right to it on technical grounds. I may further state that to-day she cuuld sell Royal Canadian stock for more money than she enn now realize frous the fitruiture; and ber cham to which could not lee disposted.
7th.-Wrorse ofl than I was 20 years ago, when 1 commenced business with ouly a capital of $\$ 500$.
Ansror.-In this you are correct. Traking into consideration the very lurge anount of money which passed through my hands in those past years, mad neicher you, Sir, nur any one clse in this country can say that I stopped for a moment to put my hands on some of those monies und plitee it to the credit of my wife or some of my relatives, or pat a harge amount in my pocket and evoss the line $45^{\circ}$ and dictate tertis of settlement to my creditors. I have not done atyy of these things, and I must say, I do take a little conlfort frum it; even my life policius, as you ironically remarked, if I died my creditors would get their pay, and if I lived I would pay them, not even these were put aside for my wite ol family.
Ja conclusion I think the public will bear me ont in saying that it was nut through neglect of' my business or through bad management that I have been placed in insolvency to-day; my whole trouble is owing to my outside aransactions and to going into co-mitnership with John Sweeney and otbers. As purtier of Sweeney's I lost $\$ 72,000$.
If an investment account had been kept in my lediger, my drawings for personal expenses would have shewn to be as moderate as those of nuy other person in the community. You omitted one very important item in your statement, and that was what I puid out for wages during those 8 years, and which amounted to the sum of \$527,857.76. I chaim that I have done my share in keeping the working classes of the city employed and many a family comfortably off in these long winters of ours.

I have made a large amount of money in the Boot and Shoe trade, and with God's blessing I bope to do so agnin.

MONTREAL GENERAL MARKETS.
Montreal, March $27 t h, 1879$.
Pending the re-arrangement of quotations under the new order of things many departments have had a quiet week of it, buyers and sellers holding different opinions as to prices, although as a rule retailers are enabled to purchase at usual rates, especially in dry goods; where no actual change bas yet been effected. But retailers are buying more freely, as is usual pending a probable advance in values. Stocks are well assorted, and those who visit the city express themselves highly satisfied with the results of their trip. The stock and money markets are generally unchanged.

Ashes. - Receipts fair, but demand easier. First Pots sold from $\$ 3.95$ down to $\$ 3.85$, at Which they are quiet at the close for light tares, heary tares being a few cents more. Seconds \$4.40. Thirds none. Pearls.- 27 brls Firsts arrived but iot yet sold. Quotations are impossible, not a transaction reported for a month. Receipts since lst January, 1717 Urls Pots and 102 brls Pearls. Deliveries, 964 brls Pots and 178 brls Pearls. Stock in store at six p.m' on Wednesday, 1876 brls Pots and 162 brls Pearls.
Boors and Suoes,-There has a fair business
been done the prist week, and some sorting-up orders are being received from parties who received their stocks early. Pricos, although still low, are firm, and manufacturers are not disposed to produce goods beyond orders actually in hmad.
Coar-The severe winter has made business in this department quite brisk; the demand has exceeded the supply, and all the large dealers have been compelled to order fresh supplies from New York by rail; sending prices for stove up to S7, which, since the duty has advanced to $\$ 7.50$ delivered. The following are the rates per ton, which are likely to remain unchanged till the opening of navigation

Drugs and Ohemicals.-Some improvement in business las been experienced during the pust week, and country orders are coming in pretty freely for April Shipment. Heavy chemicals are being olfered to arrive, and firmer prices are prevailing in consequence of the bare state of the market in England. Botil Sal Soda aud Bicarb Soda are higher ; for the latter $\$ 3.05$ to $\$ 3.10$ is asked for lots to arrive ex shipment.

Dry Goods.-A number of Ontario merchants have been in town during the week, especially from the Uttawa district, taking advantage of the cheap fares over the new roads. Business is fairly active. In adulition to adrance reported last week in Cotton yarns, we notice carpet wapp have advanced $2 d \mathrm{c}$, per 1b. on white and sc. on culored. No change in Canndian Cottons. Remittances on an average very moderate.

Floun.-The market has been dull throughont the week and little business donc. Some small orders from Quebec and points East have been filled at concessions on last week's quotations. The market may be quoted 2 of to five cents per barrel decline.

G hooeries.-Tariff debnte last night was commenced, somo changes reported; those affecting groceries may;"be here noted. Parafline Candles to be 5 c . instead of 4 c . the lb ., as first proposed. Other candles, fallow excepted, to pay $2 \overline{0}$ p.e. instend of 20 p.c. Dried fruits, 25 p.e. instead of 1 c . the lb , and dried apples 2c. the lb . Dry White and Red Lead, reduced to 5 p.c. Perfuned Sorp, 30 p.c. instend of 25 p.c. Glucose Syrup, 2 c . the 1 b . in addition to 35 p.c. ns tirst proposed. Otgials Cream Tartar from 20 p.e. to be free as betore. Nemfoundlaud Fish appear to be really le. the lb., or say $\$ 2$ the barrel tor Herrings, Salmon. \&e. Seal nud Cod Oils will lye under the 20 p.c. list, as the great part of Jabrador fishing const is under the jurisdiction of Newfoundlund; of conrse, fish and oil from there will likely be the same. This is a rery serious matter. Sugars, market not so strong. Tariff appears confirmed, however, as against drawbick from countries where such exist, notably the United States. Granulated bas been sold at 9 c . and some rather under, and held ordinarily 9 to $9 \lambda c$. Yellow refined steady, 7 c . to $8 \frac{1}{2}$ c. Naw Sugar, 7e. to $7 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$. Molasses and Syrups. Duty it is stated on syrups is on long price as sugars, equiralent to addition of 3c. the gal. at least over old tariff. Sugar house molasses is not allowed to be imported for refining purposes unless it is supposed at syrup duty fc. the lb. and 30 p.c. Maket firm for syrups at advance of about 2 c . Molasses is quiet. Teas, at adrance of about 2c. Molasses is quiet. Teas,
marketinactive for low grades and firm for high
class Japans. Rica, S4.25 to S4.45. Copice, firm, some advance in Brazil looked for in the States. Spices, dull. f'ruits, Valentin Raisins held Gc. to Ghe. tirmly. In other firits not much doing.
Hamdrars.-An exnmination of our Prices Current will show sone change in the valuo of galvanized iron and iron wire. There is no other change to rep ort, and not likely to be till business becomes settied under the new tariff. No change in nails, but to meet the increased duty on raw material, higher prices will be fixed shortly 'The volume of business doing is small. Remittances fair. The trade has suffered considerably through the number of frilures which took place during the last fortnight, which have been more than during tho past two years.

Hay.- The large quantity of pressed hay that is at present offered on the market tends to keep down tho price of Jay in bundles, as brought in by farmers. The supply of the latter has been very small this week, but priees have remained unchanged, choice Timothy selling at about $\$ 9$ per 100 bundles of 15 lbs . each, and other kinds from $\$ 7$ to $\$ 8.00$. Pressed hay is quoted at from 512 to 13.50 per ton. Farmers who have any to sell are holding back for better prices later on in the spring. Straw sells at from $\$ 3.50$ to $\$ 5$ per 100 bundes.

Leather,- The leather trade has been very active for the past few days, principally owing to the rinding up of several large boot and shoe houses, which has given new life and activity to the sound houses left in the trade. Prices of leather rule low, lower than last week, but, owing to the new Tariff, all descriptions of shoo findings have advanced. Hides having declined, the tanners will not sulfer severely by the low prices of leather. The market is fairly supplied with all descriptions of leather, but another week's sales equal to the last would cause a scarcity in some lines. Better prices are looked for sliortly.
Live Stock.-The arrivals of cattle last week were serenteen carloads. At the St. Gabriel Market last Monday prices ranged from 31 c to se per lb. Two superior heifers, weighing 2,300 lbs., were sold at 5 c per lb.; one steer, weighing $1,400 \mathrm{lbs}$., at 43 c per lb ; five steers for $\$ 284$; eleven cattlo at from 545 to $\$ 55$, or from 410 to 4 ac per lb ; one carload of oxen, areraging 1,590 lbs., at 4 c per lb , and onéa carlond of cattle at from 3 ec to fide per lh. At the Viger Market very fow catle were offered. The price of hugs was be per lb. The horic trade was not so brisk as that of the previous weeks. The following exports of horses have been made of late from this city to the United States: March 18 , twenty-one horses, costing $\$ 1,137.75$. Mureh 19 , fifteen horses, costing $\$ 1,165$; six do, costing $\$ 385$, and twenty-one do, costing si,748. March 20 , one horse for breeding purposes, costing $\$ 575$; also one do do, costing $\$ 200$; fourteen horses, costing, $\$ 1,008$; seventeen do, costing $\$ 1,291.50$, and twenty do, costing $S 1,510$. Mareh 21 , fourteen horses, costing $\$ 1,312$, and ten lo; costing S580. March 22. twenty horses, costiag $\$ 1,451$, 50 ; Twelve do, costing $\$ 1,030$, tund twelve do, costing 5704.60 . Mareh 24 , ninteen horses, costing Si,884, and thitteen horses, costing $\$ 1,121$.
Lumber.--The Timber Trades Tonrial of 15th March says:-We hare no improvement to record in the past fortnights trade. At the public sales sellers have again beguñ to press goods on the market, and as a consequience large quantities of unreserved goods figured at the recent Baltic sales. If this miny be taken as a sign of the times, it anguis baily for the first open-water goods that will come to market ; if in the meantime the trade is to be stuffed with all descriptions, the appetite for fresh stock will be proportionately lessened. One thing in the shippers' farour at present is the low rates of freight ruling; if it were not for this there Fould have to be a still greater reduction on the first cost. We do not expect that the pre-
sent freights will continue, but while there are so many ships with nothirg for them to do, no improvement can be expected. We fear the tone of our remarks this time is not very checering. But can we bring forward a more impressive fact than that of pitch pine planks fetching at the public sule of the 5th inst. no more that $£_{8}$, which at this time last year were thought very low at $£ 11$ ? The freight and charges on these goods could not be much less than $£ 0$; when they came unde: the hammer, probably 10s. more; what remains for the importer towards his first cost can easily be reckoned. These goods have to be put in sheds, and stand at proportionately higher rental ; and the same may be said, of almost every other description of manufactured timber. At the sale on Wednesday last a hervy parcel of balk timber was thrown on the market for unreserved sale, and excited a lot of competition; the values were comparatively good, but still exhibit a loss on the imported price.

Orts.-There bas been some litile excitement in this line in consequence of the determination of the Government to impose 20 per cent. upon Senl and Fish Oils from Newfound land. There has been very little movement in Oils, however, and prices continue unchanged and nominal, except Linseed Oils which are firmer on account of advance in tarim. Uonsiderable shipments came into the market in anticipation of this, and the price will not be very mueh affected for some little time. In small lots, however, higher prices are asked. Naval Stores are dull and unchanged. Paints in fair demand.

Provisions-Buter.-Thereare no new features in the market, the dragging trade still continues, and, except for local trate, there bus been little stock changing hands. Strictly fine finds ready purchasers, but the bolk of the stock offering is medium, and entirely neglected.

Cheese. The market continues weak and unsatisfactory. Less confidence in a continuance of present prices has been shown this week, and English shippers are indisposed to accept stock to any extent, even on consignment.
