




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
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
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QUEEN VICTORIA.

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WRITER in the *New York Sun* asks why the British throughout the Empire should engage in such great preparations for a Jubilee because the Queen should happen to reign sixty years. An effective answer might be given in the enumeration of the long list of achievements of peace and war; in colonization, in geographical exploration, in the development of responsible government, in law reforms, in social improvements, in extension of commerce and manufactures, in the researches of science, together with the array of distinguished statesmen, soldiers, churchmen, scientists, engineers, historians, critics, and poets. No such substantial progress can be shown in any age or by any nation, not even by the United States, since the beginning of recorded history.

But the personal history of Her Majesty is a subject for hearty congratulation and rejoicing. The parents of our Queen were Edward, Duke of Kent, son of George III., and a lady of the Ducal House of Saxe-Coburg. Her father was a kind and courteous

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gentlemen, devoted to truth and duty, and a rigid disciplinarian in a profligate army, who determined not to eat the bread of idleness. His liberality in religious faith, and his support of schools and anti-slavery societies caused his unpopularity with his brothers and the ministers, who always kept him in pecuniary embarrassments. At Kensington Palace the Princess Alexandrina Victoria was born on May 24th, 1819. She was so named by the wish of her uncle, George IV., but her father had desired her to be called Elizabeth as he fully believed she would one day be Queen of England. The Duke of Kent, however, did not live to see his hopes realized as he died on January 23rd, 1820, from inflammation of the lungs.

Her chances for the succession were yet quite remote, but a number of deaths brought the possibility closer. The year before the birth of Victoria, Princess Charlotte, daughter of George IV., died, followed a few years later by the death of the two children of the Duke of Clarence, afterwards William IV., thus leaving the Princess Victoria heir-apparent, if neither George nor William had any more children.

For the first ten years of her life she was kept ignorant of the high position that awaited her. She was educated in retirement under the wise supervision of the Duchess of Kent, by Baroness Lehzen in classics, music, and drawing. She was a diligent student in these branches, but free from pedantry, she had especially cultivated her character in the qualities which distinguish her as a Sovereign. The Duchess displeased George IV. by keeping the Princess away from the questionable revelries of his court, so he tried to thwart her and her daughter as much as possible. They were kept in pecuniary difficulties, which perhaps has developed Her Majesty's self-restraint. On one occasion the young Princess had to wait till next quarter day before she could pay for a half-crown box she had bought at a bazaar. On the death of George IV. in 1830, his brother, William IV., succeeded to the throne. He held the same opinions with regard to Victoria as did his brother, but was less formidable.

The Duchess of Kent and her children lived meanwhile at Kensington, at Ramsgate, and on the Isle of Thanet where they were visited by Wilberforce, who perhaps instilled into the future Queen a sympathy for the suffering and down-trodden. She is described by Miss Porter as "a beautiful child, with cherubic form of face, clustered round with glossy fair ringlets, with engaging and ingenuous manners." Sometimes they took short trips through England and Wales, visiting many factories and becoming acquainted with the life of the toilers. During this time she was visited by her cousin Albert, second son of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg, who was afterwards to play such an important part in her life. Her absence from the drawing-rooms of the King enraged him at the Duchess of Kent, so in compliance Victoria appeared at a state-ball on her eighteenth birthday, when she became of age. The old King treated her with marked affection during the remaining month of his life. He passed away on June 20th, 1837, at peace with his successor, so it may be said of him "That nothing in his life became him like the leaving it."

The King died at 2 a. m., and as soon as possible the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Lord Chamberlain proceeded to Kensington. They were told that the Princess could not be awakened as she was in such a sweet sleep, but the Archbishop, unable to conceal his message, replied, "We are come on business of state to the Queen and even her sleep must give way." In a few moments she appeared with a shawl thrown over her night-robe and with her feet in slippers. When she heard the important communication, she declared she would be good and asked the Archbishop to pray for her. She passed through the trying ordeal of that day's council with modesty and firmness, voluntarily

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resigning the appellation Alexandrina, and signing herself by the auspicious name, Victoria. Her consideration for the feelings of others may be seen in her letter of condolence to Queen Adelaide on the death of her husband, in which she referred to her as Queen. When the Queen-Dowager pointed out that she herself was Queen, Victoria replied. "It would not be becoming for me to be the first to remind you of your changed position." The people were only languidly attached to monarchy at this time and received her with but few cheers on her return from her first council. She keenly felt her responsibility, the coldness of her reception, and on arriving home she hurst into tears. Mrs. Browning has commemorated this incident in an exquisite little poem--

"Strange blessings on the nation lies,
Whose Sovereign wept—
Yea, wept to wear a crown."

Her innocent, queenly face soon won for her hosts of loyal hearts. Dan. O'Connell declared he could get half a million brave Irishmen to defend the life, the honor, and the person of that beloved young lady by whom England's throne was filled. To-day Mr. Labouchere acknowledges that monarchy is established beyond a doubt in England.

A year later, at her Coronation, on June 28th, 1838, there was a sight of intense loyalty which reminded one of the glories of mediæval times. Cheering crowds blocked the way from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey. "Queen's weather" characterized the day. She was presented by the Archbishop to the people, which was followed by the Litany, part of the Communion service, and a sermon by the Bishop of London. The oath was administered, the consecrated oil was poured on her head and hands, the spurs and sword of state and the orb were delivered, and the ring was placed on her hand. She seized the sceptre, and then the Archbishop took the crown and placed it reverently on her head. Tired out with eight hours' ceremonial, according to legend, as her dog came bounding to meet her on her return, "Oh! there's Dash!" she exclaimed, in a burst of relief at finding herself once again in the natural world.

On February 10th, 1840, the Queen was married to Albert, second son of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg. Everyone perceived that in this marriage there was no sacrifice of private feeling to public duty, but an alliance founded on affection. The Prince was annoyed by vexatious restrictions placed upon him by the ministry. The usual allowance was curtailed, he was not allowed his own servants or secretary or the control of the household. He bore no ill-will to the ministers, refrained from interference with parties, and showed a mind so perfectly balanced, so temperate, so blameless, and so impartial, as to be rarely met with. But the Prince Consort clearly separated the Queen's regal duties from those of a wife, and with gentle firmness took his proper position as head of the family, in which he was warmly seconded by the Queen. The Queen's account of the courtship in the "Life of the Prince Consort" forms a little romance of perfect originality. The Prince soon found that his sphere lay in the encouragement of art in England; he was instrumental in planning the Crystal Palace, he adorned their residences with frescoes from scenes in "Comus" and the poems and novels of Scott, and together they gave England the example of a model home. The historian of Her Majesty's reign will not record the usual encounters of great wits at the court, nor the flutter of fine company. It will be a recital of the silence of the hills, of cheerful peasant voices, of the crack of the sportsman's rifle, of the patter of ponies' feet, of the blessings of poor folk, and of the sweet voices of children chiming in with the tones of father and mother.

On November 21st, 1840, the Princess Royal was born, the mother of the present

Emperor of Germany, and No. 10, 9th, 1841, Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, was born. In 1842 the Queen first visited Scotland, and from her "Leaves from our Journal of Life in the Highlands" we read of the pleasant life spent at Balmoral, her love of home and people, of excursions, drives, incognito parties, and of visiting the sick and aged.

Space will not permit to describe their wedded life, but in 1861 the good Prince Consort passed away. It was reported how, when Albert was dying, he roused himself, saying to the Queen with ineffable love, "Good little wife." She bent down to him and replied, "It is your little wife." The whole nation sympathized with the Queen in her loss as the Prince Consort was held in high esteem.

"He spake no slander, no, nor listen'd to it,
Who loved one only, and who clave to her."

"The white flower of a blameless life,
In that fierce light that beats upon a throne."

Not for one day did the Queen suspend her imperial duties in the number of deaths that have bereaved her of her husband and children. The Princess Alice and Prince Leopold, both beloved by the people, have been laid at rest. But amidst her own trials she has always had a woman's sympathy for her soldiers and sailors in active service. Besides she is always courteous and always queenly. Her strict attention to duty seemed to be inherited. Fox's axiom, "The king reigns but does not govern," does not apply to Victoria. We have the testimony of the Duke of Argyle, Macaulay and Beaconsfield to the personal influence of the Queen on all great questions. Her popularity would eventually overthrow any ministry, but she has always gracefully yielded. She is the first Sovereign who has not been identified with any party and has never hesitated to accept the man that popular will or the exigencies of public affairs have brought to the front.

In 1887, there was held a great Jubilee on the 50th anniversary of her succession, joined in heartily by all. And now after another decade this most memorable celebration, not only in gala decorations and festivities but in material and lasting benefits, will mark the popularity of the Queen throughout Great Britain and all the colonies. After all is it not the loyalty to the Sovereign that is the source of all this joy. We Canadians may well ask ourselves the question, How long would we care to keep up relations with republican England?




