PUBLIC OWNERSHIP ENDORSED BY LARGE AND ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING OF CITIZENS LEAGUE ORGANIZATION BEGUN

With a Roll of Over 700 Names, Committee is Appointed to Spread the Gospel of Public Ownership Thruout the Province—Ranks are Open to All Public-Spirited Citizens.

Public opinion has made itself manifest in all stages of the world's history and civilization, from the days when the Israelites rebelled against the oppression of the cruelty of the Egyptians; when the people of Greece rose in indignation and overthrew the avaricious tyrants, who endeavored to monopolize the distribution of all the common wants; as well as the luxuries desired by the plebeians, when, under the Roman Empire, the coteries that surrounded and supported the Caesars strove to corner the utilities necessary to the well-being of the people; when the early Britons, exasperated by the tyrannies of the existing monarchy, called into existence the Magna Charta, down to the present age, when all nations are struggling to free themselves from the trammels of extortion and oppression.

Public opinion asserted itself in a significant way last night, at the enthusiastic meeting held in the Victoria Hall on East Queen-street, to inaugurate the Public Ownership League.

The meeting was well filled when W. A. Sherwood proposed that A. W. Wright take the chair, and the chairman would read the platform. The meeting was presided over by Mr. Wright.

Mr. Wright explained that the meeting had been called to give the citizens an opportunity of expressing disapproval of the way the great public necessities, the street railway, telephones, C. P. R. and Grand Trunk railways and those companies connected with their business, and if the meeting thought it desirable to form a Public Ownership League, to designate the people and start a campaign to compel these corporations to live up to their agreements, or else to take over those concerns and run them by the people themselves.

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THE PUBLIC OWNERSHIP LEAGUE.

The Public Ownership League was organized last evening at a largely attended meeting in this city. The following were elected as a provisional committee: A. W. Wright (chairman), J. W. Curry, Rev. D. C. Hossack, Controller J. J. Ward, Controller Hocken, Ald. J. W. Bengough, J. W. Wilkinson, T. Page Wilson, T. W. D. Bargey, E. M. Dumas, Dr. E. Herbert Adams, Allan C. Thompson, Dr. Charles J. Hastings, R. Gavin, J. H. Dunlop, W. A. Sherwood, J. L. Richardson, Ald. Wilson, C. W. Cavers, secretary.

For the purpose of effecting a speedy, and at the same time efficient organization of the supporters of public ownership, the following plan was recommended:

The organization committee to take charge of the work of organizing Public Ownership Leagues in each provincial electoral division, and a central or provincial Public Ownership League. The committee shall call a meeting in Toronto for the purpose of organizing a provincial league. At this meeting each local league to be represented by ten representatives. The adoption of constitution and bylaws and all other details of organization to be left to the Central Provincial League when it shall have been organized. For the time being and until the Provincial League shall decide otherwise, the membership fee to be 25 cents, payable at the first meeting of the local leagues.

Public-spirited citizens are eligible for membership in the league. The following resolution, moved by Allan Studholme, M.L.A., seconded by J. W. Curry, K.C., was carried unanimously: "That all public utilities and services that are of the nature of natural monopolies, should be owned or controlled by the people and be operated with a view to public profit and advantage, either by municipalities, provinces or the Dominion, as the circumstances and conditions may require."

HARRIMAN ALSO TO DISESTABLISH USED I.C. FUNDS

Fish Makes Counter-Charge, Showing His Former Friend Borrowed Millions from Treasury of the Railroad.

London, Feb. 27.—Counsel for the government renewed their attack upon the financial methods of the Harriman group in the Chicago & Alton Railroad, before the interstate commerce commission late this afternoon, when they called Chas. W. Hillard, controller of the road, as a witness.

Under examination by Frank B. Kellogg, Hillard testified that he became controller in October, when, under the joint arrangement of the syndicate, he was made controller of the road, as a witness.

Hillard said his first task was to find money to carry on the improvements that were under way. There was money in the treasury for current expenses, but not enough to complete even a cut-off of 84-1/2 miles of road from a point near Murrayville to Springfield.

NEW YORKERS ARE TO BUY "BRITISH AMERICA" STOCK

London, Feb. 27.—In the house of commons to-night a resolution in favor of the disestablishment and disendowment of the church in both England and Wales was adopted by 198 votes to 90.

This resolution does not commit the government, but Augustine Birrell, the chief secretary for Ireland, said he failed to see how the continuance of the established church could be justified.

Far from harming the church as a spiritual body, disestablishment, he said, would restore it to a position of spiritual authority throughout the land.

It is believed here that the British America will be merged with one of the strong American fire insurance companies.

Senator Cox is expected here before the end of this week to finally arrange the details.

The financial records show that the British America Co. was originally capitalized at \$200,000. This capital was later increased by two new issues of \$200,000 each, making a total of \$600,000.

The only reason that is assigned for the rumor that an American company will take over the British America is that it has a valuable and remunerative business under ordinary conditions, which would serve as a profitable adjunct to an American company not now covering the field catered to by the British America.

"JEROME FAILED TO SHAKE HER STORY."

Harry K. Thaw Makes Statement in Praise of Wife's "Victory" Over the District Attorney "and His Blacklegs."

EVELYN IN A TWO-HOUR FAINT
Ordeal of Cross-Examination Over, She Collapses Utterly from Strain of Fighting Prosecutor to Save Husband

New York, Feb. 27.—During the cross-examination of Dr. Evans, Thaw wrote rapidly this statement, which he sent to the press table:

With chances a million to one against her, it is wonderful that Mrs. Thaw's testimony prevailed against the district attorney and his blacklegs.

His lawyers apparently tried to dissuade him from making a formal statement, but he insisted.

New York, Feb. 27.—Mrs. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw collapsed utterly this afternoon at the close of the grueling trial which she has been subjected by District Attorney Jerome.

Recalled to answer a few questions, by which Jerome hoped to lay the foundation for evidence in rebuttal to attack her credibility, the frail girl who so bravely has sacrificed herself to save the life of her husband, tottered into an ante-room, fainted and lay unconscious for two hours.

She was taken to her apartments in the Hotel Lorraine, a nervous wreck.

It was announced by Delphin M. Delmas that the defence probably would close this week, which means that the case should be ready for trial by Tuesday; that is, if Jerome fails to carry out plans to demand a lunacy commission, forecasted last week and indicated in his cross-examination of experts to-day.

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PRESTON MAY LOSE HIS JOB FOR DISCREDITING CANADA

Matter is Brought Up in Senate, and Sir Richard Cartwright Promises an Enquiry.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—(Special).—In the senate to-day Senator Ferguson called the attention of the minister of trade and commerce to an extract from a letter purporting to have been written by W. T. R. Preston, Canadian commercial agent and publisher of The London Express, in which he is credited with stating that South Africa can more readily support millions of an agricultural population between Table Mountain and the Zambesi than Canada can support west of the Great Lakes.

Senator Ferguson said that such a letter should not have been written by any man in the pay of Canada. He had had no doubt that it would be found that Mr. Preston had on this, as on many other occasions, made statements which he had no right or authority to make.

Mr. Preston was not expected to advertise other parts of the British Empire as being superior to Canada for immigrants.

To Sir Richard Cartwright, Senator Ferguson said he did not have a copy of the London Express containing the letter referred to, but he had read extracts from another paper which had printed a portion of the letter.

Sir Richard Cartwright said he would enquire into the matter. He had not been able to get, as yet, a copy of the paper containing the alleged letter. Until he did so, he could take no action. He was inclined to doubt the accuracy of the quotation quoted. If it were found that the quotations were correct, Sir Richard said he would certainly call upon Mr. Preston to make an explanation.

Senator McMillen said that if Mr. Preston wrote the letter credited to him he should be dismissed.

"MILLIONAIRES OUGHT TO PROVIDE RIFLE COURSE"

Earl Grey Sets Example by Offering \$500 Challenge Cup for City Cadet Corps.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—"I am surprised that no Canadian millionaire has done anything to encourage rifle shooting," said Earl Grey at the meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association to-day, in reference to the training of school-children in military service.

This being his first public appearance since the bereavement at Government House, he took occasion to thank the Canadian public for their expressions of sympathy.

Taking up the military project proposed by Sir Frederick Borden, the governor-general approved of the plan to provide proper instruction in the public schools and announced his intention of offering a \$500 challenge cup competition among the city cadet corps.

Sir Frederick Borden said he was trying to persuade the provincial governments to instal a uniform system of the provisions being that rifle shooting be made a part of the normal school curriculum.

Col. Sam Hughes, M.P., was elected president of the association, to succeed Col. J. M. Gibson. The vice-presidents were all re-elected.

The council re-elected Lieut.-Col. Fred C. Henneberry, R. O., Montreal, chairman; Col. John Tilton, of Ottawa, chairman of the executive committee of the council; Major C. F. Winter, Ottawa, secretary; and Major E. D. Sutcliffe, Ottawa, treasurer.

LIET.-GOV. SNOWBALL BURIED

Hundreds View Body and Cortege Was Two Miles Long.

Quebec, Feb. 27.—(Special).—The funeral of the late Lieutenant-Governor Snowball took place here this afternoon, after hundreds of persons had passed the casket in the state government house, Wellington Villa.

The funeral procession was nearly two miles long, being the largest funeral ever seen here.

Stores were closed and flags were at half-mast.

The pallbearers were members of the provincial cabinet.

The provincial secretary also said that if any member of the press gallery made use of his position to slander and insult members he would have him excluded from the press gallery.

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ONTARIO'S MINERAL OUTPUT
GROSS VALUE \$22,000,000

Last Year's Increase Over 1905
is About 25 Per Cent.—Crude
Petroleum Falls Off.

A return of the mineral production of Ontario for 1906 has been issued by the bureau of mines. While the figures are said to be subject to revision, they are final for all practical purposes. The increase in the total production as compared with 1905 is \$4,367,412, or about 25 per cent. The principal gain in the metallic list being silver, \$2,100,000, nickel, \$1,487,000, copper, \$1,000,000, pig iron, \$444,700, and in the non-metallic products, Portland cement, \$377,665, and natural gas, \$216,970. The principal falling off is in crude petroleum, the value of which was \$136,999 less than in 1905.

THE PUBLIC OWNERSHIP LEAGUE. Yesterday the Public Ownership League was formally inaugurated under favorable auspices.

With the resolutions passed there can be no cavil. What indeed can be one entirely in the interest of the people than the resolution that all public utilities and services, pertaining of the nature of monopolies, should be owned or controlled by the people and be operated for the public advantage?

NO COMPROMISE. The Christian Guardian of this week has an article on the province and the power companies. It justifies what the province is doing in its proposed legislation to disempower with those provincial companies that are seeking to avoid provincial jurisdiction by going to Ottawa and having themselves declared to be for the general advantage of Canada and re-organizing under federal charters.

There is only one thing to do in the matter, and that is for the companies to submit and to recognize their creator, the province to wit, and apologize for their misbehavior and for their disloyalty to provincial law. In the meantime, Mr. Whitney has no other duty than to go ahead with the legislation and put every company out of business forthwith that is guilty of disloyalty to the province that created it and that would seek to put the control of municipal propositions under federal law, where they have no right to be.

MR. BALFOUR ON TARIFF REFORM. Mr. Balfour's speech at Hull, to which we recently called attention, was not received in all quarters as a definite pronouncement in favor of fiscal reform. Altho his meaning seemed reasonably clear, his declaration of belief in free trade—in the true sense of the word, he was careful to add, to the minds of some supporters and many opponents of fiscal reform—somehow discounted his renewed adhesion to the terms of his historic letter to Mr. Chamberlain.

himself more explicitly—if, indeed, it be so—than he did in his address at Hull. Speaking a few days later at the inaugural dinner of the reorganized council of the National Union of Conservative and Constitutional Associations, he said:

"I am one of those who firmly believe that there are unmistakable signs that there is a coalescence of Unionist opinion and crystallization of Unionist views in favor of a sound, a safe and a sober policy of fiscal reform."

While reserving a fuller discussion of the issue to the debate on the official fiscal reform amendment, then about to be moved in the house of commons, Mr. Balfour went on to indicate four separate points connected with the question, which, the logically separate, must be kept in view in one focus. These were the broadening of the basis of taxation; the safeguarding of the great productive interests of Britain, not from fair competition—which is the essence, he said, of protection—but from unfair competition, which is only fair competition because it is due either to bounties or tariffs; the problem of foreign markets and how British industries are to be preserved against the competition of the world—partly carried out by political means, partly by military means, and partly by fiscal means—and, lastly, the colonial market. On the latter point, Mr. Balfour remarked:

"In our colonies we have to look not at the population as it is now, not at the wealth-producing capacity as we see it at the present moment. We must look with the eyes of prophets to what these great self-governing communities are becoming in the lifetime of some of us sitting here."

This is unquestionably the clearest and most definite pronouncement Mr. Balfour has yet made, and it shows that the further and prolonged consideration he has given to fiscal reform has enabled him to formulate the general lines of a policy which will command the support of the united party. Fundamentally it embodies while it extends the proposition, which he first advanced in the early days of Mr. Chamberlain's agitation, wherein he pronounced for retaliation, as a palliative, not a remedy. It also explains and elucidates his constant endeavor to prevent any serious split among the Unionists during the period when the fiscal reform advocates were developing their campaign. This he emphasized when he declared that the business of the reconstituted party organization would be to see that "every new element gets its full play; that intrigue is banished; that small causes of difference are smoothed away, and that everything is made easy to carry out the great coalescence of Unionist opinion without which," he said, "believe me, no Unionist government will ever be returned to power."

THE INSURANCE COMMISSION

Seldom has an agitation for enquiry into the methods and practices of great public organizations been more fully vindicated than that initiated and carried out by The World in connection with the insurance companies of Canada. The report of the Dominion government commission presented to the house of commons yesterday by the Hon. Mr. Bowdler is a complete justification of the charges made in the course of that campaign, and proves to a demonstration that the evils and abuses exposed by the New York State commission have had their counterparts in Canada. But the public will do well to await the more detailed publication of the results of the Dominion enquiry, which will come when the report is made available, and its contents can be more fully reproduced. Meantime enough is known to make it evident that vast sums of money, to all intents and purposes trust funds, have been habitually used for private benefit, either directly or thru the media of nominally independent but really subsidiary and controlled companies. No personal or political considerations should be allowed to influence either the verdict of public opinion or the legislative consequences which ought naturally to follow. Nor should the vital point of the report, so far as the rights and interests of policyholders are concerned, be obscured. In the multiplicity of matters, involving defects, errors and abuses in the management of insurance companies, there is much

would sweep the country from one end to the other. The numerous letters on this subject, which have been continuously receiving from people in every part of the Dominion, fully endorsed the general feeling, and with an organization for public ownership in every town and district, with literature fully setting out its benefits, and speakers at its exponents for every occasion on which it could be brought before the public, it would become one of the greatest political movements of the day and age.

One of the best reasons for the movement was found in the existing condition of the great majority, who, at best, had a constant struggle to obtain an equitable share of life's common comforts, and as one utility after another passed into the hands of monopoly, it became the duty of the government, in accordance with the Christian tenets which it professed to be the heaven of its policy, to try and make every life possible for the great masses of the people.

Everybody in All Professions.
 If this principle of public ownership extended and increased the welfare and prosperity of the community and the public at large, it should be embodied in every public policy which claims to have at heart the greatest good for the greatest number at the lowest cost of support.

It had always been, and naturally so, the practice of corporations to have their service over the paying rates only, and the utility was always stopped at the door of the public. This was fully exemplified in the street railway case companies. In addition to this, large corporations, who existed for the benefit of their shareholders, had their shareholders' interests and their watered stock and inflated share list, were largely from those who were to be benefited by the policy along the line of producing the highest dividends, and taking those unfavorable conditions into consideration.

He was out to provide for those private enterprises which exploited public utilities rather than the men who operated them. The railways, telegraphs, light, heat and power, are all in the nature of public utilities, and it is the duty of the public to obtain favorable legislation, and to discontinue those conditions which are always trying to get ahead of customers or the public, underpaying the employees, and charging for the product to get the highest possible price, debauching public men to obtain favorable legislation, and newspapers to disseminate false information, in clouding and discrediting any system which threatened to jeopardize their interests.

Art of Getting Concessions.
 Those large corporations that had obtained public franchises had, through long years of increasing power, systematized and reduced to almost a corporate seal the art of obtaining fresh concessions from the public. The politicians and the public, in a more enlarged form, were to be benefited by the production of a concomitant great concession of the public that would lead them to a conspiracy to help the corrupt government to obtain other sources of power which could prove inimical to corporation interests.

Success in Europe.
 In half a dozen of the great powers in Europe public ownership has been adopted with the finest success. In France the railways that had originally been private, and were in the hands of a few individuals, had been dropped into the hands of the people who show no sign of handing them back for a further term of private ownership. The speaker said that there need be no fear of anxiety existing in the minds of the public in assuming the responsibility of these indispensable public needs. The gas and electric and telephone companies could not exist without the public, and the public could not exist without the gas and electric and telephone companies.

PENSIONS FOR S. A. VETERANS
 Col. Ryerson Gives Canadian Government a Foreboding Reminder.

Addressing the South African Association at the seventh annual banquet last evening, Colonel Geo. S. Ryerson, A.M.C., said that the Canadian government should take a greater interest in the volunteers who were incapacitated in the Transvaal war and were forced to exist in the future on the paltry allowance of 50 cents per day granted by the imperial government. Lawson of Albany is named as referee to take testimony and receive papers in Albany on Thursday next.

Information based upon affidavits, that the proposed merger would create a telephone monopoly in the telephone business in this state," was lodged with the attorney-general by James B. Hage of Cleveland, president of the Independent Telephone Association of America, and other representatives of independent telephone companies.

The application included an order to restrain the American Telephone & Telegraph Co., commonly known as the Bell Telephone Company, together with its agents, servants, representatives and subsidiary companies, from consummating or attempting to consummate any acquisition or control of the United States Independent Telephone Company.

HALF A MILLION LIVES SACRIFICE TO DISEASE

Consumption Carried Off Greatest Number in United States—Pneumonia the Next.

Washington, Feb. 27.—In a territory in which resided only two-fifths of the population of the United States, more than half a million lives were offered up in 1905 as a sacrifice to disease, according to a census report made public to-day.

The death rate from nephritis and Bright's disease, apoplexy, cancer, diabetes and appendicitis is increasing, while that from old age, bronchitis, convulsions, peritonitis and scarlet fever are decreasing.

The greatest death rate recorded for any one disease in 1905 was that from pulmonary tuberculosis, 56,770, while pneumonia closely followed with a death rate of 39,068, exclusive of broncho-pneumonia.
