MAN IN A MASK ATTACKS A WHOLE FAMILY.

Cleveland, O., March 29.—At 1 o'clock this morning a crime of almost unparalleled atrocity was perjetrated near Tallmadge. a village five miles north of Akron. Alvin Stone, aged 69, and his wife, aged 62, while asieep at their home, were brutally murdered by an unkown man, who literally beat their heads to pieces, after which numerous knife thrusts were made into the bodies of the dead. Two daughters, Hattle, aged 29, and Emma, aged 27, and the family manservant, A. F. Stillson, were also attacked. All three were fatally injured.

They were beaten about the head with a blunt instrument, which must have been of great size and weight.

Alvin Stone was among the most wealthy and prominent of Summit County farmers, and his wife was also a member of one of the wealthiest of the murdercus assault on the family was not robbery, as numerous articles of value, including two gold watches of the aged people, which were on the bedroom dresser, were not take. The crime is shrouded in mystery, and the whole country is agitated. 



CANADIAN INSTITUTE.

Two Papers by Well-Known Men on 1

teresting Subjects.

At the meeting of the Canadian Institute on Saturday evening Professor Wrong discussed the voyage of John Cabot, which resulted in the discovery of North America. In estimating the material for the narrative he placed his main reliance upon the English state papers and the narratives of the Italian and Spanish agents who reported what was happening in England. There is no English narrative of the voyage. Professor Wrong ruled out uncorroborated evidence.

Proceeding upon these lines a narrative of the first voyage was constructed, and the writer showed that while a good deal is known about the voyage, the time and date of the first sight of land cannot be now determined, owing to insufficient evidence. The date given, June 24, does not appear until

The Celestial Kingdom in Almost Abselute Possession of the Bear.

Tokio, March 29.—A document purporting to be a transaction of a secret treaty concluded some months ago between Russia and China has been published in Shanghai. It is a strange and scarcely credible document. China, in consideration of the northern power's good offices in backing her bills upon France for a paltry sum which England would have supplied unconditionally, and in combining with Germany and France to drive the Japanese out of Llao Tung, places any for all of her harbors at Russia's disposal for belilgerent purposes and also permits Russia to secretly raise levies, buy horses and obtain coolies in Chinese territory. These various privileges, if challenged by another power, are to be ascribed to force majeure, China pretending lnability to oppose Russia's action. But at the same time China is to enjoy the pleasure of openly attacking Russia's enemies should she so desire. Further, when the Siberian railway is finished, Russia is to be at liberty to build a branch line to Tallen on the northwest coast of the Gulf of Pechili, or to any other point she pleases; and will be allowed to occupy and fortify an island for the better protection of the terminus of the line. She also obtains leave to select favorable positions on the Chinese coast opposite Vladivostock and to attack Corea with Manchuria should difficulties arise with Japan about the peninsula. Per contra Russia promises to use persuasion or force if necessary against any power attacking China, to lend several hundreds officers for the drilling of 100,000 Chinese troops in Manchuria, and subsequently in the five northern provinces of Chipa proper, and to hand over the branch railway built to her in Manchuria should China at the end of fifteen years have proved herself competent to manage it. The opinion of intelligent observers in the east is that no such treaty can have been concluded.



Ottawa, March 30.-(Special.)-The Government have been informed by Gra Mr. Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, that the conference on the Pacific cable question has been postponed until the first week in May, and that if the Canadian delegates leave Ottawa during the last week in April they will be in time to be present at the opening of the conference. This postponement will suit the Canadian Government admirably, as it will enable Sir Mackenzie Bowell, who is admittedly the one man in the country who should attend the conference, to be present. His co-delegate will, of course, be Mr. Sandford Fleming, originator of the cable scheme.

The Government has under consideration the request of the Halifax-Bermuda Cable Company for ald to the proposed extension to the West Indies. The company have decided to keep scret the position of their cable from Halifax to Bermuda. The cable goes out the western side of George's Island, but after that its course is not known outside the office of the company. Its course after leaving the coast of Nova Scotia is also kept a profound secret, and is not marked on any of the public charts in use. The cable is considered to be of great strategic importance, and its location is desired to be kept secret to prevent any possible attempt in time of war to cut this line of communication between Halifax and Bermuda, which are often British men-of-war rendezyous.

Under the direction of Prof. Prince, Commissoner of Fisheries, an admirable collection of specimens of the fisheries of Canada has been got together here to be sent to the Imperial Institute in London for the permanent exhibit there. The collection will be shipped to England this week.

Col. Amyot's Death.

General regret has been expressed here regarding the untimely decease of Col. Amyot, M.P. for Bellechasse. The flag on the Parliament building was half-mast out of respect to the memory of deceased, while a beautiful wreath was placed upon his desk by the Conservative members of the House. Col. Amyot's death makes the fourth vacancy in the Hause, the others being Pontiac, Missisquoi and Soulanges.
