TIMBER REGULATIONS.

The Ontario Government Make a Half-Mearted Move to Protect Canada's Interests in Regard to Sawlogs.

The Ontario Cabinet met on Tuesday and added the following to the Crown timber

The undersigned has the honor to recommend that the Crown timber regulations be amended by adding thereto the following: No timber licensee or noider of a permatengaged in cutting, taking or removing sawlogs or timber upon or from the lauds of the Crown, or driving, hoating or towing the same in Canadian waters, and no other person, tirm or company engaged in or about any such work under the authority or with the assent of such licensee or holder of a permat, shall employ or engage, or permit to be employed or engaged, in any capacity whatever in and about or in connection with such cutting, removing, driving, moating or towing in Canadian waters any person who is not a resident of or comfedied in Canada, except the following persons, viz., the agent or manager having charge or supervision of the entire lumbering operations carried on by any person union or company within the Province of Ontario, the nead bookkeeper or accountant under such agent or manager, and one estimator or explorer for each operation, unless under special permission of the Commissioner of Crown Lands expressed in writing.

Should any such holder of a timber livense or permit who is cutting, taking of removing logs or timber upon or from the lands of the Crown, or any person by his or their authority or assent, employ or permit to be employed in his lumbering operations, either by himself or his agent or contractor, any person who is not a resident of the Dominion of Canada or domiciled therein other than is above excepted, then his license or permit, as the case may be, shall be supenied and held in abeyance, and shall not again be issued until so directed by order in Council, and then only upon such terms and conditions as the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may impose; and all timoer and sawlogs cut on territory included in the license or permit shall be deemed to have been cut in trespass, and shall be subject to selzure and to the penalties provided and applicable to timber cut in trespass by any Act of the Legislature or by any regulation.

Winnipeg, Sept. 22.- (Special.) - A quarter of a million bushels of wheat were marketed in the province to-day. Two hundred cars were shipped east. The price ranged from 73 to 80 cents. The C. P. R. are getting five hundred additional cars.

DIGGINGS IN ONTARIO.

Placer Deposits Reported to Have Been Discovered West of Port Arthur. Port Arthur, Ont., Sept. 22.-(Special.) -R. J. Walker, a pioneer prospector, has just reached town with a story of the discovery of another new gold area. It lies south of Tache station, 135 miles west of Port Arthur, and is said to con-

tain rich quartz and placer deposits. The leads occur in a series of mountainous ridges, which intersect the coun-

tainous ridges, which intersect the country, and the alluvial gold is found in the gullies between the hills. The quartz veins vary in width from 20 to 70 feet, and it is from these that the gravel in the gulches containing the precious dust has been washed down.

Mr. Walker says that he tested the gravel in one of the valleys over a distance of a mile and a half, and that every time, without fail, he got color in his pan. He considers that the staff will average 5 cents per pan, which, at the rate of 50 pans per diem, means a daily wage of \$2.50.

The district has been named the New Klondike, and some West Superior investors have just gone in there. Tache is a station on the C. P. R. midway tetween Bonheur and Wabigoon, and the new mineral region, therefore, lies between the Saw Bill and Manitou districts.






