HAMILTON TROUBLE

Hobart Fuller Went to Rochester and Fell Into the Hands of the Police Under Suspicion.

FRIENDS HURRIED TO HIS SIDE

Prominent People of the Ambitious City Believe the Lad is Innocent.

Rochester, N.Y., Nov. 24.—Altho nothing has yet been ascertained by the police, it is, however, thought that the man Hobart Fuller, the Canadian character, arrested last night on the nominal charge of the murder of a woman, is a mistake. The police yesterday evening laid out Miss Thera Kestling.

Three Hamiltonians on Hand

Three Hamiltonians who appeared here this afternoon, temporarily arrested the attention of the police, when the body of the girl, whose dead body was found behind a billboard on Davis-street at midnight last Wednesday. They were William H. Spratt, a Hamilton, Canada, and they were on a hurry call sent by young Fuller, who is 17 years of age. Blase, a Hamilton lawyer, who carried them to the Police Headquarters in a cab.

The three men went away, where the matter was thoroughly talked over, and then went to the telephone booth in the Hotel, and telegraphed to the lad's widowed mother in Hamilton. To report to her the sad news, and to offer her the aid of the Hamiltonians. The lad's mother is a widow, and is said to be a very kind and affectionate mother.

Causes of the Arrest

KRUGER'S RECEPTION IN PARIS NOISY ENOUGH AT ALL EVENTS

His Greeting by President Loubet and Foreign Minister Delcasse Was Courteous But Formal and Not Official—Spent Sunday in Transval Fashion—Crowds Cheered.

HOW SUNDAY WAS SPENT.

Paris, Nov. 24.—Paris, while giving full vent to the pent-up feelings of sympathy with and admiration for the Boers in his reception to Mr. Kruger today, comforted herself with the thought that the Boers had a few isolated instances of anti-Boer demonstrations, which were, however, never on a par with the enthusiasm of the Boers themselves.

PROVINCE MAY PAY TAXES MATTERS AT STAMPS

Commissioner Fleming Says the Government Should Be Assessed for Local Improvements.

JUDGE MACLENNAN THINKS SO, TOO

"Happy Medium" is Mr. Fleming's Solution of the Problem of Exemptions.

The Assessment Commission spent an hour Saturday morning discussing the taxation of personality, including income, and then adjourned to meet on Monday and take up the powers and duties of municipal officers in making assessments and in the collection of taxes, including the levy thereof by the sale of goods and lands.

Province Should Pay Taxes. The chief feature of the session was the advocacy by Assessment Commissioner Fleming that the provincial institutions should pay taxes for local improvements if not for all purposes.

Mr. Justice Maclellan said: "So far as local improvements are concerned, the claim seems to be just."

The sitting was opened by the chairman, Charles Hamblin, who represented land owners in the central part of the city, if the delegates appointed at a recent meeting were ready to address the commission. The delegates were not present, and they have now lost all chances of being heard in regard to personality and income tax.

An Insurance Case. Corporation Counsel Fullerton informed the commission that Judge McLaughlin had issued an order in the case of the assessment of the Edinburgh Insurance Company, Edinburgh Life for \$100,000; Judge McLaughlin says that in certain cases, which he cites, he holds them liable to pay a \$14,000 assessment. The effect is that when the province is liable to pay an agency here, and are doing business at that agency, we do not have to ascertain whether there is a net profit at Canadian office. Mr. Fullerton wished to have this made clear, so that all ambiguity would be destroyed.

The stopping of negotiations is over the clause regarding exalted Chinese personages. Everything here is at a standstill, and the business situation is going from bad to worse. The Chinese plenipotentiaries, Li Hung Chang and Prince Ching, to whom the reasons for the delay has not been officially communicated, are also in a bad position. Every day they receive orders from the Taroo, commanding them to proceed to the coast to make a settlement with the powers. The only reply they can make is that the powers are unable to do so until they have heard from their governments.

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CHAMBER OF MINES

For Southern British Columbia, Kootenays and Yale Has Been Formed as Result.

Rosland, B.C., Nov. 24.—A Chamber of Mines for Southern British Columbia has just been established here. Mr. J. B. McArthur was elected president of the organization, and is explaining the object of which it was intended to serve, he made a number of pertinent remarks. He said: "The time has arrived when some central organization ought to be established which would obtain all data in regard to the development of the mines—the installation of mining machinery for the shipment of ore from each of the mines in these camps, their estimated value, the number of men to employ, the cost of shipping to treatment, and this information should be tabulated by the Chamber of Mines and sent to the financial centres of London, Berlin and Paris, and also to the Associated and Canadian Press Associations for publication in the newspapers of the United States and Canada. In this way the product of the investment would be placed weekly before the investing public as the result of the mining operations in these camps."

Mr. McArthur pointed out in considerable detail the work which would be accomplished by the Chamber and pointed out that it would serve the interests of the whole of Southern British Columbia and would be a handsome structure of Chinese architecture, on his farm adjoining the mine. He said that he had been in the Chamber of Mines for some 10 years ago.

Mr. McArthur took an active part in the Mackenzie Rebellion of 1871, and also in the Fenian Raid of 1866, being a member of the Queen's Own Rifles, and also of the Royal Grenadiers. He was famous in his time as the best shot in Canada, and was a noted deer hunter. As a member of the first Wimbledon team sent to England in 1872, he won the Princess of Wales special prize of 20 guineas for the highest aggregate score among the colonials. The prizes and money realized for his shooting amounted to over \$800.

In 1858 he married Eliza Cousins, who died about two years ago. Two sisters survive him, Mrs. James Van Nostrand and Aurora and Miss Mary Sheppard of Toronto; also two sons, Charles H. Sheppard, Philadelphia, and Herbert M. Sheppard of Toronto, and one daughter, Henrietta M. wife of James W. Jackson, Berkeley Avenue, Norway.
