## "Can't You Forget" of the Things?" Referring to Incidents of Prepared Interview Said Hon. Mr. Stratton to Globe Reporter

### Royal Commission Will Finish Taking of Evidence Some- time To-Day.

It is the unexpected that sometimes happens, and this was the case before the Royal Commission yesterday morning when a "fishing expedition" on the part of Mr. McPherson, in examining M. O. Hammond, the Globe reporter, resulted in an admission that is considered by some as being of a nature that is somewhat damaging to Hon. J. R. Stratton. Mr. Hammond was called before Mr. McPherson said he understood that Mr. Hammond, after having been on the stand earlier in the investigation, had since stated to friends privately that he could give more evidence on one of two material points than he had given on the stand. After an examination at some length by Mr. McPherson and by Mr. Johnston as to the circumstances surrounding the obtaining of the famous Globe interview, Mr. McPherson, in re-examination, asked the witness if Mr. Stratton had at any time asked him to suppress his knowledge regarding that interview.

### "CAN'T YOU FORGET?"

The most important point brought out in the Gamey investigation yesterday was: M. O. Hammond, Globe reporter, swore that a few days after Gamey made his statement in the house Stratton asked him (Hammond) to prepare a statement and give it to Mr. Johnston. Stratton asked him if he couldn't forget some of the things, but he did not know what he referred to in particular.

Asked by Mr. McPherson what reply he made, he said, "I think I said I might forget things I wasn't asked about."  
Stratton repeated the remark a moment later, but witness did not go any further than that.  
"What remark?" Mr. McPherson asked.  
"The remark which I gave you previously: 'Can't you forget some of the things?'"

The World asked Hon. J. R. Stratton yesterday if he would make a statement in explanation of his having approached M. O. Hammond. The Globe reporter, with the suggestion that he might forget some of the events touching the Gamey interview which Hammond secured for The Globe. The minister replied:

"I'll say it at the proper time and place."  
"Asked what he considered would be the proper time and place, he said:  
"I'll be the judge of that."  
And the Provincial Secretary left the Parliament Buildings by the east door, where a carriage was waiting for him.

## WOULD STOP THE BONDS GRAND TRUNK IS UNFAIR

### Toronto Junction Council Adopts Resolution Urging Parliament to Refuse Grant.

### WON'T ACT AS COMMON CARRIERS

### Action Outcome of Letter From Railway Regarding the Union Stock Yards.

Toronto Junction, May 15.—(Special.) The Town Council at a special meeting held in the Council Chamber to-night passed important bylaws relating to the Northern Riano factory, the hypothecating of this year's taxes to the Molson's Bank for a loan of \$10,000 and the unanimous approval of a resolution proposed by Councillors Sheppard and Wright, in which the Grand Trunk Railway is charged with discriminating against Toronto Junction by refusing to act as common carriers, and in which it is asked by urging upon the Dominion parliament not to grant concessions asked for by the Grand Trunk Railway at the present session, until the town has received reasonable trading privileges.

### What It's All About.

The resolution is the outcome of a letter from the Grand Trunk Railway Company refusing to waive claims for damages, providing for the carrying out of a resolution to lower the hill at the corner of Keele and St. Clair-avenues. The G.T.R. owns the north-west corner of the streets, and the Union Stock Yards Co. is placing several houses on its property facing this street.

### Resolution in Full.

"Whereas the stock dealers through the Province of Ontario have for a number of years been loudly complaining against the existing market conditions at this centre, and have been agitating for better facilities for handling their business;  
"And whereas the Town of Toronto Junction has come to a large amount of trouble and expense in view of enabling the Union Stock Yards Company to furnish the necessary market facilities for the carrying out of the above-mentioned resolution, and whereas the Union Stock Yards Company is making the rapidly growing requirements of the business of the town of Toronto Junction a heavy burden upon the town of Toronto Junction;  
"The resolution reads as follows:  
"Resolved, That the Town of Toronto Junction do hereby request the Province of Ontario to refuse to grant any concession to the Grand Trunk Railway Company, until the town has received reasonable trading privileges, and that the Dominion parliament be urged not to grant any concession to the Grand Trunk Railway Company, until the town has received reasonable trading privileges."

Montreal, May 15.—(Special.)—The Daily Witness in discussing the Grand Trunk Pacific bill, says: "What has influenced the railway companies are able to bring to bear at Ottawa we can only suspect, but the fact remains that whether the government be Liberal or Conservative, the bonusing evil remains with us. ## GRAND JURY SAVES BELL FROM CRIMINAL TRIAL

### Telephone Monopoly Must Be Prosecuted at Montreal, If at All for Conspiracy.

### CLIMAX OF FARMERS' HOT FIGHT

### President Hoover of Rural Company Declares That an Information Will Be Laid in Quebec.

The climax of the hot fight of Locust Hill business men against the Bell Telephone Company was reached yesterday, in a victory for the company. The Bell Company escapes criminal prosecution in the matter of the exclusive contract with the C.P.R., giving it a monopoly of the railroad stations in Canada.

In the Criminal Assizes yesterday the Grand Jury returned "no bill," and Mr. Justice Street commented freely upon the case, indicating clearly that the only recourse is prosecution at the place where the contract was made—Montreal. His Worship also suggested that in addition to the monopoly feature of the contract the clause by which the C.P.R. undertook not to permit other telephone lines to cross its right of way might be the subject of investigation in Montreal, since the country, if the contract was entered was divided so that the ordinary commerce of the day could not be carried on without serious inconvenience. So the fight is to be transferred to Montreal.

### Electrical Energy's Legal Status.

A striking feature of the brief Grand Jury investigation was the comment of Mr. Justice Street upon electrical energy as a commercial commodity. While not rendering a specific decision on this score His Worship's observations were in line with the idea that the transmission of telephone messages constitutes a commercial commodity in the meaning of the statute.

### Frank Followed World's Exposure.

This is the prosecution that followed the World's exposure two months ago of the exclusive contract and the injustice imposed upon the rural district surrounding Locust Hill. The farmers and business men of that neighborhood had been informed of the Bell telephone connections at any cost. They then organized a stock company and put in a modern system. The final moment they were refused a connection with the Locust Hill station, except with the payment of \$2500. This the monopoly refused to give, unless the Co-operative Company practically surrendered their entire property.

### Farmers Appealed for Aid.

In desperation the farmers appealed to the member for East York, and he communicated with President Shaughnessy. Then the exclusive contract became a story and was published in The World. Then the citizens of Ontario County caused a complaint to be lodged with the President. The Bell with its criminal conspiracy in refusing to permit the connection. The justice was done as to the advisability of holding the accused for trial, and pending another hearing, an indictment was arranged in York County.



**DON'T WANT TO BE TAXED**

**Ontario Railways Enter Strong Protest Against Premier's New Taxation Bill.**

**PRACTICALLY MEANS CONFISCATION**

**Too Poor to Pay More than They Are Doing—Mr. Pettipiece Makes Comparisons.**

Representatives of several railway companies in Ontario entered a strong protest against Premier Ross' taxation bill when the measure was again taken up by the Railway Committee of the legislature on Friday morning. The companies represented were: Grand Trunk, C.P.R., Canadian Northern, Canada Southern, Canada Atlantic, Tillamook and Lake Erie, Central Ontario, T. & E. Nipissing and James Bay, and Lake Erie and Detroit.

**Kick From Grand Trunk.**  
Mr. Hellmuth, who appeared for the Grand Trunk, said the bill would tax the roadbed, ties, rails, cuttings, embankments, culverts, bridges and everything relating to railways. His company has 2363 miles of road in Ontario, and pays \$121,000 in municipal taxes and \$12,000 in provincial taxes, the latter at the rate of \$3 a mile. The construction of the company's lines cost \$30,000 a mile, and the total assessment under the bill would be \$75,000,000, and the tax would be increased twenty-two times over the present rate.

**Ent Up All the Profits.**  
He claimed the railways could not pay any such tax if the shareholders were to receive anything. He quoted figures showing the net earnings of some of the roads in Ontario.

Mr. Gibson was inquisitive. He asked why so little was derived by Ontario in taxes from railways when so much was paid in other countries.

Mr. Hellmuth said the earnings of roads in England were no criterion for Canadian roads. He said it is fair to compare our roads with those of the United States. When the latter country had a population of 20,000,000 the roads were not taxed at all. In England the railways were taxed on the net earnings in each parish, and if this principle were applied to Canada the roads would not yield a cent in taxes. If the bill went thru it would practically mean the confiscation of the roads.

**Present Law Satisfactory.**  
Mr. Aylesworth, for the C.P.R., said there had been no great outcry against the present taxing law. Under the bill 30 per cent of the net earnings of the road would go for taxes.

Mr. Pettipiece argued strongly for the bill, quoting figures to show that the railways were not adequately taxed in Ontario, where they pay only 2 per cent of their net earnings, while in Michigan they pay 20 per cent.



ARMY'S A SOCIAL RESERVE

Mr. Charlton protests against ragging of rankers and finds supporters.

ILL-TREATMENT OF FELLOW COLONIAL

Minister says prejudice does not exist among colonial soldiers in an army.

Ottawa, May 15.—In the House today Mr. Charlton called attention to a cable report of the court-martial in a regiment of lanciers. It was stated that General Roberts was taking a great interest in the case. The victim was Lieut. Willows, a "ranker," and a colonial. Mr. Charlton said there were many cases of persecution of men who had risen from the ranks. The colonies would not accept the opinion that the British army was to be a social reserve in which none but patriots could hope for advancement, and would protest against ill-treatment of a fellow colonial. The matter was important in view of the discussion over the colonies taking part in Imperial defence. General Hector Macdonald had been treated like a dog because of social prejudice in the army.

Minister Borden said that Mr. Charlton had departed from his expressed opinion that the colonies should attend strictly to their own business. There was undoubtedly some prejudice against rankers, but it did not prevail generally in the army, but not against colonial. Mr. Bell (Picton, N.S.), said the House should not give the impression that it condoned ragging in the army. Canadians were passing into the army were interested in seeing fair play. Col. Hughes supported Mr. Charlton, and Mr. Bell said that men of the highest ability had left the army broken-hearted because of social prejudice. Mr. Lavell took the same side, declaring that the question was not domestic, but Imperial, and that the colonies had a right to protest.

AT OSGOODE HALL

Jennie Quirk, widow of the late James Quirk of Bradford, must supply security for costs in her action against the London Guarantee and Accident Company. She is now residing at Buffalo, which is the reason for the order being made. The suit of William Abbott of Port Perry against Mrs. Melinda M. Curtis, his wife, regarding the guardianship of a deceased child, was set for Monday, May 18, at 10 o'clock, in the Divisional Court, before the Hon. Mr. Justice Borden. Mrs. Curtis had been successful in three trials and two appeals, as well as in a prosecution for bigamy, and now asks that the matter be finally settled. She must go before the Divisional Court, before she can get the order.

CHANDLER AND MANNING

Chandler and Manning shipped a steam machine and X ray apparatus to Dr. Win. Kerr of Dunville, Ont., via the C.P.R. in November last. The outfit was burned in the freight sheds at Dunville the day it arrived there. The purchase price was \$487, and the supply dealer began suit against Dr. Kerr and the C.P.R. for the amount. The Masters-in-Chancery held that they might not sue both parties, but must elect to which they wished to sue. Mr. Justice Borden, later, reversed this decision, but yesterday the Divisional Court upheld the Master's opinion. The case of Rogers v. the Town of Pelee took place yesterday. It was held over until Mr. Aylesworth, who appeared for the plaintiff, concluded his argument in the Court of Appeal, and was vigorously contested by him and George F. Shupler, K.C., for the defendant. The action was brought to recover damages for personal injuries suffered by Rogers by falling from a walk across a ditch running alongside a street in the town. The bridge had not been placed there by the municipality and judgment was given in its favor at the trial, from which Rogers is now appealing. The case was finalized, but judgment was reserved.

COURT OF APPEAL

The numerous appeals from decisions under the Assessment Act of 1902 were concluded yesterday by judgment reserved. The court will resume on Monday at 11 o'clock in the afternoon the appeal of Rex v. Carlisle, Plaintiff, v. Cummer, Answerer v. High, City of Quebec v. Joseph Fay's Company. Judgment on the appeal of Andrew Macdonald against the decision of the Board of Assessment for the year 1902, will be delivered on Monday at 11 a.m. Judgment will also be given in the case of Moffatt v. The Canada Lumber Company.

TRIAL COURT

The High Park runaway case was concluded before Mr. Justice MacMahon in the City Hall yesterday afternoon and judgment was reserved. Sarcophagus Court. Donald Ross of Toronto died on May 1, leaving an estate worth about \$3000. A policy with the Western fire for \$1000 was given his two daughters, Elizabeth and Jessie, and his son James got a similar amount, while the balance is divided among his grandchildren. Margaret Metcalf died in Toronto on the 8th inst., leaving an estate of \$112,124, among the Catholic institutions in the city. She appointed Hugh J. Kelly executor. In the County Court. The case of Winifred v. Pearson was decided in the County Court yesterday by the award of \$61.05 to the plaintiff. It was an action to recover money for work and materials in connection with some fire extinguishers. The next case is a replevin action, arising out of a dispute over a chattel mortgage, in which F. Y. Clued, manager of the People's Coal Company, is endeavoring to recover a horse from Agnes Pezner and Marie Blagden. For Alleged Conspiracy. For alleged conspiracy to defraud, in connection with some book agency deals, John H. Eaton and John J. Smith were arraigned in the General Sessions yesterday. MacGregor Young is Crown Prosecutor and G. H. Ryckman is for the defence. John H. Lewis is the complainant, but there are a number of witnesses who complain that they also have been similarly treated. The case occupied the whole of yesterday and was adjourned until today. Sessions Grand Jury. The grand jury at the Sessions has returned "no bill" in the case of Frank Rowlin, charged with theft. Two bills have been found in the following cases: Alfred Roffey, assault; Lawrence Galloway, seduction; Alfred Roffey, John Baldwin and Thomas Carr, assault.

SAT WITH THE COLONEL

Magistrate Denison was accompanied on the bench yesterday morning by the distinguished Glasgow magistrate, Basil Willocks. Mr. Willocks, who is taking in Toronto with his host, Mr. Stark of Paisley, Ont., expressed his admiration for the Canadian method of administering justice. ARMY'S A SOCIAL RESERVE

Mr. Charlton protests against ragging of rankers and finds supporters.

ILL-TREATMENT OF FELLOW COLONIAL

Minister says prejudice does not exist among colonial soldiers in an army.

Ottawa, May 15.—In the House today Mr. Charlton called attention to a cable report of the court-martial in a regiment of lanciers. It was stated that General Roberts was taking a great interest in the case. The victim was Lieut. Willows, a "ranker," and a colonial. Mr. Charlton said there were many cases of persecution of men who had risen from the ranks. The colonies would not accept the opinion that the British army was to be a social reserve in which none but patriots could hope for advancement, and would protest against ill-treatment of a fellow colonial. The matter was important in view of the discussion over the colonies taking part in Imperial defence. General Hector Macdonald had been treated like a dog because of social prejudice in the army.

Minister Borden said that Mr. Charlton had departed from his expressed opinion that the colonies should attend strictly to their own business. There was undoubtedly some prejudice against rankers, but it did not prevail generally in the army, but not against colonial. Mr. Bell (Picton, N.S.), said the House should not give the impression that it condoned ragging in the army. Canadians were passing into the army were interested in seeing fair play. Col. Hughes supported Mr. Charlton, and Mr. Bell said that men of the highest ability had left the army broken-hearted because of social prejudice. Mr. Lavell took the same side, declaring that the question was not domestic, but Imperial, and that the colonies had a right to protest.

AT OSGOODE HALL

She must go before the Divisional Court, before she can get the order.

CHANDLER AND MANNING

Chandler and Manning shipped a steam machine and X ray apparatus to Dr. Win. Kerr of Dunville, Ont., via the C.P.R. in November last. The outfit was burned in the freight sheds at Dunville the day it arrived there. The purchase price was \$487, and the supply dealer began suit against Dr. Kerr and the C.P.R. for the amount. The Masters-in-Chancery held that they might not sue both parties, but must elect to which they wished to sue. Mr. Justice Borden, later, reversed this decision, but yesterday the Divisional Court upheld the Master's opinion. The case of Rogers v. the Town of Pelee took place yesterday. It was held over until Mr. Aylesworth, who appeared for the plaintiff, concluded his argument in the Court of Appeal, and was vigorously contested by him and George F. Shupler, K.C., for the defendant. The action was brought to recover damages for personal injuries suffered by Rogers by falling from a walk across a ditch running alongside a street in the town. The bridge had not been placed there by the municipality and judgment was given in its favor at the trial, from which Rogers is now appealing. The case was finalized, but judgment was reserved.

Toronto Might Lose Fair Buildings at Wish of Dominion Government.

Assessment Commissioner Fleming has forwarded a letter to the Mayor respecting the acquisition by the city of the Garrison Commons.

The proposition is for the city to acquire a site outside of this municipality, suitable for military purposes, and to exchange the same with the Dominion government for the Garrison Commons, and, in addition, to pay the government such a sum of money as will be agreed upon between the parties so as to enable the government to erect first-class buildings for the militia, or otherwise as may appear right to the government.

He also suggests that the terms of the proposed legislation be published, so that the citizens may have an opportunity of protesting if they so desire.
