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The congregation is now completing the forty-first year of its history. During all the past, God's goodness has been manifested towards us in large measure and in many ways. But few who were connected with the congregation at its inception now remain, but even those whose connection is recent have learned enough of our history to unite with older members in gratitude to Him from whom all blessing comes. A history such as ours becomes, when wisely regarded, a rich inheritance; and, while it lays upon us a weighty responsibility as to carrying forward the Lord's work, it also serves as a stimulus and encouragement to maintain and increase all that the past has realized.

In order to do this we must constantly draw from the source and fountain of blessing which is in the Lord. Apart from Him we can do nothing. Without Him our history, honourable as it is, may even become a snare to us—an occasion of pride and indolence. But the grace which is in Christ is abundant to the supply of all our wants, and is freely dispensed by the Holy Spirit, to all who would share in it. With what gratitude, therefore, should we contemplate the resources of our exalted Head, "who is made unto us of God, wisdom and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption," and in whom it is our unspeakable privilege to stand "complete"!

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e Allocaoom each The vacancy in our pastorate still continues. We trust, however, that a true minister of Christ shall soon succeed the faithful and eminent pastor whom it pleased the Chief Shepherd to give us before. For this, we cannot doubt, unceasing prayer shall be made by many; and if it be so, we may confidently expect that "He who holds the seven stars in His right hand, and walks in the midst of the seven golden candlesticks"—who both qualifies and commissions true teachers in His Church —will signalize His goodness and mercy towards us, as in the past.

Some slight reduction of our numbers has taken place during a prolonged vacancy, but we are thankful that it has not been greater. We note also, with satisfaction, that the pulpit services have been acceptable. Since the Rev. Mr. Jordan came to us at the beginning of December, the attendance on ordinances has been exceptionally large, and every part of congregational work has gone forward with increased hopefulness. We gladly bear witness to the assiduity and sympathy with which Mr. Jordan has discharged all pastoral duty. It is also gratifying to record that at our late communion many names were added, both by certificate and by profession of faith. By these the loss of past months has been largely repaired.

During the past year nine members of the Church have been removed by death. May "The Father of mercies and the God of all comfort" be near to bereaved relatives and friends, and to all of us may the exhortation come with augmented force, "Be ye also ready." If faithfully engaged in the Master's service we can never be taken by surprise. "The righteousness of God which is by faith of Jesus Christ," is our preparation equally for life and for death. Clothed in this righteousness we are ever safe, and may with humble confidence anticipate blessed reunion, in the Saviour's presence, with those dear to us who "sleep in Jesus."

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ABSTRACT OF

Minutes of Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

Pursuant to notice given from the pulpit on the two preceding Sabbaths the fortieth Annual Meeting of the congregation was held in the lecture-room on Wednesday evening, the 17th of January, 1894.

Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Caven, Moderator of Session, at the conclusion of which Mr. A. A. Allan was elected Chairman on motion to that effect. Mr. John Paton was appointed Secretary.

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The minutes of the last Annual Meeting of the congregation having been printed and distributed were taken as read and were adopted.

The Secretary then read the minutes of the special meeting of the congregation, held on 31st May, 1893, and the same were adopted.

The Managers' Report and Treasurer's Statement for the past year were read by the Secretary, and on motion of the chairman, seconded by Mr. A. R. Christie, they were adopted and ordered to be printed with the annual reports of the congregation. A statement of the total contributions of the congregation for the past year was then read, the details of which will be found in the tabulated statistics in this Report. The following letter from St. John's congregation in this city was then read :--

To the Members of Session and Board of Management of St. James Square Church :--

Gentlemen :

The time having arrived when the financial aid from the mother church, arranged for at the induction of our pastor, Rev. J. McP. Scott, will cease, the congregation of St. John's Church by unanimous vote at their Annual Meeting held on Wednesday evening, 10th January, 1894, send on to St. James Square congregation the expression of their deep gratitude for all the assistance which has been so generously given during the few years of their history.

It is worthy of grateful mention that ever since the inception of the work, in the organization of the Sabbath School seven years ago, there has been quiet, uniform and rapid progress, until at the present time the congregation has a membership of 230 members in good standing and is well consolidated, well organized and healthy in every department of its work.

It is right that special mention should be made of the fact that such a 'hopeful position as that in which the congregation now finds itself could not have been possible apart from the very considerate and generous treatment which has been received at the hands of the Session, Board of Management and Members of the congregation of St. James Square Church. This has been shown not only in the assistance given by annual supplement, but also by payment of interest on the mortgage and by private contributions from friends in the congregation to special necessities as they have arisen in the progress of the work.

It is specially desired that the mother congregation should be aware of the deep appreciation St. John's congregation has for the valuable help rendered by members of Session who served for a time as interim elders by appointment of Presbytery, for the help given some of th Ithat and Squa to co V men your be a I than than than

John's dered by s interim elp given by others in other departments of the work, but especially for the long and self-forgetful service given by those who have shared the work of the Sabbath School, some of whom indeed are at the present time members of the teaching staff.

It has, moreover, been a great satisfaction to know that in all our work we have had the cordial interest and good-will of the whole congregation of St. James Square Church, and this we would bespeak for the time to come.

While the congregation is not at the present moment entirely independent of financial assistance from your Board of Management, yet we are anxious so to be at the earliest possible date.

Loving thankfulness to God is due from us, and we thank Him first and for all, yet take this opportunity of thanking St. James Square Church for all its generous help in the past

Much satisfaction at the receipt of this letter was expressed by the Chairman and by others.

The election of seven Managers to serve for two years was then proceeded with, the Chairman appointing Messrs. Jos. Henderson, James Watt, D. J. Mc-Donald and W. S. Ormiston, scrutineers to take the vote. Ballots with the names of those nominated on the 10th inst., viz.: James Buik, Robt. Darling, Geo. Douglas, W. D. McIntosh, Alexander Nairn, H. W. Nelson, John Paton, R. C. Steele and Thomas Woodbridge were then distributed and the vote proceeded with.

While the scrutineers were counting the vote the business of the meeting was continued.

Mr. Wm. Douglas moved, seconded by Mr. A. R. Christie, that the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer and Secretary, for their services during the past year. Carried.

Moved by Mr. H. W. Nelson, seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, that the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the members of the choir for their valuable services during the past year. Carried.

Moved by Mr. T. R. Bain, seconded by Mr. John Watson, that Messrs. Cathron and Watt be appointed Auditors for the ensuing year. Carried.

Mr. R. C. Steele moved, seconded by Mr. R. Carrie, that Messrs. Kirkland, Kerr, Grant and Paton be a committee to attend to the printing of the annual reports of the congregation. Carried.

Moved by Mr. R. A. Grant, seconded by Mr. R. M. Gray, that a vote of thanks be given the ladies of the congregation for their kindness in providing for the social part of the meeting. Carried.

Mr. Alex. Nairn moved, seconded by Mr. Thomas Woodbridge, that all amounts subscribed for ordinary church purposes, as well as for missionary objects, be published in the annual report along with the names of the subscribers and the amounts subscribed.

This motion was opposed by Messrs. R. C. Steele, Thomas Kerr and Robt. Kilgour, and on being put to the meeting was voted down.

The scrutineers reported the following elected Managers: Messrs. John Paton, Jas. Buik, H. W. Nelson, Alex. Nairn, W. D. McIntosh, Robt. Darling and R. C. Steele.

Music was then furnished by members of the choir and others, and refreshments served by the ladies of the congregation.

The Rev. Mr. Jordan, in a few words, congratulated the members present on the success of the meeting and pronounced the benediction. cong geth of

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Managers' Report.

The Managers have pleasure in submitting to the congregation their report for the year just closed, together with the Treasurer's Statement, the correctness of which is certified to by the Auditors.

The revenue as compared with that of the previous year was as follows :—

showing a falling off in 1893 of \$1,146.03, a result that is not surprising in view of the long continued vacancy in the pastorate.

Notwithstanding this decrease the revenue was sufficient to wipe out the adverse balance of \$372 37 with which the year began, to provide for \$326.86 remaining unpaid on the Church Building and Repairs Fund on 31st December, 1892, and to leave a balance on hand of \$323.

There were several unusual items of expenditure during the year to which attention may be called. It was found necessary to repair the church roof at a cost of \$238.27. And it may be remarked in this connection that the church building is now in a thorough state of repair. Insurance premiums amounting to \$175 had to be paid, an item that should not again appear for three years. At the request of the Sabbath School teachers a new organ was purchased just before the close of the year at a cost of \$134, and placed in the school-room. It is believed that this expenditure will be appreciated by all who attend the weekly meetings held in that room.

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The mortgage on the church property remains at \$15,000, bearing interest at five per cent. per annum. A renewal of the mortgage for five years was effected in April last, the interest on which is now payable half yearly instead of quarterly as before. For this reason only nine months' interest was paid last year, the interest from 1st October, 1893, not being due until April next.

The obligation incurred at the annual meeting of the congregation in January, 1890, to aid the St. John's Church in this city to the extent of \$1,000 has now been fulfilled, the amount paid last year on this account being \$100. In addition to this obligation, your Managers have each year paid the interest on the mortgage debt of that congregation, the amount so paid last year being \$158, and it may be necessary to continue this help for a year or two longer.

The Managers have not lost sight of the need of improvements to the choir gallery, attention to which was called at the last annual meeting of the congregation, and concerning which. authority was given the Managers at the special congregational meeting held on 31st May last, to expend \$450 on the required alterations. Plans were prepared by an architect and tenders called for, when it was found that the cost would be more than the sum authorized. After mature consideration it was decided, with the approval of the organist, to delay making the alterations for the present, it being considered that more extensive alterations may be desirable.

During eleven months of the year the want of a settled pastor has been felt most seriously in all branches of congregational life; but, since the advent of the Rev. Mr. Jordan, this want has been fully supplied. The attendance at public worship every Sabbath and at the weekly prayer meeting has greatly increased, indicating, it is hoped, a quickening of spiritual life in every direction. TOR

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Revenue.

"God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work."—2 COR, ix 8.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES are made in three ways :—(1) Weekly Offerings in envelopes placed on the collection plate each Sabbath; (2) Quarterly Subscriptions; (3) Contributions placed on the collection plate. The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation, and the Managers greatly prefer that it should be adopted by all. The sittings are all free, no pew rents being charged to anyone.

The number of teachers on the roll is 26—12 male, 14 female.

The withdrawal during the year of some of the teachers who had been longest on the staff, was matter for very much regret, specially the Misses Telfer and Miss Glover, also Mr. Lee, Mr. McCarter and Mr. Robert Rodger. The fact of some living at long distance from the school and others engaging in new and important fields of Christian work, made such changes unavoidable.

The School met regularly every Sabbath afternoon during the year, at 3 o'clock, excepting the months of July and August, when the hour of meeting was 10 a.m. Owing to the removal of several families from the bounds of the congregation, and not a few of the young people who attended the Bible Classes, now taking part in Christian work in various ways on the Sabbath, the number on the rolls has been considerably reduced. Effort, however, will not be wanting to increase, if possible, our numbers during the coming year. It is indeed gratifying to know, and cause for much encouragement and thanksgiving to God, that

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from the ranks of our Sabbath School there have gone forth so many, from time to time, to labour for the Master, both in home and foreign fields, and that there are those now who hope, in the near future, to be set apart entirely to missionary work.

Seven scholars were enrolled into the full privileges of church membership during the past twelve months.

Interest in missions has been deepened by addresses and letters read to the school as opportunity offered.

Two praise services were held, one on the last Sabbath in September and the other at Christmas; both were truly seasons of joy and thanksgiving.

The usual summer gathering of the school took place last June at Lorne Park and was largely attended, everyone present being delighted.

The annual social meeting was held in the schoolroom on Friday, the 29th December. Besides the scholars, there was a very large attendance of parents and other friends. It proved to be one of the most enjoyable and successful meetings ever held.

Numerous donations in the way of clothing, provisions, books, etc., were sent from the school at Christmas time to the Children's Aid Society, of Toronto, and also to some destitute families in the city.

At the request of the Rev. Dr. Moffatt, of the Bible and Tract Society, a number of the scholars prepared bags suitable for holding books and papers, and which would be convenient for sailors while sailing on the lakes. Besides supplying the Welland Canal Mission with a quantity of books and papers for the sailors, the school has been able also to send to other mission schools, books and papers that had been already read and could well be spared for this good end.

The monthly meeting of teachers has been held regularly on the second Wednesday of each month, immediately after the congregational prayer meeting, and the weekly meeting for the study of the Sabbath School lesson. except the months of July and August, has also been held every Sabbath morning at 10 o'clock. Hol fully shaling ed o the for

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held nonth, eeting, bbath ugust, 'clock. The scholars have been supplied, as usual, with the illustrated papers and schemes of lessons.

Through the kindness of the Jesse Ketchum estate, there has been added to the library during the year, 50 new books. There are at present 677 volumes on hand.

The thanks of the school are due to the Managers who so kindly furnished a new and beautiful organ, and to Miss Inglis also, who has so faithfully filled the position of organist and leader for these many years past.

Surely of the many sided forms of Christian work, that of Sabbath School teaching is the most important and vital in many respects. In its divine possibilities, no work on earth could compare with it. As in the heathen world, the hope, very largely, of the missionary is with the young; is it not *just as true* the hope of the Church of Christ in this and every land called Christian is with the young?

If we but experience the presence and power of the Holy Ghost as we must, when the word of God is faithfully taught and exemplified, need we wonder that we shall see one and another of our scholars quickly declaring themselves whose they are, and who will prove blessed co-workers with Him who came to seek and to save the lost?

333 77 erintendent. regrets the removal of some of its most useful members, but what is our loss is gain elsewhere and gives the Society the privilege of spreading its influence to other parts of the Master's vineyard.

The Foreign Mission Work of the Society has been prominently before the members, and continued interest is manifested in it. In the spring Walter Gowans, whose heart was deeply set on Mission Work in the Soudan, left for that field and is now, with two companions, in Africa. John E. Fee is on his way, with four companions, to undertake pioneer Mission Work in South China. Alf. Robb is waiting marching orders to go to the Congo, and expects to leave in a few weeks. R. H. Glover, R. A. Jaffray, Miss Glover and Miss Nichol are preparing for the Foreign Field, to which they expect to go during the present year.

The financial statement of the Foreign Mission Committee shows an outlay of \$664.23, and the purposes for which given.

In the Home Work a number of the members have given active help in the Wilton Avenue and Cherry Street Missions. In September last, after testing by open-air meetings held twice a week for over four months, the Cherry Street district was selected in preference to Wilton Avenue, and the result has more than confirmed the wisdom of the step. The Cherry Street Hall has had twice to be enlarged, and at Sunday Gospel Meetings there is not an empty seat, and at the various week-night services there is a large and interested attendance. The district is a very rough one and the need of Mission Work great, as almost all who attend the meetings are of the non-church-going class, but the Lord has already blessed the efforts of His children, and a number have been turned from their careless and vicious ways to the service of the Lord lesus.

The Relief Committee has been enabled to do good work in that department. In the summer a number of poor children were sent to the country, where kind frie to t son sub var

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members, gives the e to other

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do good imber of re kind friends gave them a pleasant holiday in their homes, and to those friends we feel deeply grateful. At Christmas some thirty or forty families in the Mission district had substantial provisions distributed to them, and at various times clothing has been given to needy families.

The Sick Visiting Committee has faithfully fulfilled its mission to the sick and suffering, and over a thousand visits have been made and flowers left for the suffering ones. The weekly Prayer Meetings keep up in interest. We feel the loss in the removal of some of our members, especially the young men, and would gladly see others of the youth of the congregation taking their places, and join in this hour of prayer and fellowship which has proved such a blessing to many.

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The Schemes of the Church.

The Lord has taught us plainly in His Gospel that we may not in our work for Him stop with the care of our own church or of those more immediately about us; but, if we will be loyal to Him, must aim at carrying and sending the Gospel to the destitute in our own land and in all nations. For practical purposes our General Assembly has divided this work, committed to our trust by Christ, into several departments under the charge of special Committees, which are commonly spoken of as "the Schemes of the Church." The obligation to contribute to the support of these, as the Lord may prosper us, rests upon the Lord's last command, and from the responsibility no member of Christ's Church can be absolved.

These "Schemes" are divided by the General Assembly as follows:

I. FOREIGN MISSION WORK.

1. Our Church sustains Foreign Missionary Work in Central India, Trinidad, S. A., the New Hebrides, our own Indian tribes in the North West, Formosa, and also a New Mission in Honan, N. China, and a Mission to the Jews.

The amount asked for the current year for these different Missions is \$115,000. This includes the amount expected from the W.F.M.S. has and with felle des tain

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II. HOME MISSION WORK

has to do with the spiritually needy in our own land, and is conducted under the three following departments :

1. The Home Mission Committee seeks to supply with the ordinances of religion those of our Protestant fellow-countrymen, who, living in thinly settled and destitute regions, are unable without our help to maintain them.

The amount asked for the current year is \$68,000.

2. It is the special object of the Fund for the Augmentation of Stipends to raise the salaries of the Ministers of our Church to a minimum of \$750 and a manse, on condition of a certain degree of liberality being shown by the members of the congregations who need such help.

The amount asked for the current year is \$31,000.

3. The work of French Evangelization seeks to bring the Word of God to the large French-Catholic population in our Eastern Province, and so, by giving them the open Bible, to deliver them from that bondage of superstition and subjection to the priesthood, in which Rome everywhere and always seeks to keep her votaries. The amount asked for the current year is \$56,000.

4. The Church and Manse Building Fund, as the phrase indicates, is intended to aid weak congregations in the purchase or erection of houses of worship and manses.

III. EDUCATIONAL WORK.

Under this head is included the sustentation of our various Divinity Colleges. It can easily be seen that no work is more important and fundamental than the providing of an educated ministry for the Church, at home and abroad, especially in these days of so rapidlyadvancing knowledge and widely-opening doors. It should need no argument to commend this work to the sympathies of all our members.

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IV. THE FUNDS FOR AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS, AND FOR MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS

have been established to meet the undeniable claims of those of our ministers who, receiving often very scanty incomes, have given their lives to the work of our Church, by contributing to their support when by sickness or old age they are disabled from longer service, or by payment of annuities to their widows and orphans when they have been removed by death.

The amount asked for the current year is \$24,500.

For the support of these various departments of Christ's work, there have been formed in the congregation the following organizations:

1. The ladies' Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, aiding the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Western Branch of the Canada Presbyterian Church.

2. The *Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band*, an organization of the young ladies of the Church, working and contributing for the same end as the last named.

3. The Wayside Gatherers is an association of the girls in the congregation for the same purpose.

4. The Missionary Association of the congregation is an association whose work it is to secure and collect contributions to all the Schemes of the Church from all families and adherents of the congregation. Systematic contributions to their support are asked of all members and adherents of the Church. Collectors are appointed for each Elder's District to visit each month all families and individual communicants and adherents of the congregation, and receive their subscriptions. It is desired that each one will decide as in the presence of our Lord how much they ought to give each month to these purposes, and act accordingly. Where no intimation of the contributor's wish is given the funds received by the collectors are annually allocated to the several Schemes in the proportion suggested by the General Assembly. In submitting our seventh annual Report, we thank God, who has graciously continued to us the honour and privilege of being "workers together with Him." We desire to realize that to every one is the charge given, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature," and thus, to feel that those whom we have sent forth are doing our work and justly claim our sympathy and prayers.

At our meetings on the third Tuesday of the month, besides praise, prayer and the reading of the Scriptures, we have been stimulated by listening to papers on the life and work of eminent missionaries, and on various mission fields. It is a matter of grateful satisfaction

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that a growing number of members-forty-four-have taken an active part, thus increasing the interest and profit of our meetings.

Special thanks are due to Miss Inglis, our faithful organist and leader of praise.

Our interest in the work is further quickened by the "Monthly Letter Leaflet," in the circulation of which our congregation still takes the lead. The number of subscribers is now 169.

We have a membership of ninety-two, also nineteen "Scattered Helpers." Two life members have been added: Mr. Laws, of Livingstonia, Africa, by kindness of Miss Smith, Pembroke street, and Miss White, missionary to India, by kindness of Mrs. Ewart.

We have the gratification of reporting increase in the amount contributed during the year, \$420.13, the total income, an advance of \$51.41, while the thankoffering, \$155.35, showed an advance of \$35.80.

The ordinary income is made up of members' fees (\$1.00 General Society membership fee, 25 cts., that of the Auxiliary), offerings by mite-boxes, envelopes and donations; \$14.25 in money, and clothing to the value of \$45.00 were sent to the needy Indians on the Okanese and Pasquah Reserves, in connection with the Birtle Industrial School.

While thankfully rejoicing in the progress indicated in this Report, our ideal is not yet realized. Regret is felt and expressed that more of our women do not join in the work, but we are striving to press forward with hopeful anticipations. We need and seek grace to make our Auxiliary worthy of the distinguished missionary whose name it bears, and, above all, that each of us may win her Master's approval, "She hath done what she could."

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REPORT OF THE

Missionary Association.

The Committee have to present to the congregation the Report of the Missionary Association for the year ending 31st December, 1893

The total amounts contributed through the Association this year is \$3,759.21, an amount about ten per cent. less than was received in 1892.

The number of contributors is somewhat less than in former years, and there is an absence from our list of some liberal contributors whose places have not been taken by others.

The amounts received monthly through the lady collectors were fairly up to the average of former years, and the Committee would commend the plan of monthly or quarterly payments being made to the collectors, not only because it is an encouragement to those who have undertaken this branch of Church Work, but also because it has proved to be the means whereby a steady revenue can be most effectively maintained.

The Committee in their Report last year called the attention of the congregation to the deficit of about \$100 that existed in the fund for the special support of a missionary to Honan. They regret to state that this deficit has only been slightly reduced, and also that it is only due to the receipt of a generous contribution of a special nature from one of the members of the congregation that we have not to report a further increase in the deficit. 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T F will be sufficient to provide the amount of \$750 to which we are pledged, and also to satisfy all the existing claims upon this fund.

The missionary revenue of the congregation embraces, not only the amount contributed through this Association, but also the sums received by the Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, the Wayside Gatherers and Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Bands, all of which are connected with the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, the Sabbath School and the Bible Classes. The amounts contributed by the congregation this year for missionary and benevolent purposes have reached the sum of \$6,898.34, and while this is not so large a sum as has been reported in some former years, yet the losses we have sustained through the absence of a settled pastor will, we believe, fully account for the lessened revenue.
