

EMPRESS FIVE HOURS LATE IN HER SAILING OUT OF HALIFAX PORT

Excuse of Newspaper is That Delay Was Caused on Intercolonial

(Halifax Echo)

Owing to the combination of an accident and alleged mismanagement on the part of the I. C. R., the Empress of Ireland, carrying the Royal mails, passengers and cargo, did not get away from Halifax until one o'clock Sunday morning, five hours after the time the big liner was expected to sail.

The mails arrived by the I. C. R. on the Maritime during the afternoon and although in a huge quantity the exact amount of which is not yet known, but much exceeding the corresponding mail of last year, was put aboard very speedily, and the liner awaited the arrival of the passenger trains from Montreal over the I. C. R. from St. John.

The large amount of traffic out of Montreal compelled the C. P. R. to put on three trains from that city to St. John, these trains carrying many passengers for steamers bound out from the New Brunswick port. The trains arrived at St. John at the following hours Saturday morning, 4,20, 4,45, 5,00. Two of them conveying first and second class passengers were consolidated, making one train which left St. John station at 7,10 a. m. This train became derailed while passing from the siding to the main line, and did not get away from St. John until 9,10 a. m.

In the meantime, the second, a colonist train, conveying the third class passengers, pulled out of the station at 8,20, arriving at Halifax at 7,15.

Made Slow Time.

Made Slow Time.

The derailed train with the first and second class passengers having been already delayed two hours was given an I. C. R. engine of small dimensions and entirely incapable of making time with a train of fourteen cars. The running time between St. John and Halifax is nine hours and ten minutes, whereas under the lack of proper rolling stock on Saturday, this particular train occupied fourteen hours and twenty minutes, a loss of five hours and ten minutes, arriving at Halifax at 11.80, when it should have arrived at 6.20. Had this train been given the proper locomotive it could have arrived at Halifax in proper time and enabled the Empress to sail if not on the minute, very close to the hour of eight o'clock. There was nothing to be done but the transfer of the passengers and baggage. Made Slow Time.

JAMES E. WHITE DIED TODAY

City Loses One of Best Known Citizens-Prominent in Business Circles--Was MoreThan Ninety Years of Age

James E. White, one of this city's oldest citizens, and one widely known and respected, died at his residence, 68 Garden street, early this morning.

Mr. White was born at Robertson's Point, Grand Lake. He was one of a family of ten children, eight sons and two daughters. His father, Vincent White, was a successful farmer and lumberman, for many years resident at Belleisle. It was Vincent White who brought to St. John the first raft of logs ever sawn here and shipped to England. These logs were all saw1 by hand. From that small beginning has grown the large lumber manufacturing and shippin; business now carried on at this port.

Mr. White in early life formed a partnership with his brother, the late William H. White, of Sussex. The firm began business in a small way, as country merchants at Belleisle Corner. The business was very successful, and branch stores were soon established at several others points in King's and Queen's counties, including Sussex.

About 1857 Mr. White came to this city to reside, and established here for his firm a wholesale business as general and commission merchants, and dealers in dry goods, groceries and hardware. Although it is now more than thirty years since Mr. White retired from active business, older residents of the city will recollect the firm of White Bros, as one of the most enterprising and successful business houses of the sixties and early seventies.

Mr. White was a grandson of William White, a loyalist who with three brothers fought in the Revolutionary war, and on the granting of independence to the United States came to this province to live under the flag he loved. William White, at a seventies of the sixties and early seventies.

Mr. White was a grandson of William White and his wife, both attained the great age of nearly 100 years, and then number of their descendants now living in the river counties of this province is very large.

James E. White in coming to this city at first attended Exmouth street Methodist church, of which for many years he was one of the

C. A., the Salvation Army, Mount Allison University, and various charitable organizations.

About three years ago he wrote and published a history of the White family from the time, about 1647, when William White, his ancestor, came from Deal, England, and settled in New Jersey. Although Mr. White was over eighty-eight years old when he wrote this book, and although its preparation must have involved great labor and research in the collection and examination of historical documents and family records, he succeeded in making the volume one of great interest and value to those interested in the history of the settlement of this province. He presented a copy of this book to every descendant of William White within the fact that over 300 copies were thus disposed of, in addition to a considerable number sent on application to various public libraries, and private persons in the United States, testifies how much hiz work was appreciated.

He leaves four children surviving-him. These are Mrs. G. Ernest Fairweather, Mr. Justice White, Mrs. Edwin Morris and Oscar B, White, of Souris, Manitoba. Of his brothers, four, viz: Gilbert, Vincent S., William H., and Dr. Jacob D. White, predeceased him, while Hiram B. White of this city; Simeon H. White, Sr., at present of Hallifax, and Charles T. White, of Sussex, survivehim. His two-sisters, Mrs. Gillies, of Belleisle, and Mrs. John Gunter, died some years ago.
