FIRST EDITION. THE LAND PURCHASE BILL.

PARNELL OPPOSES IT AND ANALYZES BALFOUR'S SCHEME.

He Claims That It Does not Provide for Carrying Out What It Proposes, and Would Also Extend the Irish Credit. London, April 22.—In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Adell moved that the Irish land purchase bill be rejected by the House. Speaking in support of his motion, he said that the measure justified the claims of the Nationalists made nine years ago. He welcomed Mr. Balfour as the latest recruit to the ranks of the land reformers.

While accepting the government's recognition of the principle of the land for the people, Mr. Parnell declared that he could not admit that the bill was a satisfactory solution of the land question. The initial question was how far the British taxpayer would go in lending credit to the Irish landlord. The experience gained by the discussion of Mr. Gladstone's bill in 1885 showed that the taxpayer would not go far enough to finally settle the land difficulty.

Candidate Johnson testified that he was offered over \$50,000 to withdraw his name from the race.

POWELL MILL EXPLOSION. (SPECIAL TO THE GAZETTE.) Fredericton, April 23. The mill of the Anthony Powell Co., at Negunegun caught fire last evening and blew up, shattering the whole of Marquetown. Twenty minutes later there was another heavy explosion. The fire was scattered in all directions and this morning is still burning.
