Vehicles on Streets. The following provisions respecting vehicles on streets, recently adopted and added to the existing regulations in the City Ordinance relating to streets, are published by order of the Board of Control for the information of citizens. It is the intention of the City to have these regulations rigidly enforced.

Overtaking Tram Cars. 56 A .- The driver of every vehicle, includin a Motor Vehicle, coming up with or overtaking any tram car, and intending to pass on the left side thereof, shall, if the tram car is at a stand-still or about to come to a standstill or stop, still or about to come to a standstill or stop, bring his vehicle to a standstill in the rear of said tram car until after the tram car is again

Tate has written many poems dealing with mining life; for there is no man who better understands the drudgery and the hardship endured by those who "dig in pits." And we get a striking fliustration of his feeling for the hard life of the miner in the first verse of a workaday lyric which he wrote some time ago, which reads:

Back in the shadows of night returning.
But in the hours that intervene

Joseph Skipsey, as a matter of fact, learned to read by committing to memory the appearance of the big letters on the placards stuck up on the heardings by the pit-mouth. As a trapper boy in the pit, he wrote and eighered on the "trap-door" in the intervals when no wagon was passing through, and then taught himself grammar; and without any education of any kind, by slow degrees and some keen native in stinct, he found out and hecame acquainted with masterpleess of our literature.

Then he commenced to write and compose lyries, and the day came when the pitman-poet numbered among his friends Tennyson, Rossetti, Burne-Jones, William Morris, and Lord Morley, to mention only a few. It was these friends who combined together to recommend him as custodian of Shakespeare's birthplace; but he will always be remembered among the miners of Northumbrian as the man who sang the song of the pits, and who told in sympathetic, stirring, and poetic phrase of the strenuous and monotonous life of the man below the surface. Many tales are told of the bravery, fortitude, and remarkable endurance of woman settlers in the remote places of the West and North, some of whom have also proved themselves the possessors of exceptional ability and business keenness.

Thus there is an honor roll of at least a half-dozen women in Alaska who played the part of mining prospector so well that they made good stakes and won fame and fortune. They were, in the theory and practice of placer mining as any man in the North, and proved it by results. It is told of one of these venturesome six that once, to save her husband's bank at Nome from failure, she traveled three hundred miles in midwinter, alone and by dogteam, carrying a substantial clean-up of gold nuggets from her own holdings. By day and night, through snow and blizard, she kept to the trail, and reached Nome, with her golden relief, just in time to avert the threatened disaster.

Another woman, not a gold-hunter, mushed 1,450 miles from Rampart to Whitehorse, in the Yukon. She did it alone, too, and in the dead of a deadly winter. With her train of dogs she made an average of twenty-five miles aday, and on one or two days covered thirty-five miles. That is good traveling on the winter trail, even for a man, and especially good for a woman when for the greater part of the way she ran, not rode, holding only by her hands to the bars of the dog-sleigh. For on some days it was too old to fide; fifty and sixty and seventy below zero, which means that one must keep moving.

Just like a man, this woman musher rode and tramped, sometimes breaking a way ahead for the dogs when she zero-fog was too dense for them to see. Just like a man, too; when out of reach of the road houses, she made camp at night-time beside the trail, and slept the deep warm sleep of the ontdoor North. Bavages of New Canal.

Ravages of New Canal.

Acres upon acres of the finest fruit growing land in the Nisgara fruit belt will have to be shandoned and turned over to the Government for the New Welland Ship Canal, according to the plan just registered in the Lincoln County office.

The right-of-way at some points is half a mile in width, and at no place is it less than 800 feet wide. At the lake front 1,500 feet out in the lake is claimed for harbor purposes. The canal outs through the village of Homer where a number of the old landmarks and buildings will be removed. The autiline just misses the new Anglican Church now in course of erection. Here the width of the right of way extends to sus-half mile, owing to the location of a big lock, waste weir and side channals.

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
