

Will Be on a Five Per Cent, Basis and Next Few Months.

To Be Raised Independent of

French Loan.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 17, 5.30 p. m.—An internal credit loan of \$100,000,-000 on a five per cent, basis is now being negotiated by the ministry of finance. It will be floated probably in a short time. The price of issuance has not been fixed but will probably be 93

to 95.

This loan, it is said, is entirely inde pendent of the French loan which has not yet been negotiated. The payment of the interest and prin cipal will be in gold and probably will

be taxable. The determination to re-turn to Russia itself for funds is taken only recently. Thursday the minister of finance conferred with a number of the principal bankers of St. Petersburg and Russia generally and received assurance that the project was feasible. The banks are prepared to underwrite on suitable terms. The government savings bank, it is said, wilt assume \$25,000,000 of the total and such banks as the Moscow Merchants and the Volga and the Kama banks are well able to underwrite large portions of the loan from their own resources.




