lives. Eighty-seven were rescued and

taken to Cardiff. Among the lost are

many prominent citizens of New York,

Boston, and other cities.

Among the survivors are Judge Hoek-

ham, of the New York Court of Appeals,

and Mr. W. H. Crozier, a large number of

other prominent citizens.

The ship which ran into the Ville du

Havre was an iron ship of 1200 tons
