ANNUAL MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Appointment Of Officers—Important Purchases of Site for Electric Plant

The annual meeting of the Council was held on Tuesday evening, His Worship, the Mayor presiding. The councillors present at opening of proceedings were Messrs. Alexander, Pinault, McKenzie and Miller. The minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

Communication read from Union of Canadian Municipalities with account for the annual fee of \$15.00. Referred to Finance Committee.

Communication from Shives Lumber Co., regarding hydrants. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee. Councillor Lunan entered the meeting.

Communication read from the Building Inspector, enclosing application of George Sanson for a planing mill on site of old laundry.

This was referred to Fire Protection Committee.

Councillor White entered the meeting. Communication read from Robert Crawford, ex-chief of police, regarding arrears of salary claimed for the month of July, 1910.

Referred to Police and License Committee.

Petition received from the residents on Stanley Street east, for Water and Sewerage connections. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

A petition for a license to conduct a barbering establishment from Alphonse C. Roy, and a petition from Eugene Tremblay for a license to conduct a store for soft drinks, were referred to Police and License Com.

Petitions for Billiard Room License from Edward Alexander and Aing LaCasse, were referred to Police and License Com.

Petitions for Livery Stable business were received from W. T. Gray, R. Ellsworth, H. P. Doyle and for Trucking Licenses from W. T. Gray, A. J. Arsenau, Geo. Dunn, Wm. G. Young, Edward Young, Adam LeBlanc, Jos. P. LaCasse, J. Arthur O'Keefe and P. McKinney, were referred to Police and License Com.

Communications from the Town Engineer regarding the building of houses on Albert Street and the matter of the width of Wellington Street, referred to Public Property and Site Com.

Coun. Alexander submitted the report of the Water and Sewerage Com., recommending payment of accounts amounting to \$238.02. Report received and adopted.

In a further report Coun. Alexander recommended the purchase of a transit for the Town Engineer. This report was adopted and the Town Engineer was authorized to get prices for the most suitable instrument.

Coun. Miller submitted the report of the Finance Com., recommending payment of accounts amounting to \$83.74. Report adopted.

Coun. Pinault submitted a verbal report from the Public Property and Streets Committee. In it he dealt with the matter of buildings on O'Leary St., which were said to be built on the street line. The Committee found that the buildings of Gray and Ellsworth were not on the old street line and owing to the heavy cost to the town, would make no recommendation, so the matter dropped. Coun. Pinault further stated that an offer had been received from Wm. Dickie for a small piece of his lot on Pleasant and Ritchie Sts. for \$100, but this matter was not further gone into.

Coun. Lunan brought up the matter of putting in iron stakes when surveying and Coun. Pinault said this had been arranged and would be done from now on.

Regarding O'Leary St. it was pointed out that the town had no deed of this street and it was felt that nothing should be done with regard to street improvements, until the deed is in the hands of the town council.

The clerk was authorized to get prices for a sprinkling cart and report at next meeting.

Coun. Lunan presented a report from the Electric Light Com., recommending the purchase of the Shives property by the town, as a site for the Electric Light Station and other town interests. Two propositions had been

before the committee, the Moffat property for \$7,000 and the Shives for \$10,000.

It was the feeling of the Council that the Shives property would be more valuable to the town, and it was unanimously agreed to purchase the property for \$10,000, the payment to be arranged by the committee. Coun. Moores entered the meeting at this time.

By permission of the Mayor Mr. Sanson, who was present, was heard regarding the proposed laundry permit. He said it was now proposed to put in an electric plant and there would be no smoke stack, simply a flue from a boiler for heating purposes. He wanted to know why he was being held up as he had done all that the council asked him to do and he would like to get the matter settled. His Worship stated that this matter was in the hands of the Town Solicitor and nothing really could be done until the Solicitor's report had been received by the Council. The change from steam to electric might make a great difference, but it would require to wait until next meeting.

White and McKenzie and His Worship the Mayor; Commissioner of Public Charities, G. E. Asker; Town Engineer, R. J. Sandover Sly; Street Commissioner, Wm. Taylor; Inspector of Plumbing, R. J. Sandover Sly; Chief of Fire Brigade, W. J. Christie; Fire Engineer, George Sargeant; Fireman, Monte Cantwell; Caretaker of Town Houses, Wm. Noble; Manager of W. and S. Dept., R. J. The Police and License Com. were authorized to purchase a telephone for the Chief's house, and the Fire Com. to place a phone in the fire station. A mild discussion took place on the suggestions that peddlars should have a license but nothing was done in the matter. Coun. Pinault suggested that instructions be given to have the front street cleared of all the debris lying on old sites. In reply to a question from Coun. Moores re sidewalks, Coun. Pinault said the Com. were hourly expecting the arrival of 3 cars of sidewalk material and immediately they arrived, sidewalks would be put down under the direction of the Town Engineer.

Council adjourned.

NEWCASTLE BOARD OF TRADE

Urges the Necessity for Better Train Service

At the monthly meeting of the Newcastle Board of Trade it was resolved to urge upon the I. R. C. management a change in the running of No. 40 mixed train, which leaves Campbellton eastbound at 19 o'clock, but travels too slowly to be of any use for passengers beyond Bathurst, so that such train might leave Campbellton at 18.30 and reach Moncton in time to connect with the express for St. John at 3.10 and the Eastern S. S. Co.'s boats for the U. S. A., and with the mixed that leaves Moncton for Halifax at 3.20; also to have No. 39 which leaves Moncton at 22.40 and takes 13 hours to Campbellton leave Moncton early in the morning and reach Campbellton about noon the same day, such change to be embodied in new summer time table. These changes are also favored by the Chatham and Campbellton Boards.

Public Notice

Public Notice is hereby given that under the First Part of chapter 79 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1903, known as "The Companies Act," letters patent have been issued under the Seal of the Secretary of State of Canada, bearing date the 3rd day of March, 1911, incorporating under the name of "Richards Manufacturing Company, Limited," all of the Town of Campbellton, in the Province of New Brunswick, for the following purposes, viz:—(a) To carry on a general lumber business in any or all its branches including the logging, sawing, manufacturing, shipping, buying and selling of and trading and dealing in, and with all kinds of lumber and wood products, commodities, goods and articles which are wholly or in part used and all other products, by-products, commodities, goods and articles which may be conveniently or with advantage to the company manufactured or otherwise which may seem to the company capable of being carried on in connection with any of the above, and calculated directly or indirectly to render profitable or enhance the value of the company's property or rights; (b) To purchase, acquire, hold, lease, manage, develop, control and operate water rights, water privileges and water powers; (c) To manufacture, generate, buy, sell, accumulate, store, transmit, furnish and distribute electric current for light, heat, power and other purposes. Provided, however, that any distribution of electricity beyond the lands of the company shall be subject to local and municipal regulations; (d) To manufacture, build, erect, install, buy, sell, lease, let or operate any or all machinery or appliances for the manufacture, generation, storage, accumulation, transmission, distribution and use of any or all types of electric current and any or all manner of electric machinery apparatus or supplies of any nature or kind whatsoever; (e) To build, erect, buy, sell, maintain, own, operate, hire, lease, let power plants, generating stations, transmission lines, and other plant, machines, fixtures and appliances for the manufacture, generation, storage, accumulation, transmission, distribution and use of electric current for any purposes whatsoever; (f) To promote and otherwise assist other companies for or on behalf of the company in connection with the performance of contracts and the payment of debts and of principal and interest of bonds and debentures of such company or companies; (g) To acquire by purchase or otherwise from any corporation, firm or person any going business which the company may be authorized to carry on and to assume all or any of the liabilities and obligations of such corporation, firm or person; (h) To purchase or otherwise acquire, build, erect, own, control and operate saw mills, pulp mills, paper mills, factories, and other works, wharves, shipping docks, steamers, vessels, scows, tugs, and other craft, plant and conveniences which the company may think necessary or desirable in connection with the business of the company; (i) To take by purchase, grant, license, lease, exchange, or to otherwise acquire, use, own, hold, control, work and operate lands, timber lands, timber limits, water powers, saw mills and other works, buildings, plant, steamers, vessels, tugs, scows and other craft and other real and personal property and any interests therein, and any easements, franchises, rights or privileges which the company may think necessary, suitable, desirable or convenient for the purpose of its business; (j) To purchase, receive, take by original subscription or otherwise acquire and to own and hold shares of the capital stock and the bonds, debentures, or other evidences of indebtedness created by any other corporations notwithstanding the provisions of section 44 of the said Act, and while the holder thereof to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership including the right to vote thereon; (k) To issue paid-up shares, bonds or debentures or in whole or in part for any property, real or personal, movable or immovable or any lease, business, license, franchise, undertaking, power, privilege, concession, right which the company may lawfully acquire; (l) To issue fully paid-up shares, bonds, debentures or other securities of the company in payment or part payment of or in exchange for shares, bonds, debentures or other securities of any

TECHNICAL EDUCATION

At the last meeting of the Board of Trade the members took part in an interesting discussion on Technical Education, and although no definite finding was arrived at, a small committee was appointed to go further into the matter and report back to the Board.

This subject is one which requires careful handling and we are afraid some of the views expressed by members would not help but rather destroy the very thing they were desirous of benefiting. The public school curriculum and technical instruction are two distinct branches of education, and while kept separate with prudent care would tend to a high standard of education, whereas if merged into one prescribed form would tend to hinder the benefit derived from both courses of instruction. To some people it may seem out of place to give the children of our hard-working classes Latin or Greek and the attending classics when they have to leave school early and go out into the world to earn their own living on the farm or at the drive, but does it follow that because some young people have a smattering of the Arts course they make any worse farmers or lumbermen? Surely not! Even a shoe-black with an education would make a better shoe-black than one without learning, and just think what an addition to a lumber camp it would be to have a young man who could read Horace and Virgil or declaim the rounded periods of the ancient philosophers.

Technical Education must come but don't let us have it by the destruction of the present day-school method. There is a right and a wrong way to have it established. Let us give an example of the right way: Many years ago the manufacturers and business men of the city of Glasgow in Scotland, feeling the pressing need of a technical instruction school held a meeting and, enlisting the sympathies of a few public-spirited citizens formed themselves into an executive to undertake the establishment of a technical school. Subscribers were invited and came pouring in and in a few months the old Andersonian building was rented and the classes started. Most of the lectures for the first year or two were given in the evening so that young men at work could go to classes after their business hours. From the first it made for success because the directors knew that they were not interfering with the public schools, but rather adding to the knowledge there given. Later on classes were given in the morning as well as evening and once getting a firm footing the institution was recognised by the Board of Education and is now known as the Glasgow Technical School. It is still a private institution the directors owning the buildings and having all to do with the appointment of professors and the founding of the various chairs. The school has always enjoyed the privilege of having many of the great men of learning in the ranks of its professors and the degree of the college carries with it equal weight to that of the university.

This is a sample of how it was done in one place. Could we not do it also in Campbellton?

Statistics were presented in the British House of Commons to show that 65 per cent. of the adult workers in Great Britain received less than \$5.50 a week. The average rate thus stated is probably reduced by the low wages of agricultural laborers, whose pay in money in some places is as little as 18 shillings a week. The situation accounts for the large increase in the number receiving poor law relief whenever there is a trade depression. It also shows why the old age pension system had so many friends in a country where individualism is strong. Also it creates respect for the people, who on such small incomes, have the self denial that enables them to save money to take them to other lands where their work is better paid and helps the country they choose as well as themselves.

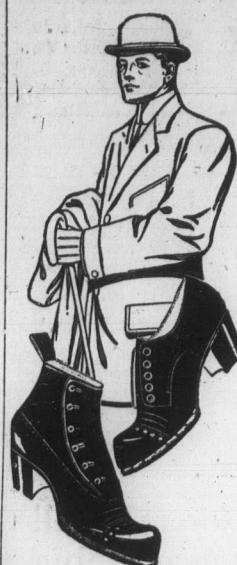

PATRIOTISM AND CIGARETTES

It is a startling story that comes from Ottawa in the form of a report on recruiting for Canada's naval service. Of the young men in Nova Scotia and British Columbia—fine luscious fellows in appearance—who wished to join the naval service seventy-five per cent. failed to pass medical inspection. In most cases rejection was due to cigarette heart or moving picture eye. The cigarette heart is something with which medical men and all interested in the athletic training of the youth of the country are familiar. Nicotine poisoning, and especially the variety of nicotine poisoning following the use of cigarettes, is steadily on the increase. In every factory, store and office one may see lads with the tell-tale yellow stains on the first two fingers of the right hand. Not for them are Marathon triumphs, the fierce joy of a Rugby championship game or a place in the Henley eight. The stains on the fingers are but the outward signs of the havoc wrought by the cigarette habit, havoc so great that it has

ago it was suggested in the House of Commons that a bill to prohibit the use of cigarettes was almost as necessary as one to forbid the smoking of opium. Canada's naval force may be small at first, but it must have men of the best available quality. The cutting out of rations of grog and the weeding out of the youth with the cigarette heart and the moving picture eye afford evidence that the personnel of the service is to be maintained on the highest possible standard. But what about the seventy-five per cent. of the youth who come back to civil life? Are we to go on producing the cigarette heart indefinitely? Is the moving picture eye to take a permanent place among the diseases of the modern world? It may be all right to make war impossible by raising a race unfit for hardships and exacting tasks, but peace also has its duties and its dangers. Every good Canadian should set himself against the growing use of cigarettes by the youth of the country.—Toronto Globe.

MILITIA TO BE REORGANIZED

The Maritime Provinces Districts to be United Under One Command.

Ottawa, Ont., April 20.—It is announced in the militia orders today that in order to reorganize the militia on a divisional basis the four commands in Eastern Canada will be reconstituted so as to form six divisional areas, providing six infantry divisions and four cavalry brigades. The change affecting the maritime provinces is that by which the sixth divisional area replaces military districts numbers 8, 9 and 12 comprising the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island with headquarters at Halifax. To each divisional area will be appointed an officer to command the infantry division to be organized in that area and in addition to command and administer such other units as may be quartered in the division area.

THE DUTIES OF TEACHERS AND PARENTS

(From the Lawrence Sun.) Teachers have too limited knowledge of the home life of the child; parents, too limited knowledge of the school life. Many parents feel that they are doing their whole duty towards their children and the school by occasionally visiting the school in which their child is a pupil. It is much better for the parents to call upon the teacher for the express purpose of getting acquainted with her and to help the teacher to get acquainted with her child.

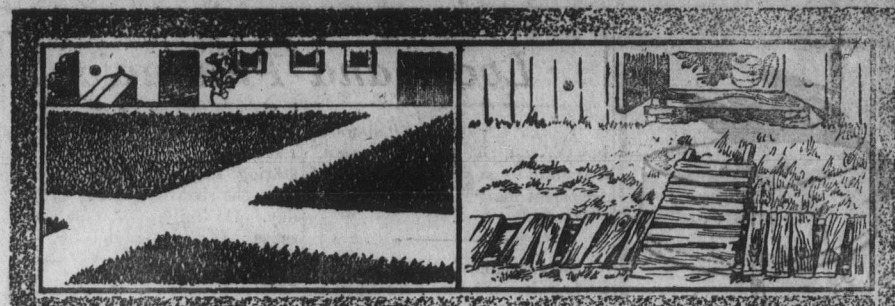

THIRD OF BANCOR CITY WAS BURNED

Two Lives Lost, Forty Blocks Destroyed and Over A
Thousand People Are Homeless

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED

Bangor, Me., May 1.—Property valued at upwards of \$6,000,000 was destroyed and thousands of people rendered homeless by a terrible fire which raged here yesterday.

At 8 a. m. today the fire was virtually extinguished and no further spread of the flames was anticipated. One-third of the city had been destroyed, including about forty city blocks, and some of the finest homes in the residential part of Bangor, all of the public buildings with the exception of the city hall and the greater part of the retail business section.

Estimates of the loss varied and were problematic, although it was generally thought at least \$6,000,000 worth of property had been destroyed. The loss of life, so far as known this morning, was confined to two persons, and only half a dozen injured ones had been admitted to the hospitals.

To aid the police in the protection of the little heaps of furniture and clothing saved from the fire by individuals, one company of militia men patrolled the burned district and effectually prevented all attempts at looting the ruins.

To the Editor of THE CAMPBELLTON GRAPHIC, Campbellton, N. B.
Dear Sir:—The exploitation of the town and its affairs for private gain and political and civic ambition is being evidenced daily. Facts are leaking out and discoveries made sinister and astonishing in their character. The Chappell scheme we can dismiss as an exploded piece of barefaced trickery played upon a too confiding public displaying at once a warped moral nature and a shortsightedness that is amazing. It was so soon found out.

Mayor Montgomery was a prime mover in this affair, and he stands to day before his townsmen convicted of an unblushing piece of effrontery colossal enough almost to become a classic. The Spectacle of Mr. Montgomery appearing at the famous Court House meeting in his triple capacity of civic benefactor, vote catcher, and real estate vendor, with Mr. Chappell sitting by his side, and by his presence lending his aid and countenance to Montgomery in this palpable fraud will not soon be forgotten by those of us who have some regard for honesty and integrity in public life.

Herein lies an interesting question, What excuse will Montgomery have to offer to the indignant and offended community?

However we have this satisfaction. He started the fire which set the pot boiling, and we gladly leave him to stew in the "Chappell Juice" of his own creating.

But a scandal of a much graver nature has come to light. On the files of the town records there is a copy of a letter written by W. S. Montgomery the then Mayor dated August 1908 to Mr. W. C. McNeill, N. B. (copy here enclosed), offering \$13,000.00 worth of Bonds of the Town in which he holds out as an inducement to the prospective buyer the statement that the town council had arranged to set aside \$500.00 per annum as a sinking fund. This has been investigated closely and is now publicly branded as a deliberate lie, and I challenge Montgomery to produce a single record of the town council where this question has been discussed either formally or informally. I have asked men who were aldermen with him at the time they admit that neither before nor since had he consulted them in the regard. It appears to me uncommonly like obtaining money under false pretences and had he signed a statement of this import relating to affairs of his own he would have been in danger of indictment and conviction for fraud. As a citizen I protest against our civic affairs being conducted on such dishonest lines, being a menace to our financial standing and a blow to our reputation as a community. We are all painfully aware that our civic affairs have become so bad under the Montgomery regime that clean reputable business men absolutely refuse to have anything to do with them, as instanced by the resignation of our last Council; but surely the time has arrived for our people to take hold and have a house cleaning, and by a liberal use of Honesty, Fair play, and Square dealing as disinfectants, make the town affairs clean enough to enable us to admit we are citizens of the shire town without having to hang our heads in shame for it.
