GENERAL NEWS.
"God Save the Queen" is sung in nearly 20 different languages.
—In a square inch of the human scalp the hairs number about 1,000.

—One out of every 180 inhabitants of the United States owns or rides a bicycle.
—The Sultan of Turkey has ordered that no newspapers be published until the afternoon, so the censors will not have to forego their morning nap in order to supervise them.
—Every evening as the sun goes down two leaves of the common clover fold together face to face, while the third closes over them.
—In 1845 a Scotch farmer sued the customs authorities for a penny and won his case. The costs amounted to \$700.
—Ten thousand tons of salmon, 300,000 cans, were put up this season in the canneries on the Fraser River, B. C.
—The barking of a dog on earth can be distinctly heard by balloons at an elevation of four miles.
—A 70-year-old woman of Newark, N. J., some time ago married a dapper youth of 25. She thinks she needs but one thing more to complete her happiness, and that is a divorce.
—The German emperor recently issued an order that no sermon preached before him by a court chaplain must exceed fifteen minutes in delivery.
—According to a custom of Korea, all royal Kureans must wear a white hat for three years after the death of one of the royal family.
—When a native New Zealander dies his body is buried in the earth but after decomposition has left his skeleton bare the bones are taken up, cleaned and laid away in artificial tombs.
—There are no undertakers in Japan. When a person dies it is the custom for his nearest relatives to put him in a coffin and bury him, and the mourning does not begin until after burial.
—It is said that window panes of porous glass are being made in Paris. The minute holes in the glass are too fine to permit of a draught and yet large enough to cause a pleasant and healthy ventilation in a room.
—Cincinnati chemist has invented an artificial milk, composed of water, solids and fat. This artificial milk will raise a cream from which first-class butter can be churned. It will also turn sour, and is capable of being made into cheese.
—Lawyers are increasing in Chicago at the rate of 400 a year. Doctors in that city are still greater numbers. Both the professions are overworked, and many men belonging to each are compelled to seek means of subsistence in other vocations.
—The wonderful Chinese encyclopedia comprises 5020 volumes. A perfect set—only one in Europe—is about to be placed in the library of the British Museum. The work is very rare, and even in China there are not more than five copies of this edition.
—A hen on a farm at Old City, Pa., has laid a double egg, they being joined together by a small membrane like a tube. The eggs are without the usual shell and instead are covered with a sort of parchment similar to that covering a turtle egg.
—The Moncton cotton factory is evidently growing to the satisfaction of the present owners, who have just decided to put in new machinery and increase the capacity all round by about one-eighth, or 12 1/2 per cent. The new machinery is expected within the next two or three weeks and will probably be in operation at the beginning of August. It is the second addition to the machinery since the mill became the property of the syndicate.
—Undiminished by their experience in the Suez and Panama enterprises, the French are undertaking to build another great canal. They have now determined to connect the Bay of Biscay with the Mediterranean by a canal over 400 miles long, from 144 to 215 feet wide, and from 28 to 34 feet deep, and with widened passing places every eight miles. There will be twenty-two locks each 650 feet in length and 80 feet in width. The cost is calculated at \$100,000,000. It is, however, safe to say that it will be much more. It is claimed by its promoters that besides greatly expediting commerce, this waterway will be of vast political significance. If it could only be kept open in war, Gibraltar, the strongest fort in the world, would be rendered useless, and France, instead of England, would hold the key of the Mediterranean.
—Mrs. Longley of Providence, R. I., is the first woman to insure her life for \$100,000. She obtained her policy, after proving that she was not in the habit of discussing the subject.
—Clerk Treasurer Cole, of Iron Mountain, Mich., gets a salary of only \$150 a year, and has to give bond of \$150,000.

W. C. T. U. COLUMN.
Over 3,000,000 Signers.
A women's crusade, unparalleled by anything in history, will start out this year to preach temperance and virtue to the heads of all the nations of the earth. Incidentally the crusaders will exhort the people themselves, but it is proposed first to urge reformation on the chief executive of each government. They will carry with them a petition five miles long and signed by 3,000,000 women.
American women will lead this remarkable movement and will probably constitute the majority of the crusaders. They will be headed by Miss Francis Willard, the National and World's President of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. Miss Willard is the daughter of a man champion of temperance in the world. She will be accompanied by her bosom friend, Lady Henry Somerset, Vice-President at Large of the World's W. C. T. U., and who is as energetic an advocate of total abstinence in England as Miss Willard is in this country.
Miss Willard and Lady Henry Somerset will be the central figures of the crusade.
According to present arrangements the number of crusaders will be about one hundred temperance women, but it is not yet settled who shall go or how many there will be. Among those likely to be in the party are Mrs. Mary A. Wood, bridge, Mrs. L. M. Stevens, Mrs. Helen B. Barker, Miss Anna A. Gordon and the Countess of Aberdeen.
The crusaders will carry with them a gigantic petition, which has already been signed by three million women. At a rough estimate, this petition is about five miles in length. The signatures have been gathered on paper, which is to be pasted on cloth. The petition is now in separate parts, scattered over the world. The Woman's Christian Temperance Union has members in various countries of Africa and Asia, as well as in civilized parts.
The crusaders propose to present the petition to all the potentates of the earth, from President Cleveland to the Emperor of China. The petition itself will read to the high potentates by the crusaders, and he will be acquainted with the names of distinguished signatories and of the vast number of other women who have signed it.

PROTECTION OF THE HOME.
ADDRESS TO THE GOVERNMENTS OF THE WORLD.
Honored Rulers, Representatives and Brothers:
We, your petitioners, although belonging to the physically weaker sex, are strong of heart to love our homes, our native land, and the world's family of nations.
We know that clear brains and pure hearts make honest lives and happy homes, and that by these the nations prosper, and the time is brought nearer when the world shall be at peace.
We know that indulgence in alcohol and opium, and in other vices which drag our social life, makes misery for all the world, and most of all for us and our children.
We know that stimulants and opiates are sold under legal guarantees, which make the government partners in the traffic, by accepting as revenue a portion of the profits, and we know with shame that they are often forced by treaty upon populations, either ignorant or unwilling.
We know that the law might do much more to prevent the sale of the moral tone of society and render vice difficult.
We have no power to prevent these great iniquities beneath which the whole world groans, but you have power to redeem the honor of the nations from an indefensible complicity.
We therefore come to you with the united voices of representative women of every land, beseeching you to raise the standard of the law to that of Christian morality, to strip away the safeguards and sanctions of the state from the drink traffic and the opium trade, and to protect our homes by the total prohibition of these curves of civilization throughout all the territory over which your government extends.
The petition has been printed in fifty languages. The American members of the band will appeal to the Federal Government at Washington before crossing the ocean to join their foreign companions. The petition will first be presented to Mr. Cleveland, with a number of appropriate speeches from the crusaders, and he is expected to make an official reply. The Legislative and Judicial Departments of the Government will also be addressed. A committee of the Senate and another of the House have arranged to grant special audiences to the women. This visit to Washington will be made immediately after the annual convention of the Temperance Union.
Arrangements will have been completed by August 15 for the reception of the petitioners by the various heads of the Government to be visited.
The American Crusaders, headed by Miss Willard, will leave New York on Oct. 24 for England, where they will join the rest of the party. They will all leave England on Nov. 3 in a specially chartered steamer.
The trip is expected to occupy about nine months, and the expenses will be about \$1,700 for each person.
