### The Remains of Ten Men Unearthed-

Pierre, S. D., March 22.—While workmen were excavating yesterday on the bluff north of Capital Hill they unearthed the remains of ten human beings which had apparently been thrown into a pit and covered with stones and dirt. Six of the skulls were of white men, one of a white woman and the others of Indians. Bullet holes were found in five of them. The head of the woman had been crushed with a hatchet. An arrow head was found in the breastbone of an Indian skeleton.

Nothing was found to identify the remains except a silver medallion dated 1847, bearing the name of Henry MacKenzie on the reverse side, and an inscription noting that the wearer was at the battle of Buena Vista. Col. Joe Reid, a famous scout among the Sioux for 45 years, was PIERRE, S. D., March 22.-While work-

scout among the Sioux for 45 years, was shown the medallion and said he remembered shown the medallion and said heremembered Mackenzie 35 years ago. He started out with a party consisting of his wife, four men and several Indians to go to Fort Benton from old Fort George, twelve miles from the river. The party never arrived at Fort Benton, and no trace of them ever was found. They were doubtless butchered by the Sioux.

BUFFALO, March 22. - Provincial De tective Murray left here resterday. stopped at the Stafford House, where and Mrs. Birchall, Benwell and I

stopped at the Stafford House, where Mr. and Mrs. Birchall, Benwell and Pelly stopped on their arrival here on Feb. 16, and from where Birchall and Benwell started together on the morning of Feb. 17 on that fateful journey to the Blenheim swamp. Mr. Murray came here to trace back the line of Birchall's movements, and to make available at the trial certain interesting evidence.

It will be remembered that Birchall, on Thursday, Feb. 27, sent a dispatch from Bufialo, himself at Niagara Falls, and signed it "Stafford," as if coming from the Stafford House. The purpose of the bogus telegram is supposed to have been to substantiate statements made by Birchall at Niagara Falls and to induce Pelly to start on that wild goose chase to New York after Benwell. Murray heard the statements of Stafford House people, and then gave it as his unhesitating opinion that Birchall had sent the telegram to himself. The original of the dispatch is in the possession of Manager Burnett, of the Great Northwestern Telegraph Company here, and is carefully guarded, and will be produced at the trial. 

IF ANY proof were needed to show the advantages of dwellings built on sanitary principles, and provided with healthy surroundings, the evidence can be found in the annual report of the Peabody Trust, the organization started by a wealthy philanthropist for the maintenance of good homes for the working classes in London. 



He removes sickness and suffering whenever it is for our good and His glory, but not until the resurrection will He give His people bodies forever free from all infirmity. The time will come when He shall have removed from the earth forever all traces of sin and the curse; and He shall do it as Son of Man, David's Son, Abraham's Son, in association with redeemed Israel and the glorified church.

PHYSIOLOGY AND HYGIENE. Unfavorable Effect of Electricity on the

Electricity on the Fine Facial Nerves.

Electricity is now much employed in the removal of wens, warts, moles and superfluous hair upon the face, and in general with refets.

Yet, according to a writer on the subject, Yet, according to a writer of a transport there is a risk of injury to the nerves or other parts of the face if these operations are not very delicately and intelligently done. A case is mentioned of a lady who had a delicase is mentioned of a lady who had a delicate shading of hair on her upper lip removed by the usual electric process of piercing the root of each hair with a very fine needle through which the current was given, killing the bulb in the skin. The operation was painful, so that it could only be completed in several sittings. It removed the hair perfectly, but the effect on the fine facial nerves nearly cost the lady her eyes, and she lost the use of them for over a year. Always avoid painful processes if possible. Pain means in jury to the nerves, and directly or indirectly to the whole system, and is far from being the insignificant or necessary factor in our lives that amazonian souls make it.

Physical Freedom for Children.

It is as natural to a child to be happy as it is to a fish to swim. But for this they need a certain amount of "letting alone." It is a great mistake for parents to hamper their children with foolish restrictions. Unwholesome Floors.

Medical investigators in England have been medical investigators in England have been nouncing the results of experiments as to be effect of floor deafening on the sanitary the effect of floor deafening on the sandary condition of dwelling houses. Commenting on these, The Analyst says it is shown that this is a frequent source of pollution and vitiation of the air of dwelling houses. The conclusion verifies the statement made some time ago by a German chemist, namely, that there exists nowhere in nature, not even in the original properties of the properties there exists nowhere in nature, not even in the neighborhood of human dwellings, a nat-ural soil so highly contaminated with nitro-genous organic substances and their decom-position products as the deafening material under the floor of dwelling rooms. It ap-pears that in Dundee the investigators exam-ined various samples of the floor deafening from several houses, and in their chemical and bacteriological examination of the speci-mens collected. It is shown that floor deatenmens collected, it is shown that floor deaten-ing furnishes just the medium for the growth of micro-organisms, and gives off gases from putrefaction, provided the necessary factors -moisture, warmth and nitrogenous matter

Nutritive Value of Boiled Milk. The sterilization of milk, which has been attracting attention of late, appears to be a process not without its disadvantages. From a course of very carefully conducted experiments, Dr. E. V. Vasilieff, of St. Petersburg, deduces the conclusion that as records to deduces the conclusion that as regards its nutritiousness, boiled milk represents a de-cidedly inferior dietetic article compared with raw milk.

The Great Cathedral of Nicaragua.

The great cathedral of San Pedro of Leon is probably the finest religious edifice south of the City of Mexico. Like similar buildings, whose ruined arches and walls may be seen in Antigua de Guatemala, this church has walls at least fifteen feet in thickness, and has the solidity of a rock. Numerous earthquakes have produced no impression, and the storms of a century and a half have in no way injured its fine quality of stone.

Why Thread Is Numbered.

Every seamstress, whether she wants No. 30 or 00 or 120 thread, knows from the number just what size the thread will be and what kind of sewing it can be used for; but how the numbers came to be just what they are and just what they mean not one person in 1,000 knows, yet it is a very simple matter to explain, providing you only know the points and how to elucidate them. When \$40 yards of yarn weigh 7,000 grains, a pound of cotton, the thread makers mark it No. I. If 1,680 yards weigh a pound, it is marked as No. 2. For No. 50 yarn it would take 50 multiplied by \$40 to weigh a pound. This is the whole explanation of the yard measurement as used by the spool cotton manufactured. the whole explanation of the yard measurement as used by the spool cotton manufacturers. The early manufactured thread was of three instead of six cord, the number being derived from the number of yards to the yound, just as it is today. No. 60 yarn made No. 60 thread, though in point of fact the setual caliber of No. 60 thread would equal No. 20 yarn, being made of three No. 20 thrands twisted together.—St. Louis Republic.

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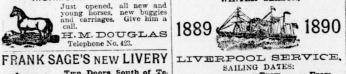
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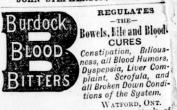
