POLITICAL PROBABILITIES.

The Mail's Ottawa correspondent says; "More than one Minister has expressed the opinion that there must be an adjournment of Parliament from day to day till some agreement is arrived at. The question of leadership of the House has been helved until the new Government is able to meet and act for itself. In the meantime everyone is at liberty to choose his own candidate. It rests of course between Sir Hector Langevin and Sir John Thompson, and if the former is chosen, the arrangement will be regarded as only temporary. The meeting which the Ministers held today was called by personal letters from Mr. Abbott. He wrote to all who had accepted, inviting them to confer with him in the office of the President of the Privy Council. All the Ministers except Mr. Chapleau and Mr. Frank Smith made their appearance. Mr. Frank Smith is out of the city, and Mr. Chapleau was absent on account of illness and doubtless other reasons. The situation was talked over for and hour, and Mr. Chapleau was no doubt the

city, and Mr. Chapleau was absent on account of illness and doubtless other reasons. The situation was talked over for and hour, and Mr. Chapleau's attitude was no doubtthe chief topic. At 1 o'clock six of the Ministers emerged and walked off in pairs. Sir Adolphe Caron and Sir Hector Langevin were together, for since the political horizon became obscured they seem to have become inseparable. Sir Adolphe is at Sir Hector's house or Sir Hector is in Sir Adolphe's office. They are pulling in the same boat, and what the one does the other stands or falls by. After them came Messrs. Tupper and Foster, who were followed by Messrs. Carling and Costigan. Those that remained in the room were Mr. Abbott, Sir John Thompson and Mr. Bowell. The three had evidently been delegated to give further consideration to the situation. They were a special committee for the pacification of Mr. Chapleau. In half an hour they adjourned.

In private interviews several Ministers authorize the statement that Mr. Chapleau is still pressing for the portfolio of Railways, and the demand is not being acceded to. Sir Hector Langevin's friende express themselves as satisfied with the turn of events, and say that Mr. Abbott's Premiership is a check to Mr. Chapleau.

The London Daily News says: "We venture to say the Prince of Wales' new departure, in substantially apologizing to Parliament and the country, exhibits a just deference to public opinion which will dispose of the whole matter. The pain which the unpleasant process must have cost the Prince will count as a part of his expiation with every generous mind."

OTTAWA, June 16.—When the House opened this aftermoon the late Premier's chair was vacant. No information was vouchsafed as to who was to fill the vacant portfolio of Railways and Canals. The announcement was made by Sir Hector Langevin, and this settled all speculations as to who would be the leader of the Commons. Sir Hector Langevin had insisted upon his rights, and those rights had been conceded by the new Premier. Mr. Chapleau was the only Minister absent.

Sir Hector Langevin read the following statement from Hon. Mr. Abbott:

"Having obtained the requisite permission from his Excellency, I desire to make a statement of proceedings after the death of the late Right Honorable Sir John Macdonald. It was felt by his Excellency that the state of public affairs did not necessitate the formation of a new Cabinet until the grave had closed over the late Premier and the last honors had been paid him. On the morning following the funeral his Excellency, exercising his constitutional right, applied to the Hon. Sir John Thompson for his advice with respect to the steps which should be taken for the formation of a new Government. 

THE CITY SEWAGE AND THE ASYLUM'S EXPERIMENT. One of the civic problems of the ne uture will be the disposal of the sewage of the city in a proper and as far as possible profitable manner. As the city grows the problem will become more and more press ing if in the meantime it is not solved. The river cannot be continued as the chief depository for sewage, and it is equally certain that the system of sewerage must be extended and the quantity to be disposed of in one way or other vastly increased. The most feasible scheme so far propounded is that of conveying the refuse to the flats at the Cove, and there filtering it through the soil after the methods exemplified at the London Asylum for the Insane. That system, we learn from Superintendent Bucke, has been an unqualified success. It went into operation on 5th July, 1889, and has ever since been continuously employed. Day by day the sewage, to the amount of 50,000 gallons and upwards, is thrown by the powerful centrifugal pump upon the field graded to receive it. Every day, within a couple of hours thereafter, it sinks into the soil, and as far as the asylum authorities are concerned that is the last of it. "The soil in the bottom of the trenches into which the sewage is thrown," Dr. Bucke says, "is no more foul to-day than it was before the asylum managers began using it for that purpose. No odors rise from the sewage field. The 'chemistry of the earth' disposes day by day of the sewage of our population of 1,100 persons, and to all appearance it could dispose of much more with the same ease. It is enough to make one feel terrified at the

It is satisfactory to know that the experiment at the asylum has proved so thorough a success. The change from the time when the sawage was diverted into Carling's Creek is most marked. Then it polluted that stream, and brought the institution much incidental trouble. Now it is got rid of in a way that benefits the earth and injures no person. Unfortunately, the expense of pumping the sewage upon the ground for filtration is considerable. The site of the asylum was not chosen with a view to its future sanitary needs, and by no process could the sewage be conveyed to grounds controlled by the authorities by gravitation. Therefore resort was had to

In disposing of the city sewage by filtration there is a prospect that the refuse could find its way to the Griffith's flats by gravitation. Mr. Ironsides, of the city engineer's office, has just ascertained that from the east end of the Carling Creek culvert at Talbot street to the surface of the flats there is a fall of 16 feet in the 21 miles to be piped, while from the river en of the King screet sewer there is a tall of about the same height in the 12 miles. Should that fall be sufficient to carry the refuse from the city sewers to the flats it could be disposed of as is the sewage from the asylum. the asylum.

Last year, according to the Brewers' Handbook, 30,-021,079 barrels were produced there, an increase of over 3,000,000 compared with 1890. The increase is chiefly in the older States, New York leading, but in the Dakotas, Kansas, New Hampshire, Wyoming, South Carolina and Idaho reductions are noted. As Canadian barley sent to the States is used for beer-making, it is interesting to note that the Province of Ontario lies close to the principal beerproducing States of the Union, over one-half of the beer manfactured being the product of Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania, States lying closer to the Eastern Canadian barley region than the average Western State. This is a good argument in favor of reciprocity.





STRATFORD, June 16.—Messrs. Millar, Hopkins, Waddell and Williams the recently-appointed dairy inspectors met A. F. McLaren, chairman of the Executive Committee of the Westen Dairymen's Association, at the Tavistock dairy school yesterday for the purpose of presenting a report of their work since their appointment and receiving instructions as to their duties in the coming four weeks. The inspectors reported having visited several factories in their respective districts. They also reported applications for inspections from 112 of the leading factories west of Toronto. This number, they expected, would be doubled. The use of Dr. Babcock's milk tester, together with Quevynse's Inctometer, is proving highly satisfactory, as by this means the inspector is canabled to inform the factory men of the value of each factory's milk, being able to ascertain if the milk has been skimmed, watered or tampered with in any way. Report on the Deceased Wife's Sister Bill Remit.

Proposal to Curtail Speech-Making-Overtures for Summer Sessions of Golleges.

Kingston, June 15.—The General Assembly resumed business this morning. Before the order of proceedings was taken up Mr. W. B. McMurrich, of Toronto, with the idea of facilitating business, moved that a time limit be put upon speeches—ten minutes for opening a subject and five minutes for other remarks. Mr. John Cameron, London, seconded the motion.

t raised quite a burst of opposition, and Mr. McMurrich remarking that its object had probably been attained by bringing the question before the Assembly, withdrew the resolution.

With regard to the marriage remit, which was, "The discipline of the church shall not be exercised in regard to marriage with a deceased wife's sister or a deceased wife's niece," the report was as follows:

"Twenty-one Presbyteries approve simplicity; two substitute "need" for "shall;" one Presbytery leaves out "niece." A majority of the Presbyteries did not report at all. In view of the latter fact Dr. MacLean moved that the matter be referred to the Committee, on Bills and Overtures to be reported upon on some future date. The motion was carried.

Overtures asking for summer sessions in colleges were read from the Presbyteries of Toronto and Brandon.

Dr. Robertson, superintendent of Sessions in the Northwest, and Prof. Brice, Winnipeg, spoke in favor of the overtures and pointed out that if summer sessions were held in theological colleges in summer students would be free in cold weather. The matter was referred to committee.

The report of the western section of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund Committee showed receipts from congregational contributions to be \$9,597; ministers' rate, \$2,148; interest, \$1,671; total increase over previous year, \$1,609. Still there is an adverse balance. In order to secure Sir Donald Smith's conditional donation, energetic efforts will have to be made to raise the proposed \$200,000.

The report of Brantford Young Ladies' College was received and indorsed as satisfactory.

College was received and indorsed as satisfactory.

The report of the board of management of the church and mause building fund showed that during the nine years the board had been in existence it had helped to build 147 churches and 24 manses. The buildings had been valued at \$212,660, and the total aid to them was \$72,427. In last year's report the board appealed for larger help from the church for the work, but apparently the appeal was unheeded. At the inception of the fund the aim was to have a capital of \$100,000, but only about half of the sum was obtained owing to causes already reported to the Assembly. A resolution was adopted that the committee he authorized to take whatever steps may seem practicable to increase the capital to at least the original figure, viz., \$100,000.

capital to at least the original figure, viz., \$100,000.

The report of the Board of French Evangelization tor the year ending May 1, 1891, was presented and was of an encouraging nature. In summarizing the report it appears that there were 36 congregations and mission fields. In these the Gospel was preached at 93 stations to 973 Protestant families, and many more who are not nominally Protestant. One hundred and ninety-seven were received into the church, making a total membership of 1,312. Eleven hundred and thirty-six scholars attended the Sabbath schools. The people contributed \$5,990. One thousand and fifty-nine scholars, of whom 363 were from Roman Catholic homes, were enrolled in the mission day schools.

FIERCE FLAMES.

The Village of Casselman Partially De stroyed—A Big Blaze at Halifax. The Village of Casselman Partially Destroyed—A Big Blaze at Halifax.

Ottawa, June 16.—The village of Casselman, on the line of the Canada Atlantia Railway, was partially destroyed by firstlast night. The saw mills of the Casselman Lumber Company are in ashed and the immense lumber piles, together with six houses and one stable, are a heap of smouldering ruins. The burned district includes 30 acres on the south of the Nation River. The occupants of the houses—mostly mill bands—managed to save their effects. A fire engine was sent from Ottawa. Loss of mill, \$40,000; lumber, \$70,000; six housed and stables, \$5,000. Total, \$115,000. The insurance is about \$70,000. Two hundred men are out of employment.

HALIPAX, N. S., June 16.—Fire was discouered at 4 e'clock this morning in Moir's big bakery fronting on Argyle Duke and Grafton streets, one of the largest and best equipped establishments of the kind in the Dominion. The entire structure is in ruins. The loss will be about \$100,000; insurance about \$20,000. Several hundred men and boys are thrown out of work.

On Monday night about midnight the fire alarm sounded, but it was found to be only a burning brush heap near the Fourth Line.



TWO SUICIDES.

A Horton Street Young Man Hangs Himself.

Robert Balmer, of London Township, Takes Poison.

His Attempt a Few Weeks Ago Failed But the Second Time He Accomplished His Purpose,

August Freudenhall, a young man apparently about 24 years of age, lies dead in a room at 233 Talbot street. A black mark around his neck tells of the mark around his neck tells of the awful manner in which he came to his end. About 11 o'clock yesterday morning screams from his wife caused a neighbor named Richard Tunks to rush in, and in a small clothes room off the kitchen his body was found hanging, it is said, by a slender cord tied round his neck and attached to a nail off the kitchen his body was found hanging, it is said, by a slender cord tied round his neck and attached to a nail near the ceiling. Life was extinct. Freudeniall came to this city from San Irancisco a little over a year ago, and from what has been gathered was a doctor by profession. Despondency, caused by poor circumstances and a lawsuit with which he was connected, but of which nothing can be learned at present, is ascribed as the canse of the act. He leaves a wife and an infant child. The former is half crazed with grief and cannot realize that her husband is dead, but thinks he is sleeping. The cord with which deceased

sleeping. The cord with which deceased was hanged has not been seen since, as Tunks is said to have carried it off and has not turned up since the first alarm. He lived next door to deceased, but had moved lived next door to deceased, but had moved away a day or two previous. An inquest will reveal all particulars.

Took Paris Green.

Robert Balmer, of concession 11, London township, Monday afternoon at 3 o'clook succeeded in taking his life by swallowing a very large dose of paris green. Some two or three weeks ago he attempted suicide by cutting his throat with a razor and came very near bleeding to death, the

came very near bleeding to death, the affair causing a great sensation in and around this city, where he was well known. Careful attention brought him around, and to thank his attendants he evaded them by taking the paris green yesterday. He taking the paris green yesterday. He suffered greatly for about twelve hours, dying about 3 o'clock Tuesday morning. The length of time which he suffered was due to the extremely large quantity he swallowed. Every effort was made to resuscitate the nan, but without avail.

Geo. F. Jewell and C. F. Complin, of this city, were re-elected auditors for the year. The Committee on Certificates and Synod

Assessments reported that 90 congregations out of about 400 had not paid their assessments, and the lay delegates from those places were not therefore entitled to seats

Wm. Gray, of Woodstock, thought the manner in which the assessments were collected or enforced was demoralizing.

The whole amount of this fund available for the secretary-treasurer for the year ending April 30 was \$13,297.29, including \$974 surplus from the previous year. He actually paid out the previous year. the previous year. He actually paid out \$17,312 75, or \$4,015 44 in excess of the \$17,312 75, or \$4,015 44 in excess of the receipts. Some portion of this had been placed to the credit of other funds, but such a state of affairs was worthy of serious attention. His lordship also pointed out that if there was no increase in the receipts for the fund provided for by canon 29 (endowments to the clergy) there must be in the immediate future a severe financial crisis. As regarded parochial subscriptions gross carelessness existed somewhere. gross carelessness existed somewhere. Thirty-six places had sent in no subscriptions whatever, while some were so small that it could not be imagined the clergy-men or people exhausted themselves in the effort.

THE INDIAN WORK. From statistics furnished him he was in From statistics furnished him he was informed that the Indian population of the Diocese of Huron was 7,441, of whom 5,870 were Protestants, 303 Roman Catholics, and 1,268 pagans or religion unknown. Of 7,256 Indians in the Diocese of Algoma, 1,054 were Protestants, 6,043 Roman Catholics, and 158 pagans or unknown. The work of the missions among the Indians in this diocese was dealt with by ans in this diocese was dealt with by the bishop at length. CHURCH OF ENGLAND CONSOLIDATION.

Touching this matter the bishop read the scheme for the consolidation of the Church of England in British North America, of England in British North America, adopted for submission to the various dioceses by a conference of delegates held in Winnipeg on Aug. 15 and 16, 1890. Stated briefly, it provides for a General Synod consisting of the bishops of the church in Canada and Newfoundland and of delegates chosen from the clergy and laity. It states that the following, or such-like objects, may be suggested as properly coming within its jurisdiction: (a) Matters of doctrine, worship and discipline; (b) all agencies employed in the carrying on of the church's employed in the carrying on of the church's work; (c) the missionary and educational work of the church; (d) the adjustment of relations between dioceses in respect to clergy, widows' and orphans' and superan-nuation funds; (e) regulations affecting the nuation funds; (e) regulations affecting the transfer of clergy from one diocese to another; (f) education and training of candidates for holy orders; (g) constitution and powers of and appellate tribunal; (h) the erection division, or rearrangement of Provinces; but the erection, division, or rearrangement of diocescs, and the appointment and consecration of bishops, within a Province, shall be dealt with by the Synod of that Province. It further provides that the Synod shall meet for the first time in the city of Toronto, on the second Wednesday in September, 1893, and that it shall consist of two houses, the bishops constituting the upper, and clergy and laity together the lower house. Both houses to sit separate. In commenting upon the scheme, the bishop In commenting upon the scheme, the bisho said the establishment of a new body mus said the establishment of a new body must detract from the power of existing bodies. The oreation of a superior synod could only be the practical dissipation of the Provincial system, which in a while would almost apologize for its existence. He did not advocate the abolition of the Provincial system. In the Northwest it was an absolute necessity, and here it could be successfully applied to minor purposes. A simple and less expensive scheme than that proposed could be elaborated to serve the purpose.

The splendid services of Principal Miller and Professor Williams were duly recognized. With proper support the bishop trusted the department of arts and the advantages of a university education would be added.

Hitherto all the fuel used on the Italian railways has been imported, but an attempt is now being made, to use the lignite, of which the country possesses large beds. Very satisfactory results have so far attended the experiments.




