THE SITUATION IN HAMBURG.

If any reliance whatever is to be placed upon the official choiera statistics, the disease continues to abate at Hamburg. Yesterday 182 new cases were reported, a decrease of 211 as compared with the returns for Thursday. The deaths yesterday are placed at 122, against 215 for Thursday. The daily reports, however, continue to be badly mixed up, as is evidenced by a supplementary report issued to-day, giving 128 new cases and 41 deaths, that occurred prior to yesterday, and were not incorporated in the prior returns.

Business reports from Hamburg grow worse. It is estimated that the financial and commercial losses there already reach a total of 200,000,000 marks. The disclosures of the horribly unsanitary state of the city and its suburbs have raised the question as to whether the Hamburg Senate ought not to be deprived of its administration of affairs and the Prussian Government assume control.

THE BERLIN SCARE VANISHED.

Among the public in Berlin the scare has titerly vanished. Even the hotels have low ceased to reject guests from Hamburg. now ceased to reject guests from Hamburg. A panicky feeling, however, continues to prevail in the rural districts. An instance of this feeling is given at Alt Ruppin, a town of Prussia, were a volunteer corps has been organized to guard the approaches to the town and to keep strangers out until they have been subjected to a week's quarantine. The town of Pine is similarly cordoned and has slut itself off from all communication with visitors even from adjoining districts.

Cholera is bad enough in the poorer and older quarters of the city, but the middle and upper-class residents would not have known of the existence of the epidemic, except for the information gleaned through the newspaper.

RUSSIA'S HOPES DISAPPOINTED.

LONDON, Sept. 11.—Again the hopes that the choiera has spent its strength in Russia have been dashed to the ground and the people are asking when the end will be. It he official returns for Tuesday showed a decerease of 843 new cases throughout the empire, and 1,169 deaths, and this led to the belief that the disease was decreasing in virulence. Yesterday when Wednesday's returns for the whole empire were issued it was seen that a comparison with Tuesday's returns showed an increase of 913 new cases and 92 deaths. The figures for Wednesday stood: New cases, 4,679; deaths, 32,358. In St. Petersburg, however, the returns still show a decrease.

HAMBURG'S DEATH LIST GROWS LARGER.

HAMBURG, Sept. 11.—The cholera epidemic continues to rape in this city, and the total of the death list is growing eppallingly larger and larger. Yesterday Sio new cases and 161 deaths were reported where, but of this number 117 cases and 59 deaths occurred throughout the compire yesterday.

### FATAL FIRE IN MONTREAL.

Three Men Killed and Others Seriously Injured.

Awful Leap for Life by One of the Victims.

MONTREAL, Sept. 12.—A disastrous fire broke out in the Chambly Hotel, Jacques Cartier Square, at 1:30 this morning, by which three men lost their lives. Two heads were seen to come to the windows on the second floor and then go back into the flames. On the third floor, both front and back, the boarders had a chance to leap ior their lives and did so, jumping on the pavement 40 feet below. The first to lead was Maxime Filiatraul, about 35 years of their lives and did se, jumping on the pavement 40 feet below. The first to lead was Maxime Filiatraul, about 35 years of age, who fell on his back with a horrible cry. He was next followed by Charbon, who got off with a sprained ankle. Both men jumped in front, while Jules Commery, a furrier, jumped out of the back window, Commery breaking both of his ankles. While this was going on the shricks of a woman were heard, and three carters standing near by, finding that the sound came from over the barroom, rushed in and rescued the woman-Mrs. Hurberdean, the wife of the proprietor of the house, who is at present away visiting relatives at Chambery. She, however, was not hurt, but badly frightened. A front room boarder on the third floor, wrapped up in a coat, was the first of the fire's victims. This was Turcotte, a sewing machine agent. He had evidently made a hard fight to get to the door, but had fallen on reaching it and was then overcome. He was dead when brought out was Oneidalo, a medical student, according to what Charbonneau, a fellow-boarder, said. He was breathing, but died soon after in the hospital. ### MURDER AT AMHERSTBURG.

An Insanely Jealous Husband Cuts His Wife's Throat.

He Makes an Unsuccessful Attempt at Suicide, and is Arrested for His Terrible Crime.

Amherstburg, Sept. 12.—A shocking affair—the brutal murder of a wife by an insanely jealeds busband—startled this town about 6 o'clock Saturday evening, and Anderson Veney, about 45 years old, by trade a barber, though acting as steward of the steamer Norman on the lakes during the past summer, is in prison charged with the most serious of all crimes, while his wife, a woman of excellent reputation, is dead by his hand. The circumstances of the awful affair are as follows:

The front door being locked, he ran around to the back door, which he found open, and on looking in a frightful scene was presented.

Mrs. Veney lay upon the kitchen floor, her throat cut from ear to ear, and Veney was walking up and down the room, covered with blood and with an open pen-knife in his hand. Mr. Street at once ran to summon the police and soon returned in company with Chief Le May. When Mr. Street and the officer reached the kitchen they found Veney in the act of cutting his own throat with the same knife he had used to murder his wife. The knife was taken from him and Dr. Proudfoot called in.

His Wife and Only Son Diod Within Four Months.

THE LATE JAMES TROW.

No more popular representative ever sat in Parliament than James Trow, ex. M. P. for South Perth, whose sudden death, reported in the Evening ADVERTISER of Saturday, has shocked a wide circle of his friends. Mr. Trow, it may sately be said, had not an enemy either in public or in private life, and that is saying a good deal for a man who had to rab up against all sorts and conditions of men in a long public career.

Mr. Trow was a Welshman by birth. His early days were spent at Newton, Montgemeryshire, and he was educated at Welshpool. When but 17 years of age he came to Canada, and six years later he was married to Miss Mary Moore, of Blenheim, Oxford county. He first followed the occupation of a conveyancer. For nearly 30 years he was reeve of North Easthope, chosen each time by acclamation, and he had the honor of being elected warden of Perth. At Con-federation he was elected a member of the Ontario Legislature for South Perth and held the seat till 1871. In 1872 he was chosen representative of the riding in the House of Commons, and was the member continnously till the recent byc-election, when, through various causes that need not be through various causes that need not be stated, he was defeated by a small majority. She survives him, along with four sons and one daughter: James Trow, inn., auctioneer, etc., Stratford; Thomas Trow, an adderman of the city, and clerk of the Division Court, Milverton; Dr. Charles Trow, of Toronto; Edward Trow, barrister, Toronto; and Miss Mamie Trow, residing at home.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 11.—The horror of the great Quincy accident was recalled last night when a through freight express train west bound on the Fitchburg Railway ran into a passenger train standing on the outbound track at west Cambridge junction, telescoping the rear car, killing eight persons outright and injuring nearly 30 others. Three are reported to have since died.



A Carcer of Crime.

The Syracuse Standard of a recent date says that a young man alighted from a New York Central freight train there, walked into police headquarters and gave himself up to Chief of Police Wright, as a criminal. He gave his name as Robert Russell and said that he was 29 years old and lived in Dundas, Canada. His father is Samuel Fuller, a millwright of that place, and his family is in good standing in the community.
