His style is easy, logical and forcible; his language is simple, terse and chaste. Mr. Cushing appeals to the intellect and not to the passions. Of commanding presence and ingratiating mien he forces the unremittant attention of his auditory.

### THE OPEN FORUM.

The London General Hospital.

To the Editor of the ADVENTISER:
Having recently been a patient in the London General Hospital for a month in consequence of injuries sustained in an accident, I deem it but right to put on record a few lines in commendation of that worthy institution and expressive of my deep nense of gratitude to the staff for their uniform kindness and attention. There is no doubt that very many cases, particularly those of a more serious type, can be best treated in an institution under the constant supervision of competent physicians, where medical appliances and remedies are ready at hand, and where skilled trained nurses devoted to their avocation are on duty both night and day. To secure similar favoring conditions is hardly possible in many homes. What I have observed goes to confirm this view, and from all I can learn the old time prejudice against "going to the hospital" naturally appears to be wearing away. There were there paying patients (who comprise about one-fifth of the total number) occupying private wards under special treatment by some of the foremost physicians in the city. The authorities have been unable to receive numbers of such patients. This is to be deplored from unancial consideration if for no other reason, because, besides their pay the hospital receives the Government per capita, so that they really help to make the institution self-sustaining.

As readers of the ADVERTISER are aware, the capacity of the institution is altogether inadequate to present requirements, and proposals have been under consideration for a new building out-and-out on a new site, or the erection of an additional wing and the rearrangement of the existing structure. Whatever course is taken, provision should be made, not merely for the present, but for years to come; or the plans adopted should admit of future extensions, as may become necessary by the growing population of the city and vicinity.

There is food for thought in the letter regarding the city hospital published in our news columns to-day. The writer, Mr. Wm. Thompson, is well-known to many of our citizens, and doubtless his experience in this most necessary and important public institution will cause renewed interest to be taken in the hospital and in those of the inmates who are friendless in this season of good will and present-making. It is most satisfactory to know that the authorities have been able, by careful management, to entirely overcome the onetime prejudice against treatment for disease in a public hospital. There never was much ground for the popular objection, and men and women have now not only overcome their scruples in this respect, but like Mr. Thompson have come to look upon the hospital as the best possible place for the efficient treatment of very many dis-

Our correspondent joins with us in the view that the further extension and re-arrangement of the hospital is necessary if the demand that the work of the institution shall be extended is to be met with. There is, as Mr. Thompson says, a good hospital staff, a self-sacrificing corps of visiting physicians and many sympathetic friends of those who are friendless, but there can be no increase of pay patients unless the hospital is enlarged.

UPPER LAKE TRAFFIC. As Canada is building a canal at the Soo, altogether within the Dominion, it is interesting to note the great value of the traffic which the new canal will share with the canal on the United States side of the St. Marys rapids, by means of which the whole of the traffic to and from Lake Superior ports has hitherto been carried. The superintendent of this canal, in his annual report issued on Saturday, points out that the value of the freight shipped through the waterway this year is \$145,436,-956, an increase over last year of \$10,000,000. This freight was carried in 8,379 steamships, 2,955 sailing vessels, 674 unregistered craft-a total of 12,008 vessels. The tonnage of freight was 10,796,572-a decrease of 4 per cent. on the year. Of this freight the chief prowere 43,481,652 bushels of wheat, 7,420,674 barrels of flour-an increase of 37 per cent. over last year-and 4,014,556 tons of iron ore. The number of passengers was 18,869, against 25,896 the previous year. This reduction is doubtless owing to the diversion of the holiday traffic to Chicago. The canal was open to naviga-tion 219 days, or fourteen days less than during 1892.

-Dr. Jennie M. Taylor, daughter of Rev. A. E. Taylor, a Pennsylvania Methodist preacher, has started for South Africa, with her uncle, Bishop William Taylor, who has charge of the Methodist mission-ary work on the Dark Continent. Miss Taylor, who is an accomplished young lady, has taken with her a full outfit of dentist's appliances, and will travel from point to point on the Congo, administering relief to those natives who are subject to toothache. We know by the experience of Dr. Johnstone in Jamaica that a knowledge of medicine, and especially of dentistry, is of immense value to a missionary in getting at the right side of the natives, and the zenana work of the women missionaries In India has been greatly facilitated when the missionary possessed the power to heal or alleviate disease. As far as is possible, every missionary sent out should have a knowledge of medicine; medical missionary.

A CROWN IN COMMISSION. Hawaiian developments must always b nteresting to Canadians, not alone because ormer citizens of the Dominion are now prominent business men and political eaders in Honolulu, but because the Sandwich Islands are the halfway stopping place of all navigators who do business between our Pacific ports and the antipodes.

The latest developments, as cabled from New Zealand and elsewhere throw new light on the difficulties of the situation. It is now no secret that President Cleveland did not approve of the policy of his predecessor in countenancing the overthrow of the Queen, and in aiding the establishment of a provisional government, looking to the earliest opportunity to investigate the circumstances and has all along desired that what he considered a wrong should be righted. The news now is to the effect that, though the provisional government was established on the declared basis that its future course should be dictated from Washington, it deems itself sufficiently strong to say that it will not go out of office unless it is forced to by United States arms. The United States Minister cannot so decree unless their headquarters established, their disinstructed by Congress, and President Cleveland is unwilling, as Ambassador Bayard said on Saturday in London, to "force upon the weak Hawaiians a government which they have not had a full chance to discuss.'

The ex-Queen, on her part, is alleged to e more anxious to accept a subsidy of half far the municipal campaign in London is million dollars and to relinquish all claim to the throne than to resume power shorn of her right to be extravagant and wasteful, as she was by the legislation of her Parliament in 1887. She is more anxious for good clothes and a luxurious time than a crown of glory and a stinted treasury. Besides, her crafty advisers have apparently instructed her to make the most of the confession of the United States authorities-that she was wrongly dethroned by the aid of United States bayonets-and it is altogether improbable that she will risk taking the throne in the face of the determined and well-armed residents who now control affairs, unless she is guaranteed protection from the United States. This protection she is not likely to get, for President Cleveland, while declaring that he follows out the traditional policy of his country in refusing to annex the islands, recognizes it as his duty to abstain from forcibly interfering with the affairs of the people, while discountenance ing interference by any other nation,

A comical situation is thus presented. It should afford a fine field for a comic opera of a Gilbert-Sullivan character, Wha funnier than a queen who refuses to wear a crown unless Uncle Sam holds it on her head! What more magnanimous than a great nation offered a beautiful and rich country for the taking possession, and refusing on principle to gobble it up! Is there a European monarchy which would think twice about the morality of the step if subjected to the same temptation as the United States has undergone?

-The provision of a recent Ontario law giving municipalities power, if they deem it wise, to fix an hour at which all young people shall be at home, on pain of being taken there by a constable, is popular in many localities. Waterloo town set the example, and other municipalities are following suit. The latest is Acton, the council of which has fixed that all children under 15 shall not roam the streets after 9 p.m., from April 1 to Nov. 1, and after 8 Pearline was invented, that's p.m. between Nov. 1 and April 1. The law, judiciously administered, will have a wholesome effect. No young child is benefited by running around the streets until a late hour, and many a one is positively injured.

APPOINTMENTS TO OFFICE. Dr. Ryerson, M. P. P. for Toronto, who is working hard to supplant Mr. Meredith in the Provincial Conservative leadership, recently undertook to lay down the law that no defeated candidate or individual who had been a member of the Legislature should be appointed to public office. The fact that a man has served his Province should certainly not be a bar to his acceptance of office, all other things being equal; the fact that a good man had offered himself for election in a constituency, and had not received a majority of the votes, should neither help him to an office nor hinder him from taking it. The question to be answered is, "Is the man competent to fill the office? Is the office necessary to the government of the country ?" These questions being answered in the affirmative, there can surely be no very great objection to the classes of men named accepting office. Are they not as likely to be able to perform their duties as well as men inexperienced in public affairs? To say "You're another" might be the answer to Dr. Ryerson if no better argument were available. It is not difficult to show that the men at Ottawa who are admired by Dr. Ryerson, whom he has supperted all these years without question, are by far the worst sinners in making appointments, if it is wrong to appoint defeated candidates, or ex-members, or relations of Ministers and members. An excellent contrast is supplied us from Hamilton by where that is not possible every group of missionaries ought to be accompanied by a ex-member of the Legislature, is the only
